AN OPPOSITION PARTY.

The returns show that the Union of Reform forces against the Republicans in Oregon elected about 120 legislative, judicial and county officers. These constitute in Oregon the only opposition party to the Republicans who are to be in full power for another term of four years.

This opposition party in county and state legislation can do a great work for the people by pursuing a well defined program in the interest of the people. These men should sternly oppose all unconstitutional measures and all extravagance in public affairs. They should not participate in illegal practices now in existence. Corruptions in power always offer the man of the other party a share in "the boodle" if he will only take it and keep still about it. A true reform will not share in the prevailing corruption.

An opposition party must make a better record than the one in power. This it can easily do and thus create an unfavorable contrast with the fellows who stand in for all the abuses. No reform member of the legislature or county government is worthy of the name who comes to Salem and falls in with all the existing evil practices.

A true reform and opposition party need not necessarily vote against all measures simply because a Republican introduces them. There are many good and true men in the Republican party who desire good government and deserve to be upheld in their efforts. They will be opposed by the predatory jackals who scour the back alleys and cemeteries of public affairs day and night to find crumbs and offal to devour. In state, city, county and school elections the people unite against these whenever they clearly recognize them. It is the duty of the opposition to present a solid front at all times in the cause of government.

AN ELECTION CONTEST.

In the judicial district two judges were to be elected. Four were candidates and each voter was required to mark two candidates as his choice, although many did not do this. Many marked only one, either ignorantly thinking only one was to be elected, or else with design, intending to defeat one of the Republican or Union candidates.

The result was very close between P. H. D'Arcy and R. P. Boise and in Marion county the returns from the precinct canvassing boards were counted by the county canvassing board three times. On the last count the tallies showed a majority of six in the district for Mr. D'Arcy. On the first count the outcome seemed to be in his favor but errors were discovered that gave it to Boise.

The Marion county canvassing board decided to adhere to the second count which gave it to Mr. Boise. One of the judges or canvassers of the county returns has made a statement which, if not contradicted, brings in appearance of fraud. The whole matter will now no doubt be investigated and the facts made known.

Mr. D'Arcy's many friends will heartily approve of his beginning a contest in the courts to establish his claims. He believes he is elected and he has sense of honor as a public man and an attorney dictates his action in bringing a contest. If it had gone the other way probably Mr. Boise would have taken the matter into the courts.

Such a controversy cannot be tried in the columns of a newspaper and we shall withhold all comment on the merits of the case and ask all our readers to suspend judgment until all the facts have been made known and judicially determined. If fraud has been committed let those guilty be punished, although that is almost too much to hope for.

THREE DAYS AT TURNER.

Notes and Personals on the Big Christian Church Campmeeting. SATURDAY MORNING.

Late arrivals on the Camp grounds are Elder Wm. Cowden, general missionary for the northwest, Benjamin L. Smith and wife of Cincinnati, general secretary of the home board; Rev. Judge Caton and wife of Sprague, Washington, are on the grounds. Old residents of Salem will remember Judge Caton as he resided in Salem many years, and is well known to most Marion county people.

Another visitor for the camping season is Uncle "Joe" Downer who has been a familiar figure at the camp meetings of the Christian church since '52. Salem people will remember him as "Saddler Joe" Downer. His home is now, and has been for a number of years in North Yakima but as the time rolls round for camping he hitches up and drives over, staying through the entire season.

Rev. A. McLean, of Cincinnati, O., arrived on the overland Saturday night. He was introduced to the convention and received with the Chau-tauqua salute. Rev. McLean is greatly beloved by the whole brotherhood, he having served for sixteen years as corresponding secretary of the Foreign board.

THE JOURNAL Reporter was pleased to meet on the grounds Eld. J. Charles Dowling, pastor of the Medical Lake Church and also business manager of the Spokesman Review, at Spokane, Wash. Eld. Dowling is a very pleasant gentleman to meet and a thorough newspaper man.

SUNDAY'S ITEMS.
Sunday dawned clear and cloudless and the entire camp was astir early. Everything took on a certain air of expectancy and preparation for a great day. Before eight o'clock the gatekeepers were admitting teams and by ten o'clock the grounds were fairly alive with a moving mass of people. Wagons, carriages, buggies, carts, bikes, on foot, on horseback and in every kind of conveyance they came from the surrounding country, cities and towns and when the great bell rang out the hour for Sunday school, at 10 o'clock, a beautiful sight was presented in the Turner S. Schools marching in a body to attend. The one to the great tabernacle the superintendent was Eld. Gentry Rushing, of La Grande, and a pleasant and profitable hour was spent in studying the lesson for the day. At exactly 11 o'clock the bell, ever a faithful reminder, called the vast crowd to the church services. The large choir under the efficient leadership of Prof. J. M. Powell, of Monmouth, led the singing the vast congregation joining in.

