ELECTION IN SALEM.

The Very Best Weather and a Medium Vote Being Polled.

The weather today was fine although it was a trifle warm. Everything passed off quietly, no particular excitement noted during the day. Both parties are working hard and the full vote of each faction will no doubt be cast before the polls close. The Union people were out bright and early and did faithful work throughout the day in bringing voters to the polls. The result of their labors will be seen in the material reduction of the usual Republican majority in the ten Salem precincts when the votes are counted.

The Republicans had the finest of livery rigs but the Union people carried many voters, as vehicles for transporting voters, they used the agriculturalists' rigs and brought many a working man to the polls in his shirt sleeves.

At the polls but very little stir was noticeable. In South Salem precinct a youthful voter was challenged, it being claimed he had not yet reached his majority but he swore his vote in. In Salem No. 4 two electors were rejected by reason of being outside their respective precincts. The vote of Frank Savage, brother of John Savage, Jr., was challenged by Earl Race. It was claimed that Mr. Savage has no fixed residence here. The judges sustained Mr. Race and Mr. Savage did not swear in his vote. He (Savage) has been in the state for the past ten months and for about six months has been located at Salem, where he has been purchasing and shipping hay and cattle, by reason of which he thought himself entitled to vote. Mr. Savage also has large mining interests in this state.

In Ward 2, Herman Gotz was challenged but swore in his vote. A second man was challenged but the challenge was withdrawn when the man's identity had been established. This is the ward in which the hobo element is usually voted but no attempt was made to swear in that organization today.

STEAMBOAT MEN.
Captain Bell and two deck hands of the steamer Ruth came up and voted, but when Seth Wade of the Union force called with a carriage for the balance of the crew Capt. Bell was very short, and refused to let them go. It is believed he and the two voted the Republican ticket, and knowing all the rest to be Union men would not let them off.

Chief of Police A. C. Dille, who is suffering from rheumatism was brought to the polling place in Ward 3, in a buggy. His friends requested that he be allowed to vote while in the vehicle, but the judges refused to grant the concession and he was taken inside, where he cast his ballot.

AT WOODBURN.
WOODBURN, June 6.—Special, A lively contest is on, and the Union men are standing up for their ticket like heroes. Lawyer Eby this morning had an altercation with S. Tomlinson, and struck the latter, who readily stopped him, and the little pettifogger was soon put to rest. Woodburn precinct will be close.

PORTLAND, June 6.—Special contrary to expectation the election is passing off reasonably quiet. A lighter vote than was expected is being cast, and the Union people feel confident of a greatly reduced Republican majority.

that it makes much difference what I do. I have a fair chance of life either way. If our dingy gets shot to pieces we shall then try to swim for the beach, right under Morro castle. We shall keep together at all hazards. Then we may be able to make our way along shore and perhaps get back to the ship. We shall fight the sentries or a squad until the last and we shall only surrender to overwhelming numbers and our surrender will only take place as a last and as a most un- contemplated emergency.

Lieutenant, Hobson might have been lecturing to a class of cadets on the theory of how to build ships, so deliberate was his manner. He was lately at Annapolis in charge of the post-graduate course in naval construction and is accounted one of the most able naval constructors in the service, being entirely wrapped up in his profession.

Landing of Troops.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Yesterday was the quietest Sunday at the navy department since the outbreak of the war. No dispatches had come overnight, and it was said that none were expected.

The situation at Santiago is such, in the opinion of the officials, that no startling developments are to be expected immediately, and the next news that is to be looked for from that quarter is of the arrival of troops. As far as can be gathered, in spite of all reports to the contrary, these troops have not yet started, and the naval officials are impatiently awaiting for the movement.

It is possible that a small advance has gone forward, but it is felt here that even that composed of an engineer battalion with a siege train is still lying at Key West.

There is much dissatisfaction expressed at the slowness of the movements in the South, owing in large part to the slender means of transportation and the difficulty encountered in getting anything done down there in a hurry.

In army circles, it seems to be expected that Sampson is to furnish a sufficient force to convoy the troop transports, but it is not known whether there are enough ships to supply this force from the squadron now off Santiago, or whether he will call upon Commodore Watson, off Havana, to perform this work.

Adjutant-General Corbin was hard at work at his desk in telegraphic correspondence with army officers in all parts of the country, and particularly regarding the Spanish military prisoners, from whom selections will be made for exchange for the gallant little band that sunk the Merrimac. The commanding officer at Fort McPherson has furnished the department of a full list of the captives to facilitate the work of exchange.
