EDITORIAL.

The lower house of the American congress has adopted a resolution to annex the Hawaiian Islands by a vote of 209 to 91. All who voted for it were not Republicans, 27 of them being Democrats, Populists and Silver Republicans. Newlands of Nevada, a Silver Republican, offered the resolution. Only three who voted against the resolution were Republicans. Speaker Reed was absent but sent word that if present when the vote was taken he would vote against it also.

The Newlands resolution places the appointment of all the civil, judicial and military officers in the hands of the president and would if adopted by the senate and approved by the president set aside the present Republican form of government established on the islands. This in spite of the fact that President Dole is to hold his office until 1900.

There are in Hawaii 31,019 natives, 24,407 Japanese, and 21,016 Chinese besides 3086 Americans. The Americans are now the ruling power and probably always will be. The senate is debating the question of annexation on the Newlands resolution. In the senate there is no limit put on debate, and the members who are opposed to annexation are going to try to kill the bill by debating it until congress adjourns. But if the war lasts congress does not adjourn until March 4, 1899, when this congress dies by limitation.

The proposition to annex Hawaii was not found in the national platform of any party in 1896. The question is being taken up and debated in the public press. The only use we could make of the island would be for a military, naval and coaling station. It is said we already have all these privileges and the free use of Pearl Harbor. The annexation of the islands would make places for thousands of Americans in official and military offices and compel our country to have a large navy.

On the investigation of the tally-sheet frauds in Marion county the counsel for the state proved that a crime had been committed. They established a "corpus delicti" beyond a question. The lawyers for the defense as much as admitted that during the trial, but challenged the state to fasten the act constituting the crime upon those charged with it, and so the matter stood. A conspiracy to alter the returns, to defraud some one, to change the result of the election, was clearly established. But individual crime was not fixed so clearly as to satisfy Justice Johnson that it was his duty to bind defendants over to the grand jury. Justice Johnson had already decided that a crime had been committed when he refused as member of the canvassing board to count the tally sheets written into the tally sheets. In the written opinion he filed Tuesday, discharging the defendants, he declares: "I am satisfied that said crime was committed after 12 o'clock noon of the 11th day of June, 1898."

The matter now goes to the grand jury. District Attorney Hayden should spare no expense to bring about a conviction. He should subpoena every witness who knows anything about the manipulating of the tally-sheets before they can leave the country. He should subpoena men like W. L. Tuome, of Woodburn, McKinley Mitchell, of Gervais and others who have taken an intense interest in this case—not for the benefit of the public. This character of business has gone far enough. It has gone as far as decent citizens can endure and live in a country where such practices go unpunished.

A great many eastern colleges are changing presidents. The office is as difficult to fill satisfactorily as that of chief executive of a state. In the latter the incumbent is successful from the party standpoint in proportion as he refrains from carrying out ideals. In the college work the president must have executive ability and

then must not only have ideals but must have the courage to apply them and carry them out. He cannot keep house without them while the governor of a state often succeeds in proportion as he conceals his ideas of right and duty.

Oregon has a State university and a number of years ago a young man was brought from the East and made president. He was a graduate of some great seat of learning, we do not know what. But no matter. The higher, the worse for him to get along in a state of low political ideals, as have notoriously prevailed in Oregon. And he has had a hard time with politicians shoved onto him from all sides for jobs. But it is a pleasure to know he has come through it all and is not soured and the college is on the upturn financially and numerically and last, but not least, ideally and educationally.

After all the hard fights made on him Pres. Chapman will still remain President of the State University. It is creditable to the regents that they back up a man, who has drawn so much fire, on the sole ground that they have confidence in him as being the man for the place and when that is fully comprehended it means a great deal. We have before us the annual report of the institution and no one can read it but he will become convinced that Oregon has a better department of learning that must command respect among educated men anywhere. And that is not a small thing to say in the wild and woolly west.

President Chapman, has not only stood the hardest fight that could be put up against him by people who don't like him personally for various reasons but he has never complained and has kept his sore spots to himself, if he had any. He has not made them a campaign issue but has gone on with his plans of work and that work has told in the estimation of the state at large. He has not catered to any party or sect but has shown a daring independence of thought. He has not modified his tone of culture, his high key of sanest philosophy, nor his literary attitude.

Take his exposition of Tennyson in the last College Monthly. It is a paper that could be read with pride in the greatest college in the world where English is spoken. In the judgment of competent critics, his analysis of the greatest modern poet is one that can be set beside the work of the greatest living critics. Is not this something for Oregon to take pride in? The literary atmosphere of our state needs purification and elevation. The man at the head of the State University is the one to lead in this work and he is doing it nobly. Only small and narrow minds can cry down such a performance, not those who know what devotion to culture is required to reach and stand upon the higher planes of thought and look over the mists and little obstructions that hide the ordinary views of things.

In the realm of highest philosophy President Chapman is equally clear, profound and courageous. He reaches a conclusion by remarkably open processes of thought. He states his conclusion in a forcible, unequivocal manner. If it don't suit you, no matter. If it runs counter to your 'ology or 'dogy, that is not his lookout. It is his positive deduction from the facts before him and he has reached it by a fair process of his intellect and he stands by it. You may reach some other conclusion in some other way and Chapman will respect you for it. But he will not truckle to you and make you think he has reached your conclusion when he has not, whether it be in matters of religion, philosophy, politics or morals. He may change his mind and so may you. But he stands primarily for the right of private judgment and we honor him for it.

