EDITORIAL.

The Fourth of July has again been made historical. As in 1776, on that day the immortal Declaration of Independence was flung down with defiance to Great Britain, as in 1893 the battle of Gettysburg was won and Vicksburg surrendered, on that day, in 1898 the greetings of Commodore Sampson touched the American heart with news of victory by sea and land in Cuba.

July 4 is a fatal day to oppression, but the natal day of liberty to the colonists, to the emancipated slaves and the liberated Cubans. The new Republic to the South when established will celebrate that day forever. The day was celebrated on the Sandwich Islands, and no doubt natives, insurgents and Americans united in its joyous observance at Manila.

Our telegraphic reports show that the day was observed in many places in Great Britain, that even those against whose governmental policy it was originally a protest, are learning to appreciate the higher meaning of the event, and have the breadth, justice and liberality to publicly acknowledge that the colonists were right in separating from the mother country.

Independence day now moves the heart of the world to thoughts of freedom and equality. The splendid achievements of American arms in Santiago in the cause of human liberty sets this date again before the world as the red letter day of humanity. The time is not far distant when this date will be observed around the globe as the gift of this Republic to the nations of the world.

This is the date (July 5) for the magistrate to render his decision in the preliminary examination in the Marion county ballot box frauds. There will no doubt be other investigations by the grand jury and the courts. There will be an opportunity to investigate the tally-sheets and duplicates and the ballots themselves to see whether they have been tampered with. The chances of conviction is not the question to be considered. It may be very difficult. It is said that two cases of illegal voting from Woodburn precinct were before the courts the past month and were not allowed to be fully investigated. It may be that in this case political and personal interests and influences will prevent full, complete and thorough investigation. It has long been the boast of Northern states that elections were honestly conducted, that they had a fair vote and an honest count. It has been the one crime charged up to the Southern states that crimes against the ballot were unpunished. It is to be regretted that in this judgeship contest all parties have not fearlessly demanded the enforcement of law, the protection of the returns, the punishment of the offenders, whoever they might be. That is the one universal sentiment of disinterested citizens of all parties. The people demand that the law be enforced and purity of elections preserved. This election contest will develop one fact, that in the dark election practices existing in this state political lines disappear. The vicious elements in politics stand together to conceal fraud, to prevent conviction, to stifle investigation. This is only natural and it should teach honest citizens who do not believe in such practices to unite regardless of politics. The Republican party nor the Union party has anything to gain by sheltering fraud. Crime makes stranger bed-fellows than politics, and it is of no consequence whatever what magistrates or even courts may decide in such cases, the law must be upheld by all honest people.

The Union Conventions at Spokane adopted a platform upholding the administration in its war policy and pledging hearty support of the army and navy. This is a proper and patriotic attitude for the Populists, Bryan Democrats and Silver Republicans of Washington to take. There

is no class of people in this country who do not uphold the government in its conduct of the war for the liberation of Cuba, and there is no difference of opinion among the people politically on this subject.

After peace has been declared there may arise differences as to the disposition of the territory, the administration of Cuba and the Manila. There can be no differences now, and the Union voters and the Union party, though opposed to the Republicans in local campaigns for county and state government, has no differences with the national administration. If this had been clearly understood in Oregon the recent campaign would not have been so one-sided, and it is gratifying to know that the Union forces in Washington have placed themselves clearly and strongly on the side of patriotism.

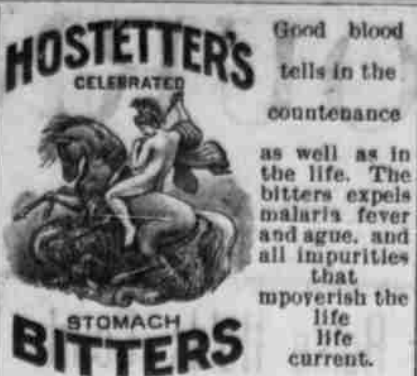

FOR A HOSPITAL SHIP.

Patriotic People of Pacific Coast Asked for Funds for That Purpose.

THE JOURNAL has received the following from Mrs. Chas. B. Greenleaf, of Berkeley, Cal:

To the People of the Pacific Coast: The project of having the people of the Pacific coast present to the United States government a hospital ship has been repeatedly mentioned in the press. A public appeal is now made to all patriotic people for contributions toward this great undertaking.

