## THE JUNE ELECTION.

### Returns Show Many Victories for Union.

### THE VOTE IN MANY COUNTIES.

### People's Union Carries Ticket in Some Republican Counties.

In Marion the Union ticket gave pluralities for sheriff, district attorney and one circuit judge. A survey of the field after the Oregon election last Monday shows that the Union party will have a strong minority in both houses of the legislature, and has elected a number of judicial and county officers.

It is not too early to discuss the question, shall the People's Union remain a permanent factor in Oregon politics? We believe the welfare of the people, in the hands of a government requires it. If the Union has good leadership in the legislature it can make a record that will make it strong for the future.

The Union had one fatal defect—a great many men forced themselves onto the ticket who were not strong with the people. A reform party must have men who stand for reform in their own lives and records or its sincerity will be discredited by its own voters. Only by making nominations by direct vote of the people can the people's choice of candidates be secured.

There could none but good strong candidates be elected on the Union ticket this year, men of more than average ability and intelligence, men who will make good officials, and who will make a good record for the people. Such men will be worth more for the upbuilding of the Union cause, than a majority that would make a bad record.

Wherever the Union party had good candidates who went before the people and discussed their platform, they ran ahead and nearly all such were elected. This shows that the party had merit and that the people were not afraid to trust it on state and county issues. If Barkley could have been in the canvass a month he would have been elected.

It is charged by a Republican paper that in Benton county 400 votes openly offered themselves for sale. It is not probable that the Union party bought many, as they conducted a very economical campaign. On the county ticket the Union carried some hitherto Republican counties, as Polk and Lincoln. In the latter the Union ticket secured the judge, clerk, commissioner, surveyor and coroner, and came within eight votes of getting the assessor. The Republicans have secured the sheriff, treasurer, school superintendent and assessor.

The State Union campaign committee made a splendid fight and Messrs. Sheridan, Williams and Smith, with the local committees, deserve a public vote of thanks from the people for forcing a clean campaign of principle, and for conducting the opposition battle under great difficulties.

Both Kincaid and Dunbar proved strong for secretary of state, each carrying his own county by about 500 ahead of his ticket. Following is result of some of the counties not heretofore published:

**DOUGLAS COUNTY.**  
went strong for the Union. Not over 8500 votes were cast, a falling off of over 500 since the presidential election of '96. Most of the other counties in the state show a much larger decrease than does Douglas.

**JOSEPHINE COUNTY.**

It will be thus seen that the union ticket carried the day on all the offices, save county judge, sheriff and clerk.

**LANE COUNTY.**  
The Guard says: The Union party should have elected the entire Lane county ticket. But a union of different political forces, although essentially the same on political issues, cannot be accomplished without some friction and loss of strength. Thus it came about that the splendid majority of 377 for Bryan was displaced by a counter majority of about 50. But all these votes were not lost by changes. What we consider trustworthy reports show that a considerable majority of the stay at home vote was union in sentiment.

Mr. Axtell was a delegate to the Union state convention, but ran as an independent.

**MALHEUR COUNTY.**  
So far as heard, the fusion ticket has prevailed and it is generally conceded that every one of the fusion candidates, with the possible exception of coroner, will be elected; but in a few instances it will require the official count to decide, as the vote from several precincts has not been received in full. The fusion state ticket will carry the county by from 50 to 75 majority.

**BARNEY COUNTY.**  
The Union elects, clerk, sheriff, assessor, school supt., surveyor and coroner. Republicans, clerk, commissioner and treasurer. Clifford will receive about 225 majority and Hicks 80 to 100.

**BAKER COUNTY.**  
The Unionists elect their entire county ticket, with the exception of sheriff. Kilburn was defeated by about 50 majority. G. W. E. Grace for representative received 50 majority and Wm. Smith for joint senator 300. Clifford's majority in the district is estimated at 300. Wm. Miller is elected district attorney by probably 75 in the district.
