SAM HAYDEN ELECTED.
Hayden's vote is not yet final. He loses Tillamook by 230, carries Linn by about 200, Polk by 52. He is very close in Yamhill, and carries Marion by about 400.

So far as counted Hon. H. L. Barkley has a majority of 100 over L. L. Porter for joint senator, in Clackamas county. It is not believed that his majority in Clackamas will overcome the majority against him in Marion. Judge Boise's friends are hopeful that he may pull up to the winning place on the ticket.

CANVASSING BOARD:
The board for canvassing the vote of the county is composed of Justice H. A. Johnson, of Salem, Justice Hays, of Woodburn, and a deputy clerk, J. B. F. Giesy.

The work was begun at 1 o'clock and will consume several days. Owing to the close majority of Mr. Durbin for sheriff the board has deemed it best to ask the contesting candidates to have representatives present at the canvass, and Mr. Durbin has named Messrs. F. N. Derby and W. T. Rigdon, Rex W. Davis was present for Mr. Wain when the ballots were being counted.

LONDON, June 8.—The report of the repulse of American forces while trying to land at Santiago is denied by a Times special.

One Less.
MADRID, June 8.—It is officially admitted that the Spanish warship Reina Mercedes was sunk at Santiago Monday. Five sailors and 29 marines on deck were killed.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Reina Mercedes is the name of the Spanish torpedo boat destroyer sunk Monday night at Santiago. Five sailors and 29 marines were killed.

Warship at Manila.
VICTORIA, B. C., June 8.—The steamer Empress of Japan brings news of the arrival at Manila of five additional warships.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—The West Indian papers are publishing that the Spanish torpedo boat destroyer sank Monday night off Santiago.

Signed by the President.
WASHINGTON, June 8.—The bill for the removal of all political disabilities arising from the civil war is now a law, President McKinley having formally approved it.

Reported Repulse.
LONDON, June 8.—The correspondent of the Times, at Havana says the Americans attempted to land at Aguadores, but were repulsed.

CITY COUNCIL DEAD-LOCK.
No Quorum Owing to Non-Attendance of Members.

Last evening was the time for the regular session of the city council, but owing to the non-attendance of Messrs. Hunt, Graham and Smith no quorum could be secured, as Mr. Buren is absent from the state. The last regular meeting was thwarted in the same manner, and the reason given by the absent members is that the business of the city is not being conducted in a business-like manner. Some claims against the city are coming up for allowance which these gentlemen claim are not valid, for the reason that they were contracted in an irregular manner.

At the last meeting held a resolution was passed empowering the street committee to contract joint county bridges to the amount of \$200 without bids or authority from the council. When this resolution was voted upon Messrs Buren and Smit walked out from behind the bar and refused to vote, but it was carried with Hunt and Graham voting no.

These men are earnestly endeavoring to work in the interests of the city, as they see it, but many citizens are of the opinion that they should either attend the meetings of the council and there use their best efforts for success, or resign their positions and let the people deal with the matter.
