SALEM'S VOLUNTEER COMPANIES

Work of Organizing Progressing Nicely
Emergency Corps Formed.

The official announcement that of the second call for 75,000 troops, only 50,000 would be required to recruit to their maximum strength the regiments that have already gone to the Philippines, has caused considerable disappointment among the local volunteers who have or are about to form an organization.

The Salem volunteers who organized under Capt. Minto do not feel disposed to go as such, as it would necessitate the disbandment of the company they have already organized. Captain Minto has not yet named his non-commissioned officers and will not do so until the manner in which the Salem troops shall go, is definitely disposed of. The boys do not like the idea of being used as "fillers" to complete companies that have preceded them but prefer to go as an entire company.

The companies constituting First Regiment Oregon Volunteers, now enroute to the Philippines, each consisted of 81 men out of the war department desires as an economical proposition, to recruit companies each to 105 men. By so doing the expense involved in commissioning and maintaining officers would be dispensed with. Governor W. P. Lord has not expressed himself as being favorable to this proposed manner of recruiting the companies.

It is probable the young men who have enlisted with Major J. C. Rutledge will formally organize sometime this week. Major D. C. Sherman is making splendid progress towards forming a company. The membership of the company under Captain Minto now contains 127 names and the officers feel confident that a sufficient number could pass the examination to insure the formation of a full company.

A. Gasner, A. A. Cunningham and Leon G. Holland are securing names with a view to forming a volunteer company. They already have a list of forty-five and thus the work of organizing volunteer companies goes merrily on. Those signing the roll who fear they will be unable to pass the United States' medical examination required of them, are given the privilege of an examination by a local physician before assembling at the point designated for rendezvous purposes. By this arrangement the prospective members of the company can ascertain their ability to pass the rigid medical examination required of them and can arrange their business affairs accordingly.

WOMAN'S EMERGENCY CORPS.

About one hundred ladies gathered at the W. C. T. U. rooms Tuesday afternoon and organized a local Woman's Emergency Corps. It was unanimously decided to act independent of the Oregon Emergency Corps. The local corps will be known as the "Capital Emergency Corps" and will have headquarters in the armory at the city hall building. Its objects are to comfort and care in general for the soldiers but in particular those from Salem and vicinity and to render such assistance to their families during their absence as may be necessary.

Mrs. Z. F. Moody called the meeting to order, stated the object of meeting and was made chairman. Mrs. E. Y. Chase was made secretary. Upon motion Mrs. Moody named the following committee on by-laws: Mrs. J. J. Murphy, Mrs. G. H. Burnett and Mrs. C. E. Sherwood.

The question as to whether the local corps should be an auxiliary to the Oregon Emergency Corps, was then vigorously discussed by the ladies nearly all of whom favored independent action. At this point the committee on by-laws submitted its report and the same was read by the secretary and adopted without a dissenting vote, as follows:

Article 1.—This organization shall be known as the Capital Emergency Corps, with headquarters at the city hall, Salem, Oregon.

Article 2.—The object of this corps is to assist and co-operate with the state government in advancing the comfort and welfare of our volunteers.

Article 3.—The officers of this corps shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and twelve directors, who together shall form the executive board.
Article 4.—Section 1.—All contributions must be sent to the armory in care of the secretary, who will acknowledge the receipt, and disburse the same as directed by the board.
Section 2.—All bills must be audited by the executive board.

Article 5.—Any patriotic woman shall be eligible to membership. She shall make application to the secretary and after paying the fee of twenty-five cents and signing the by-laws, may be enrolled as a member.

MARION COUNTY CROPS.

The Prospect Very Flattering for Farmers.

Marion county farmers have a fair show to be prosperous this year as the prospect is good for an average crop of everything. Fall wheat is almost too rank and it is feared if the rainy weather does not let up much of it will lodge. There is certain to be an abundance of feed for stock, hay being very rank. Spring grown grain never looked finer at this season of the year and has an even stand and rich color and will make an average crop if never another drop of rain falls.

The berry crop is in good condition and a large yield is expected of all kinds especially strawberries.

The prospect for all vegetable crops is good and the potato growers are happy. In all it is seldom that all conditions have been more favorable to farmers in general than this season.

