THE POLITICAL REVOLUTION.

Whichever way the election goes in Oregon, June 8, there is bound to be a political revolution. If the state is carried by the Fusion forces for the state and legislative tickets then there will be a movement here as there has been in Washington in the direction of government for the masses and the poorer classes of people. The sinecures and commissions and soft snaps will go by the board to a wholesale extent. There will be a transfer of the burdens of government upon the privileges and franchises and there will be some enjoyment of the benefits and honors by the people who have virtually been shut out for twenty years.

If the Republicans win there will be a return to the ring rule and extravagance that was overthrown four years ago when the better elements of Republicanism asserted themselves. The predatory class led by the Mitchell-McBride-McElroy elements will resume the reins of government. The legislative rioting in public plunder will be resumed and the state will have a dismal outlook for the producer and taxpayer so far as state and county government can impose unnecessary burdens and lead to the corruption of the masses of the people by extravagance and creation of jobs for the benefit of the party.

If the fusionists shall have the legislature or even the lower house and the Republicans the state offices, there will be a prolonged struggle between the opposing elements of reform and reaction. The result will not be as favorable as if one side or the other had gained a decided victory for the reform elements will not be able to carry out their remedial program and the Republicans will be in a position to say they prevented us from doing anything. Whatever the result of the election the JOURNAL will labor to get the best possible result for the people. If the fusionists go in we shall labor to have them pursue a conservative course without any compromise of reform principles, feeling sure that is the best way to build up a permanent reform government. If the Republicans go in the JOURNAL will labor to advance the success of any measure or policy of administration that shall be fraught with the smallest concessions to the dangerous classes of that party.

Mr. Gear closed the Republican campaign for governor in Union, Or. Shall he return home as a conquering hero?

There was not the usual amount of betting on Republican success.

CHANDLER'S PLEA FOR SILVER.

Amendment Demanding That It Be Given Fair Treatment.

In the United States senate, Chandler, of New Hampshire, Silver Republican, in discussing the revenue bill, said that the majority of the finance committee would insist upon its proposition to coin the silver seigniorage, and that the Republican minority would press its bond proposition, thought it proper to offer some remarks upon an amendment he had offered to the pending bill. The amendment follows:

"And it is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States not to commit the country more thoroughly to the gold standard, but that the efforts of the government in all its branches shall be steadily directed to secure and maintain the use of silver as well as gold as standard money, with the free coinage of both under a system of bimetalism which will insure the parity in value of the two metals, furnish a sufficient volume of metallic money and give immunity to the world of trade from the violent fluctuations in exchange."

Referring to the general feature of the bill, Senator Chandler declared that the opponents of the existing war should not be allowed to make it unpopular by the infliction upon the people of onerous and ill-advised taxation. He urged that it was better to wait the developments of the war before making extensive provisions for it. A few months hence, he thought it would be far easier than it now is to determine what amount of taxation should be levied.

Senator Chandler announced his opposition to the issue of legal tender notes. In his opinion however, the proposed coinage of the silver seigniorage was an entirely different thing. He saw advantages that would accrue to the country from the coin version of the seigniorage into money, and not the least danger. He was not favorably impressed with 10-year 3 per cent bonds, as the cheapest way of raising needed funds for the prosecution of the war.

Senator Chandler then began a discussion of the financial situation in which he opposed the gold standard and advocated bimetalism.

In the course of a discussion of the administration's effort to secure bimetalism, Senator Chandler criticized Secretary Gage sharply for the position he had assumed in attempting irrevocably to commit the administration to the gold standard and criticized his hostility to silver and international bimetalism.

Speaking of the action on the Teller resolution, which reaffirmed the Stanley-Matthews silver resolution, he said that Secretary Gage had supporters in the Republican party. He said that at the head of those who voted for the Matthews resolution in the house was William McKinley, now president, and in the senate, William B. Allison, of Iowa. He thought it remarkable that what was true and honest 20 years ago was true but dishonest now.

Senator Chandler said the Republican party did not hesitate to reorganize the supreme court in order to assert the right of the United States to issue irredeemable paper money. He reviewed the various decisions of the supreme court on this subject and said that the national honor was not in danger by free coinage of silver if it was not endangered by the issue of papers.

A concurrent resolution directing the commission appointed to codify the criminal laws of the United States to prepare and submit to congress a code of civil procedure for the district of Alaska, which had been slightly amended by the house of representatives, was concurred in.

THE SLUMP IN MAY WHEAT.

The great Letter combination on May wheat has gone to pieces and the market will now resume natural conditions. Larger crops are reported from the great competing wheat regions and yet we are not afraid of the price going to anywhere near the low level of prices that has prevailed for the past five years. The era of lowest prices is over and if the Republican congress will hasten an agreement on a revenue bill and get it into working order there is no reason why business shall not resume normal proportions and continue so until fall or perhaps for a year or more. A glance at the circumstances under which the May wheat corner went down is of interest. It is only fully detailed in the Eastern press.

