Investigation Concluded

(Continued from first page.)

I was nearly half past 9 o'clock when the examination of the alleged election fraud conspirators, P. H. D'Arcy, S. T. Richardson and John A. Carson began this morning. All the principals were on hand early. Everybody seemed in a good humor and the impression prevailed that this would be the last day of the trial.

AN ALIBI ESTABLISHED.
The first action taken by the defense was to establish an alibi for John A. Carson during the whole period including the time the alleged manipulation of the tally-sheets at the court house took place. The first witness was Mrs. Carson, wife of the accused. She testified that on the evening of Saturday June 11, she, in company with Mr. Carson and Miss Carson attended the Willamette law class commencement exercises. While there she saw Mr. Scott, Mr. Dunaway, Mr. Richardson, Mr. D'Arcy and a number of other acquaintances. They returned home about 11 o'clock and Mr. Carson went to bed. He did not leave the house that night and did not go down town until late next morning. On the next evening, Sunday, June 12, Mr. Carson came home about 7 o'clock to supper and did not leave again that night. He read awhile and then went to bed. On cross-examination, Mrs. Carson said she remembered these dates so well because her sister-in-law was graduated from Willamette university at the time.

Miss Anna Carson was the next witness. She stated she was a sister of John A. Carson and was graduated from the college of Liberal Arts at Willamette university this year. She attended the law class exercises at the Methodist church Saturday evening in company with Mr. Carson and his wife. While there she saw Mr. D'Arcy, Mr. Richardson, Attorney Scott and a number of other friends. None of these parties left the church until the exercises were over. She did not know Mr. Dunaway. She stated Mr. Carson was also at home Sunday evening and did not leave that night. Mr. Carson could not have left without her knowledge. Her graduation made her positive about these dates.

GIRL WITH A DIARY.
Miss Lou Putnam, an inmate of John A. Carson's house, keeps a diary in which she records all passing events. She was the next witness and she had her little book with her. Even without reference to the diary she remembered that Mr. Carson accompanied his wife and sister to the commencement exercises Saturday night. She remembered that Mr. Carson came home early Sunday night and went to his room. She did not think he could have left the house again without her knowledge.

A FONDNESS FOR PIE.
Young Lawyer Jack Rafter, whose office is with J. A. Carson, was placed on the stand. He remembered the Sunday night in question—he accompanied Carson nearly home, then he took a walk with a young lady, who he dated nearly 11 o'clock. Then he went to the office and was there until 12:30, except a few minutes when he went to George Brother's restaurant.

rant and got a piece of pie. He was only two minutes in consuming the pie, then he returned to the office. No one came there that night. He said Carson went to Butteville, Friday, June 10, and did not get home until 10:30 o'clock.

ROBERTS WANTED MONEY.
John Bayne, stated that on Wednesday he was in Governor Fletcher's office when Judge Boise came in and said that Night Watchman Roberts was an unwilling witness and wanted something out of it. That Roberts had been around looking for something. That he (Judge Boise) did not think it was proper for him to pay the witness, but that he thought a detective could pay him something. Gov. Fletcher was present and heard this conversation.

HON. FRANK DAVEY.
Testified that he heard Watchman Robert's direct testimony in regard to the curtain in the attorney's room being pulled down. Next day he examined the curtain and found that it could not be pulled down. A man could stand in the attorney's office and observe what was being done around the table.

The court here inspected the curtain and found it as stated.
J. O. Wilson corroborated Mr. Davey's evidence and said he had examined the curtain.

G. G. Gave, who had been bailiff for five years, said for a year or such a matter, the curtain could not be pulled down to within a foot of the bottom.

MR. HAYES RECALLED.
Squire Hays, of Woodburn, was recalled but nothing new was brought out. He reiterated the statement that he found no disorder in the room on the morning of the last count. John Giesy was recalled and made practically the same statement.

The defense then rested the case. In rebuttal the prosecution placed Judge Boise on the stand. He said he never told anybody that it would be proper for a detective to offer a witness money. "That would be bribery" said he.

"Yes and were thinking the witness was bribed," said Mr. Bingham. **GOVERNOR FLETCHER TALKS.**

Ex-Governor J. H. Fletcher was the next witness.

He remembered the conversation with Mr. Bayne and Judge Boise. Judge Boise said that testimony was hard to get. That he thought Roberts was an honest fellow, but that he had talked too much out of his mouth, and was afraid of losing his job. The Governor also thought that Judge Boise said that a detective might give a witness money but that he would not do it himself. This concluded the testimony.

Judge Johnson said now that the witnesses were discharged and the expense stopped he would not limit the argument. He was willing to offer up himself a living sacrifice. Mr. Bingham proposed to submit the case without argument. But Mr. Ford said "oh you're entirely too accommodating." It was agreed that each side was to have two hours in which to present their argument. At 11:15 court adjourned until 1:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
Court met promptly at 1:30 o'clock and the argument of the merits of the case was almost immediately begun by counsel, Attorney W. H. Holmes, representing the state; spoke first and in a half hour's speech briefly reviewed the evidence and made some allusions to the Ethen confession, which were ruled out by the court. A part of his speech was devoted to an attempt to show that a conspiracy had been found to commit an election fraud. He spoke of the deep interest Mr. Carson and Miss Carson had in the ultimate result of the trial and reviewed the Roberts testimony.

He was followed by Attorney Geo. G. Bingham on behalf of the defense. Mr. Bingham at once went into the supposed motives for the prosecution and then began to take up the testimony and dissect it. Mr. Bingham was speaking when the JOURNAL went to press. The argument will hardly be concluded before 6 o'clock this afternoon.

Body of Chester Berry Found.
It is reported that Chester Berry, son of Ulrich Berry, aged 12 years, who was drowned at Detroit two months ago, has been found in an eddy four miles below the place he disappeared. The body has not yet been recovered but can be plainly seen beneath fifteen feet of water. The head appears to be separated therefrom, otherwise it appears to be in a fair state of preservation. Mr. Berry will immediately make all efforts to recover his son.
