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WASHINGTON NEWS.

Silver Won--Teller Resolu-
tions Passed the Senate.

VOTE WAS 47 FOR 32 AGAINST

Alabama Election Decision Unseats
a Populist.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—After a de-
bate, animated at all times, and oc-
casionally acrimonious, which has oc-
cupied the greater part of the week,
the senate last evening, by vote of 47
to 32 passed the Teller concurrent res-
olution.

All efforts to amend the resolution
were voted down by majorities rang-
ing from five to twenty-nine. Lodge's
gold standard substitute being de-
feated by a sharp majority. The vote
on the Lodge amendment was, ayes 24;
and noes 53.

The events of the day leading up to
the final vote were full of interest and
importance. It was a field-day for
the orators of the senate, not less
than twenty-five senators embracing
the opportunity to speak upon the
subject under discussion. Public in-
terest in the debate was well attested
by the attendance.

Upon the final passage of the resolu-
tion some Republicans, who sup-
ported McKinley and the St. Louis
platform in 1896, like Carter, Chan-
dler, Clark, Pritchard, Shoup, Warren
and Wolcott, voted for the resolution
because, as Wolcott announced, they
did not believe the resolution com-
mitted those who supported it to the
free and unlimited coinage of silver.

Aldrich closed just as the clock
marked 6, the hour set for voting, and
the vice president promptly an-
nounced that the voting would pro-
ceed. The galleries were filled to
overflowing, and a large number of
the members of the house, including
Speaker Reed, occupied the area back
of the senators.

The Nelson amendment was first
presented, declaring "that it is the
duty of the government of the United
States, under all existing laws, to
maintain the parity in value of its
gold and silver money, so that a dol-
lar of one metal shall, for all mon-
etary purposes, always be equal in
value to the dollar of the other metal."

Vest moved to table the amend-
ment. The yeas and no votes gave
the first test of the respective ele-
ments, resulting in a vote of 42 to 37
in favor of tabling the amendment.

Then came the Lodge amendment,
as follows: "That the bonds of the
United States, issued on or after Jan-
uary 1, 1893, and authorized to be
issued under the said acts of con-
gress herein before recited, are pay-
able (principal and interest) in gold
coin or its equivalent, and that any
other payment, without consent of
the creditors, will be in violation of
public faith and in derogation of its
credit."

Vest moved to table the amend-
ment. "I hope the senator will
withdraw the motion to table," in-
terposed Wolcott, "so that we may
have a direct vote on gold."

Vest consented and the vote was
taken directly on the Lodge amend-
ment, resulting on its defeat by a vote
of 24 to 53 as follows:

There was intense interest during
this vote, as it presented a more di-
rect issue than had been anticipated.
A number of amendments were of-
fered by opponents of the resolution
but all were laid on the table. The
debates were cleared for the final vote
on the Teller resolution.

"On this vote," announced the vice-
president, "the yeas are 47, and the
noes 32," and the resolution is
agreed to."

The pairs throughout the voting
were as follows: Turley with Deboe
Faulkner with Elkins; Gorman with
Frye; Jones of Nevada, with Proctor;
Walsh with Spooner.

The first named in each case would
have voted with those sustaining the
resolution against the amendments,
while the last named would have voted
against it and for the amendments.

The senate adjourned until Monday.
An unusually severe arraignment of
alleged election frauds is made in the
report by the house committee on
election, No. 1, in the case of William
Aldrich against Thomas S. Plowman
from the fourth district of Alabama.

Plowman is the sitting member, but
the committee submits a recount of
the vote giving Aldrich, the Republi-
can, and not the Populist candidate,
the seat.

Secretary Gage has sent to Chair-
man Stone, of the house committee on
coinage, weights and measure, a let-
ter in which he explains the necessity
for the enactment of several impor-
tant bills recently introduced in the
house and still pending. He says the
amount it is permissible under exist-
ing rules to allow minter and refiner
and carrier of the United States mints
for wastage in their operations on the
precious metals is excessive, and
should be reduced to one-half thou-
sandth of the whole.

The demand for new fractional sil-
ver coin since 1890 has been much
greater than the amount coined, and
the treasury has been estimated by
the appropriation made for no loss on
coinage of such coin.

From the demand for the new coin
it would appear that a much larger
amount of subsidiary silver coin would
be maintained in circulation if the
secretary of the treasury was author-
ized to use any silver bullion now in
the treasury in the coinage of such
denominations of subsidiary silver
coin as might from time to time be
required, and it is therefore recom-
mended that not only to use any bul-
lion now in the treasury, but also
authority to recoil all worn and abra-
ded fractional silver coin now in the
treasury and hereafter received.

There are now in the treasury over
\$10,000,000 in subsidiary silver coin;
of this amount it is estimated that about
\$7,000,000 is unfit for circulation. A
third bill is to authorize the receipt
of foreign gold coin in sums of \$5000
in any single deposit and to pay for
them without previous melting, the
coin to be held as bullion and paid
out for export in exchange for United
States coin.
