SCENES OF DISORDER.

(Continued from first page)

of business through by the clearing houses is the largest ever known, and the total number of commercial failures is the smallest since 1892, and the average liability of those failing is the smallest known in the past twenty-five years; and

"Whereas, Official reports show that over 500,000 men are now employed who were idle one year ago, and

"Whereas, The gold reserve is now about \$1,000,000 and constantly increasing, and President McKinley has discredited all the Populist prophets by stubbornly refusing to issue any more bonds; and

"Whereas, The farmers of the northwest have wiped out several millions of dollars of indebtedness during the past year, and our wholesale and retail dealers have reported the holiday trade for 1896 and '97, upon the whole, the best they have ever known; and

"Whereas, The cattle and the sheep and the wool of Eastern Oregon, and the grain and the hops of the Willamette valley, have advanced about 100 per cent, in the past eighteen months, in defiance of the predictions of Wm. J. Bryan, and the carefully prepared tables of Pop. Soetber and Sauerback, and in spite of the fact that the disastrous crime of 1873 is still unavenged; and

"Whereas, The only ray of comfort for the Populists here comes from the fact that the expressive production and manufacture of cotton in the south, where labor and raw material is 25 per cent cheaper, has closed the cotton mills of New England; therefore be it

"Resolved, That we tender to the aggregation consisting of the Populist party, the Bimetallic party, and the disorganized fragment of what was once known as the Democratic party of the state of Oregon, our sincere condolence that the 'accursed gold standard' has brought about conditions that so badly interfere with a successful dissemination of the gospel of woe and that we commend to their consideration the reflection that their loss of the popular gain and congratulate them that they, as citizens of a common republic, are to share, equally with us, the beneficent influences of Republican administration for a full generation to come."

At 4 o'clock a partial report of the credentials committee was received. It was the report of the first congressional district.

The fight for president of the league again waxed warm, C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, having been brought out, but Claud Gatch, the choice of the Marion county Republicans, and that of the young members of the party in the valley, easily led.

During the interval before the credentials committee's report was read, Hon T. T. Geer was called for and he appeared on the rostrum and made a speech in which he harped upon C. W. Fulton was next called out and this champion of it-publianism responded with a ringing speech in favor of party unity and harmony, warning the delegates that the enemy was watching every move of the Republicans, and that only by harmony could success attend the efforts of the Republican party in Oregon. His speech was a great factor in bettering the feeling.

EVENING SESSION.
Reassembling at 7:30 o'clock in the evening the credentials committee announced that it was ready to report. Johnson, of Linn, read the report, which showed that 2,018 delegates were entitled to seats. It was presented with the following:

"In view of the loose provisions of the League constitution, in regard to a certifying the qualifications of delegates or the number of members actually upon the rolls of the clubs, upon which representation is claimed, we are compelled to report that the following delegates have prima facie rights to seats in this convention. Your committee feels that it must call the attention of the convention to the apparent stuffing of the rolls of the clubs for the sole purpose of representation, especially in Multnomah county, by which that county has a representation about double that formerly claimed, and that it deems that it is unjust to the clubs of the outside counties, to come with a genuine representation and have it offset by paper clubs and fictitious membership in Multnomah county.

"Therefore recommends that such amendments of the league constitution be adopted as shall confine the representation in league conventions to clubs regularly organized to do Republican work, whose membership shall have been filed with the secretary of the league. The delegates were divided as follows:

"First district, 133 clubs and 756 delegates.

"Second district, 126 clubs and 1,262 delegates—delegates from Multnomah county, 969.

"Johnson moved the adoption of the report as read, but a number of motions intervened to throw out the vote of Multnomah county on account of fraud. Wallace McCamant (anti-Mitchell) named four clubs which he said had no right to seats in the convention.

"Hume (Mitchell) called attention to the fact that the McKimly and Hobart league, of this city, from which McCamant was a delegate, and declared that it had no standing as a club, and ought not to be represented in the convention. Hume admitted that the rolls of the clubs had been stuffed, and said that he did not care if the entire Multnomah delegation, consisting of nearly 1,000 names, was thrown out. The difficulty was finally settled by the adoption of the report of the credentials committee, which seated all the delegates.

"Nominations for president of the league were then called for. C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, in an enthusiastic speech, nominated Claud Gatch, of Salem, and moved that he be declared elected by acclamation. The motion prevailed unanimously and amid the wildest cheering for the man from the Capital City. He was escorted to the chair and, in a brief address to the convention, declared himself unqualified in favor of the gold standard.

C. B. Moores, of Salem, then nominated C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, for

vice-president and he was elected by acclamation.

The executive committee chosen it as follows: S. B. Eakin, of Lane; committee men at-large and members for the first district: A. M. Crawford, of Douglas; R. B. Sinnott, of Wasco; H. M. Calk, Multnomah, and M. A. Moody, of Wasco.

The delegates at-large to the national league are: J. N. Sanders, of Union; E. O. Potter, of Lane; Geo. Mayger, of Columbia; E. R. Lake, of Benton; W. A. Perkins, of Douglas, and H. B. Plummer, of Polk.

First District—J. W. Hobbs, of Yamhill; C. B. Winn, of Linn; C. S. Moore, of Klamath; Theo. Cameron, Second District—J. J. Donegan, of Harney; J. M. Ferguson, of Umatilla; C. A. Jones, of Baker; J. H. Putnam, of Gilliam.

H. L. Wells was re-elected secretary for the fourth consecutive term.

The convention adjourned sine die.