A special, May 31, says of the close of the May deal: "The session saw the close of perhaps the greatest wheat deal in the annals of the grain business. The May option, which left off Saturday at \$1.75, ranged to-day between \$1.40 and \$1.25, closing at the lower figure, a loss of 50 cents a bushel. The slump in May coupled with bearish statistics, enormous world's shipments and bright corn prospects, caused a severe decline of the different futures in wheat. At the close, a loss of 60¢ was shown in July and 20¢ in September.

The demand in the wheat pit was from shorts, who took advantage of the break to buy in and secure profits. July had a sensational decline, during which some longs sold out. It started at from \$1.01 to \$1.02 and was offered now from \$1.01, half a cent at each trade until it had dropped to 94¢. It recovered a portion of the decline later with a little help from Leiter, May, which closed Saturday at \$1.75, opened at \$1.40 and quickly dropped to \$1.25 in the first few minutes. The evident intention was to make a price for the heavy receipts that were offered in the sample market.

The trade was confined to Leiter brokers, who were both buyers and sellers and made what price they chose. A well known statistician estimated the wheat crops of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas, at 100,000 bushels, against 85,000,000 bushels last year. The crop news at home and abroad could hardly have been more bearish. The world's shipments last week were enormous, showing that wheat was being pressed for sale the world over. The India movement was a surprise, that country having shipped about 3,000,000 bushels, and Russia put about more than America. The visible increased nearly 600,000 bushels, where a small decrease was expected.

In every county of the state the ballots were printed just as they were sent out by the secretary of state as the law provides. But in Marion Chairman Hendricks and his advisory board put the congressman first. He did not wish his readers to forget Mr. Veatch. He changed the political title of all the Union candidates, turning them right around, so as to create all the confusion possible. Mr. Hendricks may have been serving the ends of justice. He may have been serving the devil and violating law; but no one doubts he was serving his party and deserves his reward.

Secretary of War Wants Only Privates From Oregon.

Under the above heading the Cottage Grove Messenger says:

The second call for 75,000 volunteers raised hopes in the breasts of many men in Oregon that they would have an opportunity to get in on it and serve with a newly organized regiment but it begins to look now as though those hopes might be dashed, and that all Oregon would get to do under the second call would be to send a few hundred recruits to the regiment now on the way to Manila. Oregon responded to the first call with more men than the department asked for and now the secretary of war wants Oregon to send a lot more privates, but will furnish officers from the east. This is not proving satisfactory. Oregon will respond with another regiment if it is wanted, but wants to furnish officers as well as privates.

The New York world says on the Subject of "the Civilian Appointments." The military school at West Point was forced on an unwilling civilian government as the result of the humiliating record of our army in the war of 1812 against Great Britain. In the two important wars since then, the Mexican war and the war of the Rebellion, the value of West Point thoroughness and training has been demonstrated by every test that could be applied. It has shown that it is a science of which the requirements have grown steadily more and more exacting with the improvements made in its appliances and methods, and yet, when brought face to face today with the stern and merciless requirements of war, the government deliberately repudiates all West Point precedents and shows its contempt for every West Point method and requirement by the wholesale appointments to high rank in the army of civilians devoid alike of natural ability and military training, and gives important rank to incompetents whose promotion has been secured avowedly by political pull, social influence and personal favoritism. The government has a full complement of captains and lieutenants, educated in their profession, who have grown gray in the service of their country, who are competent and fit to fill these positions, and to whom the promotion naturally belongs, in ignoring their claims and in giving appointments to the worthless scions of politician and to merely rich dawdlers who seek a commission for decorative purposes only, the government has not merely reversed and repudiated its own military system, but shows that it has failed to learn the lesson which that system has taught it in every time of trial.

THE JOURNAL is not convinced that there will be a short hop crop. As the matter now stands the outlook is excellent for about two-thirds of a full crop, but all of standard grade hops—that is, a larger crop of first than usual. The growth of vines is lighter but there will be almost no lice or mildew as a result unless there are weather conditions especially productive of those pests. Look out for a 12 to 14 cent price.

The campaign at times threatened to get warm in Multnomah county. Sunday the Oregonian was advising the possible necessity of calling out the militia.

THE JOURNAL made the best fight against the opposition that it was capable of making. That is the duty of a newspaper in politics. We tried to conduct a clean fight confined to a discussion of the official records of the candidates. Having done that the verdict must be left to the people and we shall publish the best war paper that can be printed for 25 cents a month. Now we've whipped one another let's whip the Spaniards.

Now let's build up Oregon awhile and begin with Yaquina bay.

Eugene talks of celebrating the Fourth of July in regular old fashioned manner. We look for a great revival of patriotic demonstrations on account of the Cuban war of liberation. Salem, the capital of Oregon, will not fall behind, but there should be deliberate planning embracing all the elements of our people. Salem is too big for any more one-sided or half-way management of public matters.

THE RIVAL FORCES.

Two Big Political Demonstrations Saturday Night.
Saturday night was a red letter period in the political annals of Salem. Big demonstrations were held by both the Union and Republican forces. The plutocrats held their meeting in the opera house and had speeches by candidate McCulloch, Charles Moores, Gates of Portland and a retired actor named Rasmus of the same city and was concluded with a humorous address by J. Adam Bede, of Duluth.

