Terrible Holocaust,

Fifteen Lives Were Lost and Thirty More Injured.

Only a Few Bodies Have So Far Been Recovered.

CHICAGO, March 17.—The worst fire that has occurred in Chicago since the cold storage warehouse holocaust at the world's fair, broke out in a six-story building at the corner of Wabash avenue and Jackson boulevard. The death list will probably reach 15, and may exceed that figure. The injured number about 30. The following is a list of the dead so far as known:

Samuel A. Smith, salesman.

Samuel A. Clark, jumped from the fourth floor, employed by the Olmstead Scientific Company.

An unidentified man, taken from 215 Wabash avenue, burned beyond recognition.

W. A. Olmstead, president Olmstead Scientific Company.

Miss Kate Carney, forewoman of the National Music Company, believed to have perished in the flames, after helping to safety the last one of the 40 girls in her charge.

Charles Anderson, employed by the Sweet & Wallace Company.

Philip Farley, employed as a piano mover by the Conover Piano Company.

An office boy, employed by the Sweet & Wallace Company, jumped from the sixth floor; thought to be buried in the debris.

H. B. Cunningham, employed by the Northern Pacific Express Company, head and body burned.

Mary Lapore, employed by the Sweet & Wallace Company, burned while descending the fire escape from the sixth floor.

A colored waiter, leg broken by a falling wall.

Samuel G. Snyder, employed by the Sweet & Wallace Company, burned severely.

E. A. Wise, employed by the Sweet & Wallace company, burned severely.

David Schafer, arm broken while trying to catch a man who had jumped from sixth floor.

Joie Baxa, jumped from second floor, ankle sprained and body bruised.

Anna Baxa, jumped from second floor, ankle sprained and body bruised.

An unidentified man, jumped from the sixth floor, back broken.

Engineer Murphy, of the Emerson building burned about the face and shoulders.

Andrew Nashton, face and hands burned.

Emil Brosemann, jumped from the sixth floor, injured spine and lower limbs, will probably die.

The Emerson Piano Company occupied the first, second and third stories of the building. Among the other tenants were the Presbyterian board of publications and the Sweet & Wallace Company, dealers in photographic supplies, the latter on the sixth floor. It was here that the fire broke out. The floor was stored with chemicals and material used in the manufacture of photographic supplies, and according to some who escaped, the entire floor was swept with flames in five minutes after the fire broke out.

Three hundred girls were employed by this firm, and when the fire broke out a panic ensued, many of the unfortunate women being trampled under the feet of their comrades, in their frantic efforts to escape. Cut off from escape by the elevators and stairways, the people penned in the burning building began jumping from windows, and though the firemen and others held canvas many were crushed on the stone sidewalks. According to an eyewitness as many as 10 jumped at once from the top floor, and others were seen shortly after to fall back into the flames.

The flames quickly spread to the floors beneath. The firemen were badly handicapped by the terrific heat. Within a radius of a block the heat was intense. The fiercest fire was in the rear of the Conover Company's store.

Thirty-five minutes after the fire broke out the floors had all fallen, and a moment later the wall fell. Shortly after the front wall fell the outward tracks of the Union Elevated loop was completely covered with debris and blocked the whole elevated system.

Miss Carney was a true heroine. Although at the outset she had an opportunity to escape with the other women, she seemed to feel it her duty to stay and help the escape of the girls over whom she had charge. When she saw there was no hope of stopping the panic she darted to the elevator cage to calm the others. As the elevator ascended Miss Carney

ordered the conductor to stop. She then turned and helped her charges to the cage. During all the excitement she remained calm and issued orders as though directing the women at work. As the elevator started to descend without Miss Carney one of the girls cried to the conductor to stop, but the brave woman, though staring death in the face, shouted to them not to mind her; that she would take care of herself. The girls she sent down in the elevator escaped unharmcd.

For water service apply at office. Bills payable monthly in advance. Make all complaints at the office.
