JAIL BREAK FRUSTRATED.

Prisoners Awaiting Action of Grand Jury Attempt to Escape.

The occupants of the Marion county jail made an attempt Sunday morning to saw their way out of the jail. The work had been done by a saw and had progressed quite successfully, the two bars being almost severed. A search of the prisoners and the jail corridor failed to disclose the instrument with which the work was done.

It is the opinion of Sheriff Wrightman that this break for freedom was unquestionably perpetrated by the quartet of prisoners incarcerated in the jail awaiting the action of the grand jury on charges of burglary. The quartet consists of: Tom Tring and John Wilson received at the jail March 15th for burglary at Silverton; and Ed Talbot and Jas. Bouley, who were so cleverly caught in this city March 7th, and held to answer for the burglary of Henry's general merchandise store at Hubbard. Consequently this quartet of prisoners has been denied the freedom of the corridors and are now securely confined in separate cells.

At this time there are two other prisoners in the county jail awaiting the action of the grand jury. They are Barney Rompell, of this city, and one Davis, of Jefferson, who is held on a charge of larceny from a dwelling. Besides the grand jury prisoners there are a number of other men serving time for trespassing.

HOME FROM DYEA.

J. S. Nye Gives Some News Pertaining to Salem in Alaska.

J. S. Nye reached Salem via the California overland Sunday evening from Dyea and adjoining Alaskan points. Mr. Nye's return home at this time was necessitated by impaired health. His general appearance is materially changed for by reason of his recent illness, he has removed his heavy mustache.

Mr. Nye, who for several years was head salesman in the Steiner grocery, on State street, left Salem, February 6, with a party of three other Salemites, viz: Jas. A. Moberg, Joseph Cavanaugh and Taylor Smith. The party sailed, via the Elder, February 12, reaching Dyea on the 22nd of the month. Mr. Nye however contracted a very severe cold on the 20th that settled on his lungs and terminated in pneumonia. Mr. Nye remained at Skagway and Dyea until March 10, during which time he was constantly under the care of a physician. On the latter date he deemed it best to return home in hopes that a speedy and permanent cure might be effected.

Mr. Nye reports the other members of his party all enjoying the best of health and sanguine of being reasonably compensated for the hardships endured. There is much sickness, both in Skagway and Dyea and many deaths are occurring.

While going from Dyea to the steamboat landing on the morning of the 10th inst. Mr. Nye saw Albert Griley and party just going to that city. From the fact that Mr. Nye was either in the hospital at Dyea or under care of a physician during his entire stay at Dyea and Skagway, he did not have an opportunity to see or converse with but very few Salemites who have gone to the frozen north. When last heard from, Joel Hewett and party had reached the foot of the pass, while J. O. Bonorth and his party expected to reach that objective point on the 18th inst. The Farrar-Sayre party had begun transporting their supplies from Dyea and expected soon to make the Pass.

Should Mr. Nye regain his health and the reports from his associates be favorable, he expects to return to Alaska in the fall and push his way into the interior.

Carrying Concealed Weapons.

Sunday evening a man giving the name of C. E. Rose, applied at police headquarters for a bed for the night. In searching the man's clothes a small weapon was found, that very closely resembles an old fashioned "pepper-box." The weapon is about six inches long and contains eight small cartridges. The fire piece has a handle larger than the average revolver but differs from the modern pocket fire-arms in that it is minus the trigger through which the projectile is sent. It is considered a very efficient weapon and is almost invariably found in the equipage of a full-fledged "knight of the road."

As a result of this discovery, a charge of carrying concealed weapons was preferred against the man. From letters found upon his person it developed that the man's correct name is not Rose but L. F. McNamara and that he was formerly located at Keswick, Cal.

McNamara was arraigned before Recorder Eides this afternoon and fined \$10 and costs. Not being able to pay the fine the man went to jail.