THE FLEET FOR SPAIN.

The actual damage Commodore Watson could do in attacking the Spanish coast would be small. He would never think of bombarding defenseless seaports, for that is behind the spirit of the age and as for bombardments of forts at Spain's principal naval bases, they would result in nothing very tangible unless long continued and followed up by an armed occupation. Watson's great opportunity—and it would be a great stroke of luck to him—would be to meet the Spanish home squadron. But he has little chance of making himself famous in that way, unless the Philippine expedition returns, for the Spaniards will probably keep what few ships they have left under the guns of forts. The more the proposed expedition is analyzed, the more it seems to depend upon its moral effect for success. It will certainly be humiliating to the Spanish people to see a Yankee fleet saucily parading up and down their coast line with a clip on its shoulder.—Springfield Republican.

GARFIELD'S OPINION.

It is pointed out that Gen Garfield favored the reciprocity treaty with Hawaii because it would be "a satisfactory substitute for all probable schemes for annexation." Speaking in the national house in April, 1876, Garfield said: "I wish to state distinctly that except to the north (I make a distinction there) I trust we have seen the last of our annexations." Why he made the exception of annexation to the north was because the British possessions there were of contiguous territory and homogeneous people. "Should we extend our possessions into the tropical belt," he continued, "we should weaken the powers of our people and government."—Cleveland Plaindealer.

A LABOR QUESTION.

In addition to the party question involved, the economical question of labor interests is concerned in the issue. If we were to take in the Philippines as states or territories, with their motley population as citizens, we should bring at once the pauper labor of the East in competition with the free and self-respecting labor of the western hemisphere. The problem which political economists have long discussed academically would become a question vital to our industries.—Boston Post.

CONDITION VS THEORY.

The Bee believes that the Hawaiian Islands are doomed to be grabbed by some great Nation, and that inevitable circumstances may force us to lay hold of them as a matter of defense and protection. That which is inherently wrong may be made absolutely necessary by the irresistible trend of events. The rights in the matter will probably be smoothed in consideration of the absolute necessities of the times, and in view of new problems that are confronting this government.

The Bee is willing to admit that it is a condition and not a theory that is about to confront us in regard to the Hawaiian Island, and that wise statesmanship may find it necessary to cut its policy to fit that condition.—Sacramento Bee.

A RADICAL DEPARTURE.

Ask any of these men who favor such a radical departure from our established policy, which has proved its wisdom by a century of a trial, the same questions that Washington asked and see if they can give a reasonable reply. They say we need a wider market, but our trade with Canada alone far surpasses anything we could ever hope from Hawaii, the Philippines and Cuba and Porto Rico combined. The gain would be insignificant, and the cost might prove fatal to our national well-being, as the cost of an army and navy to maintain our control of those islands would be greater than the benefit we would derive from them. Why should we entangle our peace and prosperity for such a small gain, and acquire something that would cost more to keep than we could ever get out of it?—Newton, Mass. Graphic.

CROP REVIEW.

Bounteous Crops Are the Rule—Hops Will Make Big Crop.
Showers occurred east of the Cascades during the night of June 29th and the morning June 30; with this exception fair weather has prevailed over Oregon during the past seven days. The temperature changed but little during the past week from what it was the week before. Frost occurred over the Plateau Region of Eastern Oregon on the morning of 28th, damaging the more tender vegetation in various localities.

The weather has been favorable to all growing crops. Hay harvest is in progress; the reports indicate that clover and wild hay are unusually heavy, and that the crop of timothy fully equals the best crops of former years. Fall-sown wheat, barley, rye and oats are nearly ready to harvest in all sections. In Douglas, Josephine and Jackson counties, and in the counties of the Columbia River Valley, heading and harvesting have commenced. The grain is reported to be perfect and the yield unusually heavy in every section. Spring-sown grain continues to promise a yield almost as heavy as the fall-sown, while volunteer crops are equal to many former crops which were called "good crops." The fruit crop continues to promise very large yields. Prune trees are generally overladen and hand pruning has commenced. Early Peaches in Wasco, Sherman and Morrow counties are ripe. Cherries continue to be plentiful. Strawberries are nearly through bearing. There is no improvement in the condition of hops. Lice have appeared and energetic spraying has commenced. The missing hills will amount to about one hill in five; those growing as healthy and promising as possible. Corn and vegetable are doing finely; the latter are growing and developing much better than is usual. Early flax for fiber is being pulled—it is thirty-six and more inches long in all fields; the later sown flax is making most satisfactory progress. The success of flax growing in Oregon is assured. Sugar beets are making most satisfactory growth, and this industry has the most flattering prospects for success. Range food is good and stock is in prime condition.

There are no adverse conditions to be reported except in hops and even hope promise a yield equal or greater than last year. A year of big crops in Oregon is assured; only unprecedented weather condition can injure present prospects.
