HONEST ELECTIONS.

Marion county has always shown an aversion to open frauds on the ballot. Minor and secret frauds have been committed frequently at the primaries and elections, but the tendency has been toward a strict observance of the law.

The growth of public sentiment is in the direction of purer elections. At the last city election the rules were enforced rigidly, and an election by one plurality has been sacredly regarded. At the last school election all the officers of election demanded that the law be most strictly construed, and only those bonafide voters who had property in the district on which they had paid a tax were allowed to vote.

In the contest over the judgeship the honor of the community is at stake. If the crimes charged have been committed, some one should be convicted and sent to the penitentiary. All know the strife among lawyers who have a judge whose car is more ready for one than for another. This is a slander in itself on the profession, and if any steps have been taken by interested parties to accomplish the election of one judge over another by unfair means in this case now being investigated at Salem, the bar owes it to the profession to find the facts and punish the crime.

Honest elections are the most precious boon of civilized society. If the outrages charged in the Boise-D'Arcy contest have been committed and no one can be brought to justice it will be an advertisement of lawlessness to the whole world that Marion county will not easily recover from it. It will be a black mark on the face of Oregon not easily effaced.

PEOPLE TERRORSTRICKEN.

The People of Manila Are Fleeing for Their Lives.

PORT TOWNSEND, June 30.—According to advices brought from Japan by the steamship Columbia, which arrived here last night, considerable indignation prevails among American sailors and officers of the fleet at Manila over the treatment of the captain of the Spanish gunboat Caliao, which sailed into Manila bay about a week after the battle and was captured by Dewey's fleet. The Spaniards claim he showed cowardice in not returning the fire of the Americans. After giving him a Spanish court-martial he was sentenced to be shot, but Commodore Dewey came to his rescue and took him under the protection of the American government.

Hundreds of people in Manila are using every effort to leave, and are offering from \$500 and \$600 each for transportation out. As the time draws near for the arrival of the United States soldiers they are becoming restless.

Another source of anxiety is in the case of the bombardment of Manila what the Spaniards will do with their women and children. They cannot be sent to the interior, as they would become the prey of the rebels. It is stated that an appeal will be made to the British consul to make arrangements for their removal in the case of bombardment.

Since entering Manila bay the American fleet has been unable to obtain fresh provisions, and the men have been living on salt fare. Notwithstanding this there is no sickness among the crews, and all are patiently waiting for orders to take possession of Manila.

The Spanish soldiers are anxious to meet the American troops in battle. They are well armed with Mauser rifles, and Captain-General Augustin says every one will fight with desperation to maintain the honor of Spain.

A Japanese paper contains an account of the adventures with rebels and Spaniards of Mr. Vincent, an American, superintending a petroleum well on the island of Cuba. Mr. Vincent was taken captive by the rebels and taken to their headquarters on the outskirts of Cuba, where he was condemned to death. While awaiting execution a Spanish war vessel steamed into the harbor and commenced to bombard the place. The insurgents speedily decamped, leaving their prisoner in the room. Shell after shell came crashing through the walls, carrying away most of the building. When the bombardment ceased a large number of rebels returned, having the bloodstained upper half of a priest's head in a basket. The head was placed on a table and Vincent was given to understand he would soon face a similar fate. He was surrounded by rebels with drawn knives. Before the command of execution was given he succeeded in making them understand that he was an American and not a Spaniard. The chief ordered his life spared.

In the meantime the Spanish soldiers attacked the place from the rear, and the rebels attempted to escape. The Spanish troops rounded together some 200 natives, many of whom were young boys and were indulging in an indiscriminate slaughter.

Ignorant at the time of what was transpiring within a few score yards of him, Mr. Vincent could hear the cries and prayers of the helpless natives amid the roar of musketry. After a while the fire slackened and all was quiet except a few occasional shots which sounded the death knell of those among the natives who had escaped the volleys poured into their midst.

About 8 o'clock the next morning Mr. Vincent crept out of the ruined building and succeeded in getting aboard the British steamship Gulf of Martaban, which had at number of Philippine refugees bound for Singapore.

CONGRESSIONAL.

The General Deficiency Bill Passed Senate.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The general deficiency bill, which passed the senate, carries \$227,000,000, the largest sum carried by any appropriation bill since the civil war.

An amendment of great importance was attached to the bill, practically by general consent. It relates to the settlement of the claims of the government against the Pacific railroads. It was offered by Morgan. Before it was agreed to, White proposed some amendment to it making it even more binding upon the roads than it was in its original form.

The secretary of the treasury, the secretary of the interior and the attorney general, and the successor in office, are appointed commissioners, with full power to settle the indebtedness to the government, growing out of the issue of bonds in aid of the construction of the Central Pacific and the Western Pacific bond-aided railroad, upon which terms and in such manner as may be agreed upon by them and the owners of the said railroads, provided that any and all settlements thus made shall be submitted in writing to the president for his approval or disapproval.

The commission shall not agree to accept a less sum in settlement of the full amount due the United States, than the full amount of the principal and interest, ten years being allowed for the settlement.

