PENNSYLVANIA POLITICS.

Mr. Wanamaker recently made a speech in Philadelphia in which he declared: "All through the two days preceding the convention I held in my pocket a signed letter offering to deliver to me for cash a certain number of votes to give me a majority in the convention for any candidate I wanted." Why did he not make this known at the time? Perhaps the letter meant what it said. Perhaps it was a trap set to catch Honest John.

Mr. Wanamaker further said: "Mr. Charles W. Stone could have been nominated if he had bought back his missing votes."

The Philadelphia Record does not question the truth of the statements, but invites Mr. Wanamaker to publish that letter. He does not do so.

The San Francisco Bulletin cynically comments that Mr. Wanamaker has been charged with getting a contract for 200,000 pairs of army shoes at a 20 per cent. advance over the prices of manufacturers at San Francisco. Let us hope he will furnish better shoes than they might have done.

Rev. Dr. Swallow, the prohibition candidate for governor, of Pennsylvania, continues to furnish evidence of the corruption practiced under Quay rule. His last charge is that two state officers, who had charge of the refitting of a building for temporary use by the legislature, made out bills against the state for lumber at \$55 per 1000 feet, while they paid for it only \$24 per thousand. The doctor called this to the attention of the attorney-general, but that official paid no attention to it. This is only one instance of the fraud on the part of the Quay officials.

Quay keeps silent and saws wood. Meanwhile the Quay brethren continue to be much exercised over the wickedness of Tammany.

SUMMER DIET.

There are great advantages in adjusting the diet to the seasons. Oregon is so rich in fruits, vegetables and fish that one needs not to import a single article to prepare most acceptable summer dishes and that too very cheaply.

Boiled and broiled meats and fish are most easily digested and with cold vegetables always work up the leanings into salads. Cheese is a good summer food and as Salem has now a factory where the finer cheeses of Europe are made, our people need not go without one of the greatest of delicacies to eat with bread—various kinds of cream cheese. The nearer you can come to spreading cheese on bread the richer and more easily digested it will be found. It need not crawl, but signs of life are not objectionable to the gourmand.

Broiled salmon is the most appetizing form of fish food in hot weather. If some fish dealer would set up a stove at his market and show his customers how to broil fish it would add greatly to his trade. It is one of the easiest and most delightful methods of preparing fish, as we have known in such richness and perfection on this coast. Salmon, trout and nearly all sea fish have the necessary oil and seasoning to be very palatable when broiled over the coals and it can be done on any ordinary stove and without causing the house to smell of grease burning in the frying pan.

Summer cooking schools are as much needed as religion. In homes where the mother is a good cook and the father takes an interest in seeing a well-supplied table, children do not supply the inmates of the penitentiary and the reform school, and not very often do they become a charge upon the taxpayers.

OREGON STATE NEWS.

Thirty-four new men enlisted at Eugene.

The Eugene cannery and dryer will be operated this season.

The Evangelical camp meeting is in session at Independence.

Circuit court is in session in Douglas county. The docket is the lightest in years.

Wheat aphid is reported as having appeared in the Lane County wheat fields.

Between 400,000 and 500,000 young steelheads were turned out in the Salmon river.

Fort Stevens artillery will participate in the Astoria Fourth of July celebration.

Z. N. Segar, of Eugene is shipping cherries East. Two carloads having now been contracted for.

A track fender fixed nearly all the bicycles between Corvallis and Albany Sunday. Tracks were scattered on the path between the two towns. Dozens of wheels were punctured.

The engineers employed by the government at Astoria have completed the work of laying cables for submarine mines, across the mouth of the Columbia river. The mines can now be put in on short notice if necessary.

GOVERNMENT WAR LOANS.

Popular Subscriptions Received at Banks and Post Offices.

Under a recent act of congress the secretary of the treasury invites subscriptions from the people for \$200,000,000 of three percent bonds, which may be obtained through any national or state bank, any money order post office or express office. The bonds will be issued in both registered and coupon forms, the coupon bonds being in denominations of \$20, \$10, \$5, \$100, \$5,000 and \$10,000.

The method of subscriptions has been made as simple as possible. Blank forms may be obtained from the above mentioned places which the subscribers may fill out and mail to the treasury department, if he chooses that method, together with his remittance covering the par value of the amount of the bonds.

That remittance may be in whatever form best suits the subscriber's convenience—in currency, bank draft, check, postoffice money order. The day the currency is received, or the day the proceeds are received from the checks, drafts, or money orders, the subscription will be entered and will immediately begin drawing interest. When the bonds are delivered, a check will accompany each delivery covering the interest at 3 per cent from the day the subscription is entered to the 1st of August, the date of the bonds, and from which the bonds will carry their own interest.

Every bank and express office in Salem and the Salem postmaster are receiving subscriptions.

No subscriptions will be received at the Treasury department later than July 1st.