The people of Massachusetts have just now presented a hospital ship to the government at the cost of \$150,000. This ship is for transport service between the West Indies and the North, that the sick and the wounded may be safely conveyed to suitable climate and quarters, and its service is supplementary to that of other ships which fly the banner of the Red Cross on the Atlantic. We have not a single ship of this sort on the Pacific, and we should have it at once. The estimate cost of one which should be adequate for the needs of the service, is \$300,000. This is a large sum to raise, but there can be no difficulty in doing so, if public interest can be thoroughly aroused. It is suggested that the greater part must be raised by ten cent subscriptions on the part of children and dollar subscriptions on the part of others.

The money must be raised by the local societies, and administered by the state societies, until the ship is turned over to the government. The need of the ship is absolute; this method of securing it was first officially suggested by Colonel Chas. B. Greenleaf, chief surgeon of the United States army in the field, and has the strongest approval of the surgeon general. The ship under the Red Cross flag is protected from capture or injury by the terms of the Geneva convention. The people of these states never had such a chance as is now before them to show their patriotism and humanity; and this appeal is made to the noblest sentiments of mankind with confidence that the response will be immediate and sufficient.

It has been suggested that some of the ships at Manila, which were captured by Admiral Dewey, might be turned into hospital ships, and I think well of the plan.

I hesitate to say more because of the conditions that may arise, but if anything further should be necessary, I will write you after arriving at Manila.

Summer Tornado.

Does Tremendous Damage to Towns in Massachusetts.

Cottages and Hotels Torn Down and Many People Killed—List of Dead.

HAMPTON, Mass., July 5.—A tornado struck this section of Hampton beach at 3:45 p. m. yesterday, causing immense damage to beach property and great loss of life. Cottages were blown flat, horses were picked up bodily and dashed against buildings, vehicles were carried many feet, barns unroofed, large trees snapped off at the roots, while others were torn up bodily. The tornado touched the beach a half mile north of Whittier's hotel, and cut a swath 100 yards wide in a westerly direction, mowing rotary shape.

Twenty cottages were torn down and small hotels were completely wrecked. The greatest loss of life and injury came with the demolition of the old skating rink near Leavitts, a two-story wood structure 100x100 feet. Here from ten to fifteen persons were injured, and several are already dead. A yacht owned by Captain Frank Mudd, was in the path of the storm. In it were nine people, and of these five were drowned.

The drowned are: Walter Gertrude and Ralph Hodgson, Kensington, N. H.; Mrs. W. H. Parker, Kensington; Captain Mudd, Hampton.

The list of the dead on shore, as compiled at 8 o'clock was: MORA, an actress of New York, who was playing "The Blowing Up of the Maine." Miss May Prescott, of Exeter; Samuel Campbell, of Exeter; William Carleton, of Exeter.

Among those thought to be fatally injured in the cyclone are: Miss O. D. Pressey, Haverhill, fractured skull; W. H. Barbey, Exeter, internal injury.

ADMIRAL DEWEY'S REPORT

Tells of the Arrival of the American Troops.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The department posted the following, yesterday, from Dewey:
"CANITE, July 1, via Hong Kong. Three transports and the Charleston arrived yesterday. The Charleston captured Guam, Ladrones Island, June 21, without resistance, and brought the Spaniards from the garrison, six officers and 54 men, to Manila.

"On June 29, the Spanish gun vessel Leyte came out of the river and surrendered to me, having exhausted her ammunition and food in repelling attacks by the insurgents. She had on board 52 officers and 94 men, naval and military.

and Australia, conveyed by the Charleston, arrived off Cavite at 5 o'clock yesterday evening, after an uneventful voyage.

On the way here the Charleston called at Guam, the largest of the Ladrones Islands, a group in the Pacific which belonged to Spain, took possession of the whole group, made prisoners of Governor-General Marina, his staff and the entire military force, and raised the Stars and Stripes over the ruins of Santa Cruz, the fort in harbor at San Luis Darpa.

The troops are in good condition and our only loss was Private Hutchinson, of the First Oregon, who died on the City of Sydney on June 30, and was buried at sea on June 31.