Dean Sanderson read the Bible lesson in his own inimitable way. Every boy always enjoys all that Elder Sanderson does. Rev. Siskafoose, president of the board, then stepped to the platform and in a few well chosen remarks introduced Rev. A. McLean, secretary of the foreign board, who delivered the sermon and the entire time he held that vast audience in close attention, while he drew such vivid word pictures as charmed all under the sound of his voice, and when at the close of that grand sermon he gave the invitation, as is the custom of the Christian church, a gentleman and lady came forward and made the confession, Rev. Boles of The Dalles, explaining to the audience that they were Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Allen, of Woods, Or., a minister of the M. E. church, they were immediately baptized in the clear water of the creek. Before the close of the service, however, Benj. L. Smith, secretary of the home board, who was to address the afternoon meeting, was introduced. An adjournment was then taken to

the water, where the ordinance of baptism was performed. Many who came for the day brought lunches and families and friends could be seen in groups here and there, any place we would look, enjoying themselves in the cool shadows of the grove. The restaurant did a rushing business and when inquiry was made of some who had patronized it we found that all declared the dinner the finest ever set on the grounds at a restaurant, and when the ladies were interviewed as to whether they had done well, they said: "Should think we have. We are eaten out of house and home and will have to get a new supply."

It is estimated that fully four thousand people were on the grounds. The receipts at the gate were \$100 and the number of campers far exceeds any number had on the first Sunday there being 50 campers.

Mr. Porter of Aumsville counted the bicycles on the ground and informed us there were 200, and that the number of wagons etc., would also make that number.

The afternoon service is generally moving and restless, but Benj. Smith is the man who can hold them and he fully demonstrated that fact on this occasion. After the sermon the president called to the platform Rev. J. J. Evans the popular pastor of the Salem church who is a new man in the state and was a stranger to the convention, and pleasantly introduced him to the audience. Rev. Evans did not know that he was being called to the platform for that and as he is very quiet and retiring, naturally was not a little embarrassed but the people were glad to see and know Elder Evans and they will have a chance to hear him on Sunday next at 11 o'clock.

At 4 o'clock communion service was held, to which all Christians were invited.

The Endeavor society was held at 7 o'clock, led by Miss Della Osborne of Salem. The service following was again addressed by Benj. L. Smith who delights his hearers at all hours.

This passed a happy busy and profitable spent Sunday. The crowds had soon all gone to their distant homes and quiet reigned in the camp ground. Many familiar faces were beheld in the vast crowd as well as hundreds of strange ones. Some of whom we wish to tell you of later on. Every one is delighted to hear that Elder J. W. Webb of Fresno, Cal., will be here and deliver the address, Temperance Rally day, July 2nd.

MONDAY MORNING.
The clouds are threatening rain but the campers are astir early; 5 o'clock does not find many campers asleep the morning devotion over and there is a hurried preparation to get things in out of the rain, soon a gentle mist is falling, purifying the air and refreshing everyone. The sun came out in all its beauty and chased the clouds and as they roll away to the mountain side on either hand the great bell rings out the hour of Dean Sanderson's Bible class. A good attendance was had, and the hour of 10, announced the business session of the O. C. M. C.

President Siskafoose in the chair. The committee on enrollment was the first one announced, Miss Majors, Miss Mulkey, Miss Roy.

The recording secretary having moved away from the state, Rev. C. A. Dodson, of Pendleton, was appointed for the session. Following this came reports from district secretaries; and an address on "Fields and Workers," by Benj. L. Smith. THE JOURNAL Reporter enjoyed this address very highly and from it we glean some of the following facts: The Christian ch. has made the most marvelous growth of any church of the world.

They increase at the rate of 1000 members per week, received on an average of five preachers per week from other denominations, build three houses per week. In the year 1820 the membership was 500; in 1858 it was 10,883; in the year 1886, when Campbell died, they had 250,000; in 1876 350,000, in 1886 650,000; in 1896 1,051,000. Showing a marvelous growth for a religious body.

Regular business was taken up in the afternoon and at 3:45 an address by A. McLean, "Supplying the Lord's Treasury" was a masterly effort. The evening session was addressed by Frank Powell, pastor of McMinville church.