Hon. John P. Fay, of Washington and Hon. H. L. Barkley were the orators at the Union meeting held at the armory and were listened to by an audience of enthusiastic voters. In fact both halls were full and standing room was at a premium at both the armory and the opera house. Each party had a band which started from the Willamette hotel. The Republicans discovered that nearly all the crowd was going to the Union meeting and had their band march by the Armory and play some patriotic pieces with the hope of catching some of the crowd; but it didn't work and there was an overflow crowd at the Armory doors large enough to have filled a quarter hall.

"FORTY LIARS AND OTHER LIES."
Candidate McCulloch, Earl Race and the magnum quartette filled out the first hour at the opera house. McCulloch told the crowd that he had made just 40 speeches, suggestive of Bob Burdett's story "40 Liars and other lies" and Earl Race read a long speech from manuscript. Then came a man named Gates, from Portland, who began by telling stories that were rather off color. He said Lentz was a socialist and Sovereign was an anarchist and that the Union people were minute men and hired assassins.

HAMLET'S GHOST.
Mr. Gates was followed by a retired bar-monger, an ex-theaterian named Rasmus, who started the country in the role of Hamlet's ghost. The ghost wouldn't walk and he went into Portland ward politics.

CHARLEY MOORES.
The Honorable C. B. Moores was the next speaker. He spent most of his time in talking about the CAPITAL JOURNAL, which he said was a wicked sheet that should not be read in Sunday school. More music was indulged in and then there was a great final windup of Hon. J. Adam Bede of Minnesota.

BRAND NEW JOKES.
Who told a lot of brand new jokes and utterly ignored politics as he did on the previous occasion. Adam dont dare be as funny as he can, for fear it might strike in and prove fatal.

COMPARED WITH WASHINGTON
At the Armory Hon. John P. Fay of Washington, made one of the most eloquent and forceful speeches of the whole campaign. He compared the administration of public affairs in his own state under Union rule, with the Republican management in Oregon and pointed out the difference to the taxpayers with telling effect. He had the sympathy and encouragement of the immense audience from start to finish and was cheered to the echo.

SLANDERS REFUTED.
Hon. H. L. Barkley who by his fearless advocacy of popular rights has ever been the idol of the people made an inimitable address. He reviewed the entire situation and refuted the base slanders which the Statesman had published about him.

ALL LIES.
These statements he said were lies manufactured out of the whole cloth. These slanders will evidently prove to be boomerangs as it could be seen Saturday night that both Republicans and Union people were disgusted at the base slanders of the Statesman.

HERO HOBSON.

What the Naval Officials Say About Him.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Assistant Naval Constructor H. L. Ferguson has known the hero of the Merrimac exploit at Santiago, for a number of years, and when seen, had the following to say of him:
"Richmond Pearson Hobson entered the naval academy in 1885, when only 15 years of age, and was at the head of his class each of the four years at the academy. His life at Annapolis was not very happy.

Another account has this to say: Richmond P. Hobson, the hero of the Merrimac occurrence, is an assistant naval constructor, attached to the staff, and, therefore, not engaged in line duty. He entered the naval academy from Alabama, in May 1885, and is now 28 years of age. He graduated in 1889 at the head of his class and, as a consequence of this distinction, was sent to France by the government to take a course in naval architecture in pursuance of a policy to give a few cadets of the highest standing an opportunity to acquire the highest possible knowledge. He entered the Polytechnique and returned to the United States in 1893.

He served in the bureau of construction at Washington, and then went to the navy yard at New York. Later he served with Admiral Bance, on the Atlantic station, and then went to the naval academy to take charge of a post graduate course of instruction in naval construction. When the war broke out he applied for active duty, and was sent, with three naval cadets under his charge, to the flagship of Admiral Sampson's squadron. He is described as of a tall athletic build, very quiet and unassuming in manner, and would not be picked out ordinarily as having the high bravery his intimate associates knew lay behind that quiet demeanor.

"No one who knows him well will be surprised at his grand exhibition of bravery at Santiago, and he probably had a hand in originating the scheme. He secured, through Secretary Herbert, the adoption of a regulation to the effect that assistant naval constructors may be sent to sea when practicable, and was the first to go. When the war broke out, Hobson applied for sea duty for himself and the three cadets at Annapolis who were taking a post-graduate course in naval architecture under him, and was immediately sent to the flagship New York. Admiral Sampson was superintendent at the academy when Hobson was a cadet, and so knew that no better man for the duty could be found.

To show the activity of Hobson's mind, when at Paris studying ship-building and engineering at the naval college of France, he found time to also take a course of lectures in literature and psychology. He is a nephew of Richmond Pearson, a prominent Republican representative from North Carolina, and descended from the Richmond Pearsons of North Carolina, of whom there have been five, two of them governors of the state. He is very talkative, and is a free-silverite, and when not too political in his conversation, is popular.

"He is now at the head of the list of assistant naval constructors, and will undoubtedly be promoted at once to the rank of naval constructor."
