PROF. J. S. GRAHAM.

Defends Prof. Ackerman and Overhauls "The Journal".

[We print below Prof. Graham's letter in defense of Prof. Ackerman, the Republican candidate for state superintendent of schools. He takes space to review what is well known. In the midst of the hardest times for forty years THE JOURNAL did oppose a change of textbooks. We were opposed to the law when it was passed, we opposed putting it into operation by the county superintendents, and executing the contract by our state officials. We opposed the whole system and advocated a bill in the legislature for state publication at cost, just as California does.]

Prof. Graham asks us if we favor a change in textbooks? If we were required to vote on the matter the question would be pertinent. If Mr. Graham had heard the lecture of State Supt. Brown, of Washington, at Salem the other night, and had seen the prices of textbooks in that state, and other states published in this paper he would know that Oregon is paying too much for textbooks. If it was as hard in 1900 as they were in 1894 we might oppose a change again. Of course we favor some change. Some of the textbooks now used in Oregon and which we must use until 1901 are a disgrace to free schools. But we are living under an ironclad trust system.]

PROF. GRAHAM'S LETTER.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—I recognize the JOURNAL as an able organ of the Union party and expect it to use all honorable means to elect the nominees of that party. But I am surprised at the attack you make on the Republican candidate for the office of superintendent of public instruction in charging that he is a representative of the American Book company and that it will be his purpose if elected to assist that company in retaining the school book business of the state when the only proof you give for your assertion is his vote in the recent adoption of text books for the public schools.

As I was school superintendent of this county during the late book canvass I had occasion to confer with Prof. Ackerman, who was then serving Multnomah county in the same capacity, many times in regard to the book question.

Our ideas were very much the same and our final votes were practically alike.

The American Book company had been supplying nearly all the school books for the state for a term of years.

Several of these books were in my opinion inferior and unsatisfactory

and had we exercised our own individual preference we would have voted to replace those with others more suitable. But the people had to pay for them and we decided to be governed by the wishes of the school patrons of our respective counties.

Prof. Ackerman sent a circular letter to his school district officers setting forth the different features of the question and asked to be advised. The answer was unanimous in favor of re-adopting the list of books already in the schools and he was earnestly requested to cast his vote to accept the proposal of the American Book company.

The people of Marion county did not give me time to issue a circular letter. The JOURNAL always active and industrious in questions of public importance had been "red hot" in encouraging and creating sentiment against a change of school books. Its readers were advised and urged to send in their protests. So well did it succeed that every body from Detroit to Clatsop and from Scott's Mills to Ankeny demanded that the list of books then being furnished by the American Book Company be retained.

Nearly every society, grange and labor and business organization in the county passed resolutions against a change and copies were sent me. The Salem Committee of one hundred registered a protest.

Your Mr. E. Hofer also made me a personal visit and asked that I cast my vote in favor of the series of books then in use. The American Book Company had a host of skillful solicitors and agents, but not one of them made a more eloquent or earnest plea for their publications than did your Mr. Hofer on that occasion.

This same feeling was general throughout the state and resulted in the American Book Company being awarded the contract for six years.

Mr. Lyman and a few other county superintendents ignored the petitions of the people and voted in favor of other publishers. [This is a mistake. Mr. Lyman's vote was endorsed by his re-election in a Republican county.]

I think the American Book Company regards me as being unfriendly to their business methods and many of their publications and I do not wish to offer anything in their defense or behalf, nor do I wish to criticize Mr. Lyman in his hostile attitude towards that company. He is in all probability actuated by proper and honest motives, but the fact remains that the people of this state are and will be overwhelmingly opposed to a change of the series of books that will be proposed in 1900 the date when our present contract expires.

Mr. Lyman announces that he is an enemy of the American Book Company and he is pledged to exert himself to the utmost if elected to assist some other publisher in securing the contract and put a new list of books in the hands of the school children of this state.

Mr. Editor, do you favor a change of school books?

Mr. Ackerman may not be unfriendly to our present publishers but I know he is under no obligations whatever to them nor any other book firm and when the proposition comes up in 1900 and he is superintendent of public instruction he will be guided entirely by the needs and demands of the taxpayers and school patrons of the state just as he was in 1894.

While I favor the election of J. H. Ackerman I have not written this letter in a partisan spirit.

A REPUBLICAN TAXPAYER.

Has Ideas on the Question of State Superintendent.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—The Republicans and Unionists are now in the heat of their campaign and are both, very naturally and properly, advising the people to vote for the man who will promulgate and support the right kind of principles; and in voting for candidates for some offices it would perhaps, be wiser to consider first the man's political belief and his ability to stand by and support that belief and make his everyday life a secondary matter. For instance, being a Republican myself, I could not vote, nor ask any one else to vote for any free silver man of any school of politics to fill the offices of any representative of the people, such as state or United States representatives and senators or for president of the United States. But we have a very important office to fill just now, that can not, from any point of view be considered a political one and which carries with it no political influence. It is necessary that our Supt. of Public Instruction be a man of sterling honesty, with plenty of courage to stand by his convictions; that he should have the necessary educational qualifications, together with a thorough knowledge of the intrinsic value of a book—and of a man—, rather than that he belong to any particular school of politics.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

The following is the platform adopted by the republican party of Oregon in their convention assembled, at Astoria, Clatsop, April 14, 1898:
