Washington, March 21.-President McKinley did not attend church Sunday morning, as is his custom, but instead spent two hours or more in conference with several members of the cabinet. Assistant Secretary Day cailed about 10:30 and remained until nearly 1 o'clock. Secretary Long and Secretary Bliss were the other members present. They remained an hour.

The members of the cabinet, on leaving the White House, said there was no special significance in the meeting this morning.
