REVENUE BILL CONCLUDED.—WASHINGTON, May 13.—The senate committee on finance has concluded its consideration of the war revenue bill, after a two weeks' sitting, and Senator Allison reported it to the senate. All the provisions in the house bill, for the issuance of bonds and certificates of indebtedness, were stricken out and Allison, in reporting the measure, made a minority report giving authority for the bond issue in lieu of the bond provision the Democrats propose the issue of \$150,000,000 in greenbacks, and coin the silver seigniorage in the treasury.

CHANGE OF TIME.—A slight change in the schedule of the Southern Pacific trains was today placed in operation, effecting only the two north bound passenger trains. Beginning today the north bound overland will reach Salem at 7:00 a. m. instead of 7:05 a. m. as at present. This slight change will not effect the leaving time of the "depot car" from the intersection of State and Commercial streets. It will continue to leave for these two trains at 6:40 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. respectively.

Having Truble With Insurgents.

Danish Consul Killed at San Juan.

Spanish Fleet Will Leave Cadiz for Manila.

Flying Squadron Leaves Hampton Roads With Sealed Orders.

Porto Rican Insurgents Celebrating the Fall of San Juan—Navy Department Hears of Spanish Fleet Reaching West Indies and Changes Plans; Regarding the Attack on Havana—Terrible Riots Prevailing at Madrid—France Breaks Neutrality—Sampson Attacks Spanish Fleet Tomorrow.

Consul Reported Killed. HAYTI, May 13.—During the bombardment of M-ro Castle at San Juan Porto Rico, the Danish consul was killed.

German and French Gunners. LONDON, May 13.—A Daily Mail special from Madrid says, it is known that Spanish authorities have engaged all the German and French gunners possible for the coming conflict.

Sampson's Report. WASHINGTON, May 13.—Sampson's official report says only one man killed at San Juan and seven wounded. Killed was on New York.

Under Sealed Orders. NEOPORT NEWS, Va. May 13.—The flying squadron left this morning with sealed orders. Destination unknown.

Stull at Cadiz. GIBRALTER, May 13.—Reported here that Spanish fleet is still at Cadiz, but will leave immediately for Manila with a large expedition.

Carlists Celebrate. WASHINGTON, May 13.—The department has news from Lisbon stating Carlists are holding public demonstrations.

Trouble for Dewey. MADRID, May 13.—The insurgents are giving Rear Admiral Dewey trouble today.

Insurgents Celebrating. WASHINGTON, May 13.—The insurgents in Cuba are celebrating San Juan, surrender. Navy department receives official notification that Spanish fleet reaches West Indies. This changes department plans regarding invading Cuba.

Fearful Riots at Madrid. MADRID, May 13.—Rioting exceeds anything seen here. Officials lose all power over mob.

France Breaks Neutrality. WASHINGTON, May 13.—The navy department reports that France allied the Spanish warships to coal at Martinique. This breaks the neutrality and war with France seems imminent.

Greatest of the Century. WASHINGTON, May 13.—Sampson cables that he will attack the Spanish fleet tomorrow and all Washington is anxiously awaiting the greatest naval battle of the century.

Spanish Fleet Calling. WASHINGTON, May 13.—The Spanish fleet is calling at Port de France. The war ships Yale and St. Louis have reached St. Thomas, and will join Sampson's fleet to participate in the expected attack on the Armada tomorrow.

It Was Probably the Mosquito. PHILADELPHIA, May 13.—A Spanish cruiser has been sighted off the Jersey coast.

Many Spaniards Killed. LONDON, May 13.—The Times special says a desperate battle is reported between the Spaniards and insurgents in Cuba. It was impossible to learn the result, but many Spaniards are believed to have been killed.

They Want a Licking. GIBRALTER, May 13.—Second Spanish fleet is preparing to depart for the Philippines. It will carry many reinforcements and will prepare to recapture Manila.

EASTERN SPEAKERS.—R. J. Hendricks, chairman of the congressional committee of the first district has received a telegram from Representative Tongue saying Eastern speakers will be here by May 21. Webster Davis, assistant secretary of the interior, is expected to speak at Silverton May 21 at the rally of county league clubs. Mr. Tongue says he will not return to take part in the campaign, but F. X. Schoonmaker will probably start for Oregon again tomorrow.

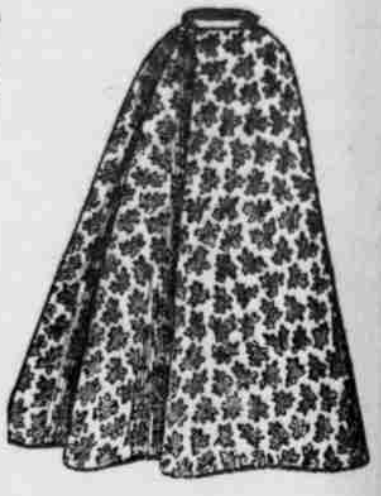

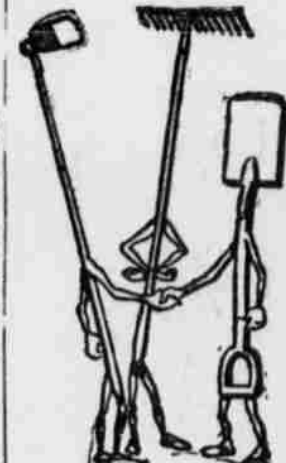

ADVENTISTS CAMP MEETING

Will Commence at State Fair Grounds

Next Thursday.

The annual camp meeting of the North Pacific Conference, Seventh Day Adventist will commence at the fair grounds in this city May 19, and continue in session until the 29th.

The fair grounds already present a scene of activity and in another week all will be in readiness for the great event of the year in the history of that church. About a dozen or more members of the conference have arrived and are superintending the erection of the tents and work of that kind. These include Elder H. W. Decker of Portland, the president of the conference.

The North Pacific conference embrace the whole of Oregon and Washington, west of the Cascades and contains about twenty ministers, all of whom will be present at this meeting.

The distinguished ministers from a distance who are expected to be here are: Elder A. J. Breed, of Oakland, Cal.; Elder A. F. Ballinger, of New York City; Elder H. Schultz, of Nebraska and two missionaries from the Fiji Islands.

Services will be conducted in the English, German and Scandinavian languages. The English preaching will be in a large pavilion 60x120 feet, with seating capacity of 1000, and the German and Scandinavian services will be held in smaller tents. The public exercises will begin promptly at 10:30 a. m. and at 2:30 and 7:30 p. m. each day.

President Decker is much pleased with the grounds which he pronounces the best that the conference have ever secured.