Sheep and other stock are in good condition and with a heavy wool clip added to the general crop of everything the farmer of the Willamette valley has but very little to complain of.

So far as can be learned from responsible hop men the outlook for a good hop crop is very slim. The yards are very uneven and many hills are missing and many are just beginning to show life while others have grown fine. It is yet considered a very poor prospect; however the outcome may yet be satisfactory if all vermin can be kept down. It is to be hoped that by judicious spraying a quality can be grown that will make good the shortcomings.

There is a disposition among the growers to produce a fine quality which if persisted in can not but reimburse the hopmen for all their efforts in that line.

BOUNTY WARRANTS.—The annual crop of Marion county squirrel and gopher scalps is now being harvested and daily many a small boy receives a warrant from the county clerk for the same. During the month of May warrants drawn on this account by Clerk Eulen and cashed by Treasurer Brown, amounted to \$217.10.

Marion County Politics

Joint Canvass at St. Paul, Champoege and Butteville.

Rigdon and Hendricks Talk as Usual—The Little Undertaker Scores a Point Against Hob.

The Union party opened the debate at St. Paul. The first speaker was G. W. Dimick, Union candidate for senator. Mr. Dimick's two days rest had a very appreciable effect upon his powers as he appeared at his best. Mr. Dimick's line of argument was much the same as has been often reported. The other Union candidates were in turn introduced, when Frank Durbin candidate for sheriff on the Union ticket was called he came forward and read the purported letter published in the Statesman and signed W. W. E.

Mr. Durbin pronounced the so called letter "dirty disreputable fraud" that he had not received any such letter and that Mr. W. W. Elder, had not written any such letter. Then he read an affidavit from Mr. W. W. Elder in which he denounced the purported letter as an "infamous lie" gotten up by some would-be politicians to injure the prospects of Mr. Durbin's elections.

The Republicans came on next and consumed the time without raising any new questions. Five minutes was then allotted to Mr. H. L. Bents, Union candidate for representative and during the five minutes a hornets nest was stirred up to such an extent that the fighting qualities of the two chairmen were again tested. Mr. Bents read again his statements as to the state warrants drawing interest.

Mr. Chairman Hendricks arose and stated that the warrants do not draw interest from the date on which they are stamped "not paid for the want of funds." At Jefferson Mr. Hendricks stated that warrants were not being drawn to any considerable extent and so stamped. But now since Mr. Bents has stated from semi-official sources that two hundred and fifty thousand dollars of warrants have been so drawn and stamped. Mr. Hendricks takes a tack and declares that these warrants will not draw interest and many of them will not be paid. Chairman Rigdon then wanted to know who was buying these worthless warrants and Mr. Bents brought out the facts that Rex Davis, Mr. Hendricks' secretary had bought tens of thousands of these warrants for a rich banking company whose able attorney has advised the company on this point.

Mr. Hendricks attempted to explain the supreme court decision in the mandamus case against Secretary of State Kincaid and then assayed to criticize the supreme court and set forth what the decision should have been and how it should be and would be construed.

Chairman Rigdon then arose and said he would stake his reputation for the future upon the prophecy that all these warrants will be paid in full both principal and interest. Mr. Hendricks then arose and staked his reputation upon the prophecy that these warrants will not all be paid. It is perfectly astonishing to see to what length these Republicans will go to cover up the fact that the state is being defrauded out of \$40,000 per year, while the treasury is hiding from view more than \$800,000 of the people's money.

The meetings at Champoege and Butteville were both well attended in spite of the heavy rain which fell in these parts nearly all the afternoon and evening.

The Union candidates will all run well in this end of the county, as the voters seem in earnest for a new deal all round. In all three of the meetings today the greatest interest has been manifested whenever any speaker touched upon court house matters.

Mr. Bents, Union candidate for representative, lives in Butteville precinct, where he seems to be very popular with the people.

This is the first time Mr. Bents has ever appeared in politics and no doubt would have declined the nomination had he been present at the convention which placed him before the people.

He is a young man of fine appearance and pleasant manners, almost handsome and when he has served the people a few years in a representative capacity his movements will become easy and graceful—There will be an out come to Henry L. Bents in which the people of Butteville will take pride and the whole county be honored.
