[The Dalles Times-Mountaineer, Democratic.] The union that was formed by the state conventions of the Democratic, People's and Silver Republican parties to Portland last week was to every respect honorable and harmonious. The platform adopted was concise and broad enough for all who are united in the common cause—the advancement of human rights and honest government—to stand upon. It is a platform which Democrats, Populists and Silver Republicans can endorse, for it embodies all the cardinal principles enunciated by those parties, and contains nothing objectionable to any of them. Neither of these parties have been required to surrender any of their principles, yet the demand for a flexible currency, sufficient to meet the demands of trade and direct legislation, which are endorsed by all three parties are made prominent, hence the union on platform is honorable in every detail, and is acceptable to all except the ultra middle-of-the-roader, who stand for a paternal form of government in its most radical form. And the appointment of officers was perfectly equitable, for the distribution was just. In view of the fact that the Populists, in the election of 1896, cast the greater number of votes for congressmen in the state, were entitled to a majority of the offices, therefore they were given four places on the ticket—governor, attorney general, superintendent of public instruction and state printer—the Democrats having been the next strongest party were given three—congressman in the first district, state treasurer and supreme judge—the Silver Republicans having a minority of votes were given two places on the state ticket—congressman for the second district and secretary of state. In this distribution each party is given one of what may be called purely political offices—governor and congressman—and each is given representation on the state board, so that in both branches of government—state and national—they have equal representation. On this basis all the reform forces may feel that they can unite honorably and fairly, and that they are not asked to surrender any of their principles either by the declaration of the platform or in the distribution of offices.

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IN POLK COUNTY. The Three Parties Issue Call for a Union County Convention. The Democratic party, the Silver Republican party and the Populist parties at their respective state conventions, held in the City of Portland on the 23rd day of March, 1898, having adopted a platform and nominated a Union state ticket, and the delegates of the three parties at said convention, from Polk county, at a meeting held by them during said convention having by a unanimous vote, directed and authorized us to do so, now therefore, in pursuance of the action of the said state convention, and by the virtue of said authority, we, D. W. SEARS, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee, J. B. STUMP, chairman of the Populist County Central Committee, and EZRA CONNOR, chairman of the Silver Republican County Central Committee, hereby appoint Saturday, the 16th day of April, 1898 as the time and the city of Dallas as the place for holding a Union state ticket convention, on the 14th day of April as the time for holding the precinct primaries for the election of delegates to attend said convention, upon an appointment of delegates, we have appointed the several precinct of the county, representation of the said county, as follows to wit: Busch Vista, 5; Falls City, 4; Moon 4; Bridgeport, 4; Jackson, 7; North Mouth, 4; South Mouth, 7; Dixie, 7; Lucklanute, 8; North Dallas, 6; South Dallas, 6; East Dallas, 8; Middle Independence, 6; Middle Independence, 6; South Independence, 6; Eola, 8; Salt Lake, 2; Silver, 3; Rock Creek, 2; Douglas, 4; Spring Valley, 5. All precincts are hereby invited to send delegates, and take part in the selection of Union delegates.

UNION PLATFORM. United in a common cause for the sacred purpose of preserving the principles of government by the whole people, in fact as well as in name, restoring and maintaining equality, under the terms of all contracts, the people's Democratic and Silver Republican parties of the state of Oregon, waving all minor points of difference, and uniting for the purpose of carrying out the greatest and underlying principles upon which we are all agreed, do make and present to the people of this state the following declaration of principles, under the terms of which we solemnly pledge each and every candidate upon our united ticket: First—We demand the free and unrestricted use of the gold and silver coin, at the legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of foreign nations; and we are unalterably opposed to the policy of the government to direct the issue of currency, the turning over of the money making power of the government to the national banks, as presented by the bill drawn by the Republican secretary of the treasury, and introduced by President McKinley; and we especially denounce the avowed attempt by said bill to fetter the country irrevocably and forever to the single Gold standard.

We demand a national money, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, without the intervention of the banks or any other private institution, and to restore the just level of prices of labor and production. We favor such legislation as will prevent the issue of any kind of legal tender money by private contract. We demand that the government, in payment of its obligations, shall use its own money as to the kind of lawful money in which they are to be paid, and we denounce the present and preceding administrations for surrendering this option to the holders of government obligations. We demand that there shall be no further issue of United States interest-bearing bonds, and that the paper savings banks be established by the government, for the deposit of the savings of the people and to facilitate exchange. We demand the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people. We demand the initiative and referendum system of law-making in its optional form, local, state and national, and the submission by congress of all important national questions for an advisory vote of the people, until such time as the national constitution shall have been amended so as to provide for direct legislation. We condemn as dangerous and unjust the surrender, in all departments of the government, to the influence of trusts, corporations and aggregations of wealth, generally, and the packing of the highest courts of the land with corporation lawyers, too ready to do the will of their late employers, and to set aside and abolish laws passed by the legislative departments of the states and government, upon flimsy pretexts, at the behest of such institutions. In state matters, we demand: A simple and well-guarded registration law. A more equitable mode of appointing judges of election. Stinted laws to regulate the operation of trusts, in fact and in name, and to give in their hands within the jurisdiction of the state. We denounce and condemn the corrupt and dishonest publican legislative assemblies, and charge that the Republican party, in its eagerness for the spoils of office, has become divided into warring factions, so that it is incapable of government as exemplified by the condition existing in this office of the state treasurer, where being at this time more than \$500,000 there was taken from the people by the press of taxation, while state warrants issued for non payment for water, furnished by us. We demand that all districts and county officers be placed upon salaries commensurate with the duties to be performed by them, as assumed as railway and other corporate property is not bearing its proportion of taxation, we demand that such property shall bear its just and equal share of the expenses of government.