Very few people in Salem have up to this time availed themselves of this opportunity but the bankers believe the subscriptions in this city will be before the time elapses reach quite a handsome sum.

While the rate of interest is low, it is a patriotic duty to subscribe for as much of the war loan as possible. Money is growing cheaper here. The Salem school board are now getting all the money they want at 6 per cent, and Director Chamberlain says he believes that the district can get all the money it wants at 5 per cent. The war loan is not undesirable for long time loans at the lower rate of interest.

TURNER CAMP MEETING.

Interesting "Proceedings of the Big Christian Gathering.

Those who attended Dean Sanderson's class speak in high terms of the benefit received from their hour's study of the Old and New Testament.

Shaw of Salem, who is a faithful and consistent member of the Church of Christ of Oregon. At 11 o'clock a grand sermon was delivered by J. W. Jenkins, of Hood River.

Promptly at 1:30 business was resumed. A short address was given by M. L. Rose of Eugene, "Our Marching Orders," followed by a grand plea for the Divinity school at Eugene, by Dean Sanderson. This school he believes before many months roll by will be upon a permanent basis. It is receiving endowments and contributions of various kinds.

This was followed by a sermon by Benj. L. Smith, who is always brimful of talk for the "Home" work. The largest attendance was had on Tuesday evening of any so far except Sunday, it being the occasion of A. McLean's lecture of his "tour around the world" and it was very interesting and instructive.

Reports were read from the auditing committee on Resolutions. Some campers have gone others are coming in there having been three new ones come in today keeping the number of campers at about 50. Wednesday is C. W. B. M. day and the President Mrs. Esson of Monmouth named her committee for that day. They have a good program and their convention bids fair to be as successful as those preceding it.

CROP CONDITION.

Now Prevailing in Parts of Western Oregon.

Conditions of crops have in the past ten days materially changed for the better, many grain fields show signs of lodging from too much moisture, though if fair weather continues from now on no great damage will have been done. Haying is in full blast and the crop was never better in the Willamette valley. In many fields clover is badly lodged and there is an abundance of feed on the ranges.

The potato crop promises to be very heavy if not injured by too much hot weather. Corn is growing rapidly and promises a good yield. Vegetables and garden truck never look better. Spring sown grain is doing fine about Marion county.

Grasses show rust in some fields, and there are a few fields where the grain aphid has done some damage, but the amount of damage done is not great. Some grain is beginning to ripen.

The wheat crop in Eastern Oregon is going to be one of the largest ever grown in yield and an average added to that will make an immense crop. Last season 12 counties harvested over 12,000,000 bushels of wheat.

This year the yield in the same territory will, in all probability, exceed that amount by 2,000,000 bushels. Haying is late in Union county and will not begin till after the fourth of July. In Sherman County there will be an enormous crop of wheat. Much hay has been spoiled by late rains.

T. S. Stipp, of Mulalla, tells in the Oregon City Press that fall grain in his neighborhood is not growing or heading, and that it seems to be infected with the wire worm.

Many farmers are seriously considering the wheat question and are at sea what to do in regard to wages for harvest hands. The fact that twice as much wheat is being raised as last year is liable to do above 20 cents per bushel and the scarcity of harvest hands will make it necessary to pay higher wages for labor and considering the very low price paid for wheat the prospect is very gloomy. Many are not going to bind their oats unless twice should be lower. The oat crop promises to be very heavy, which will make a heavy twine bill.

Hops. The conditions of the hop crop is not very much improved, though the vines are looking rich the great amount of rain will give the aphid all possible show to develop.

Reports came from Washington county that continuous wet weather has caused aphid to attack wheat same as three years ago but no great damage has been done, as yet, but many fear, should it continue rainy that great damage to crop would be done.

Most hop buyers report nearly all yards as quite lousy, but on the other hand growers do not anticipate the pest will be as bad as last year. Lice have appeared in some of the yards though not so numerous as last year at this time of the season. Many hop growers evince a disposition to pick nothing but the choicest hops and no mouldy hops whatever, thus having only a prime article to market and think in this way the formerly good reputation Oregon enjoyed for fine goods will again be restored. Not many hop men are contracting their hops this season, preferring to take their chances.

In Lane county some growers say the prospect never was better and lice are very scarce. Many are going to spray heavy and early this season and only save the best of their hops. Other reports say the recent rains have caused the lice to appear in large numbers.

It is said by some growers that with fair weather hops will make a first-class crop.

NEW YORK STATE.

There is a slow dragging trade, but prices are about the same as those that have ruled for some time. The market is very heavy. State 1897 choice hops are nominal; good to prime, 12@14; common to fair, 8@11; Pacific choice 1897 choice nominal; good to prime, 12@13; common to fair 5@10 cents; State and Pacific choice 1896 prime, 7; common to good, 4@6; old prime, 2@3 1/2.