HOUSE.

The house passed the bill giving the secretary of war discretion to permit any church or religious sect to erect its house of worship upon the West Point military reservation. The bill precipitated considerable discussion, it being framed at the instance of the Catholics, but giving equal privileges to all churches.

LATE LITERARY NEWS.

Notes and Comment on Newest Books and Publications.

Houghton, Mifflin & Co., Boston, have just published "Tales of the Home Folks" by Joel Chandler Harris. They have our thanks for an advance copy for review.

Families who desire to have their children keep up their historical studies over the vacation in schools and colleges should take "The Great Round World" published at No. 3 and 5, West Eighteenth street, New York. The price of the illustrated weekly historical review for young people has been reduced to \$1.50 a year. Wm. Beverly Harrison is the editor and he possesses the wonderful talent of reducing to the grasp of one short article the main facts of any situation of a historical character. It contains a variety and we cannot see that its contents are colored to any purpose but pure education.

"The Parisian" for June shows great improvement. It is richly illustrated, has eight leading articles from the best French writers, fine illustrations, and departments that one finds nowhere else. The Paris Salon pictures of 1898 will begin to appear in the next number. Published at Carnegie Hall, New York.

Scribner's for June concludes its high career of interest and has scarcely a dull page. In the field of art it is especially strong. The papers by Walter A. Wyckoff continue to unravel the experience of a laborer's life among laborers—the novelty of a man living by labor!

The June Overland is a Manila and Philippine number from cover to last paragraph. There is an able illustrated article on the war between Spain and the United States by Earle Ashley Walcott, the photographic prize contest is continued with prize pictures published. Rosier Johnson's department, "The Whispering Gallery" contains enjoyable "causerie" and with very chaste, modesty the editor's name appears nowhere in this magazine, but his excellent work begins to tell.

RUSSIAN AND AMERICAN COLONIZATION.

Within the last few years the Russians have established on the boundary of Eastern Siberia a vast colony of restless emigrants, whose husky, energetic life is strangely out of keeping with the sluggish inactivity of sleeping Asia. Along the banks of the Amur and the Sungari and in the various districts which radiate from Vladivostok come thousands of hardy pioneers, subjugating the soil to cultivation, building roads, making homes, and driving an enterprising wedge of bustling civilization into the lethargic East. These men and women are not transient settlers; they will never go back to Russia, but they will draw Russia to them in closer union, and add a race of men to the people of the czar who will control this part of the continent of Asia as far south

as to compare it with the corresponding growth of new lands under a settlement by Anglo-Saxons. The course of the development of the Mississippi valley, for instance, may briefly be described by a division into three periods—settlement, extravagance and depression. Upon a fourth era they are now entering, and the many signs of prosperity and revival are sufficiently emphatic and encouraging.

The Anglo-Saxon theory of democracy leaves the settlers of a new country to work out their own salvation; they must find out for themselves the natural advantages and disadvantages of a new land, and often without assistance must come to an understanding of its capabilities through many vicissitudes and discouraging experiences. Directly opposed to this idea, the paternalism of a strong imperial government has a tendency to belittle such self-reliance.

Many suggestions of a comparison between the two systems are afforded by reading in connection with Mr. Bousal's article a contribution to the July number of Harper's Magazine from the pen of Charles Moreau Harger. The latter paper is entitled "The Middle West's New Era." It comprehensively sketches the business history of this portion of our country, arrays the many tendencies which now point to permanent prosperity, and concludes as follows: "The West is settling down to make the most of the resources which it possesses not. In that lies the secret of its future."

Bound for Santiago.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—From two Cuban officers, picked up by the Vixen it has been learned that General Pando is moving eastward from Manizillo with 8,700 Spanish troops, for the purpose of assisting the beleaguered city of Santiago de Cuba. The Cubans had come to Acerraderos in small boats, with dispatches from General Rios for Admiral Sampson and General Rabi.

They report that Pando has with him seven battalions, numbering 870 men, with cattle and a pack train with provisions. He left Lanzillo, province of Santiago de Cuba, on June 22d to relieve General Linares. The Spaniards were moving at the rate of twelve miles a day when the messengers left and at their present speed it is expected they will reach Santiago de Cuba next Sunday, July 3rd. The Cubans have a small force hanging on the Spanish flank and rear, and harassing General Pando's tracks at every step.

Wheat harvest has commenced at Myrtle Creek and will be an in general throughout Douglas county next week.

A GOLD INTERIOR

Flying Squadron No. More.

ON BOARD THE ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH BOAT DAUNTLESS, off Santiago de Cuba, Tuesday, June 28, by way of Jamaica—The flying squadron, in command of Commodore Schley has lost its identity by an order issued by Rear-Admiral Sampson and it has been merged into the fleet under the admiral. The order caused considerable surprise on board the Brooklyn, which has been the flagship of the flying squadron and where it was supposed the squadron would remain intact, at least until fall of Santiago de Cuba. Commodore Schley has been assigned to the command of the second squadron attached to Admiral Sampson's fleet.
