Brutality Shown by Sharpshooters.

They Fire On Ambulance Corps.

Kill Two Wounded Soldiers and Wound More.

The Gallantry of American Officers Exemplified.

CENTER OF THE LINE BEFORE SANTIAGO, July 1.—(Delayed in transmission.) via Kingston, July 4.—(Copyright, 1898, by the Associated Press.)—One feature of Friday's fight which aroused great indignation among the American troops is the act of the Spaniards in having sharpshooters in trees along the line of march of the American troops. Of course if the sharpshooters had fired on armed men they would have done nothing more than might have been expected, but one Spanish marksman from his post fired on wounded men and on men carrying the wounded to the rear. Several members of the ambulance corps were wounded in this manner, and two men who were toiling along to the rear were shot and killed. Some of these marksmen were posted less than half a mile from the American camp. Colonel Liscum, Twenty-Fourth Infantry, said:

"I was fired on several times by men in trees, and six bullets flew very close to me."

Later in the day a company of cavalry was sent along to clear them out, and the work was effectively done.

The gallantry of American officers was conspicuous during the fighting. Major Wheeler, who was seriously injured, was the first to be killed. He was suffering from fever. On the morning of the fight as soon as he was aware that the troops were likely to be engaged, he ordered an ambulance to convey him to the front. His surgeon tried to dissuade him, but the old general was obdurate, and to the front he went. The ambulance once there, the sound of fighting restored his breath, and in a short time he was calling for his horse and personally directing his division in the attack on the rear redoubt.

General Hawkins, commanding the First brigade, ninth division, was conspicuous for the manner in which he exposed himself to Spanish bullets, and it is a miracle how he escaped serious injury. After attacking the redoubt of the hill by his command, aided by detachments from Wheeler's division, he stood for a long time on the summit of the redoubt watching the progress of the fight. A heavy fire at times was concentrated on the spot where he was standing, but free from apparent fear he surveyed the field of battle while the bullets were whizzing past by hundreds.

Lieutenant-Colonel Roosevelt was in front of his regiment throughout the day, and his boot heel was carried away by a piece of shell.

The greatest care and attention was bestowed upon the wounded men, and all were cared for in a very short time after reaching the hospital. The hospital of the second division was established on the field, as was also a cavalry division hospital. The hospital of the first division was established a short distance west of General Shafter's headquarters, where by 10 o'clock fully 500 men had received medical attention. The seriously hurt were kept near the hospital, the officers being placed under two large palms. The men were placed upon the ground where the tents and made as comfortable as possible. The ambulance corps proved very efficient, and no wounded men were allowed to remain on the field after dark.

The provisional hospital at Siboney received a large number of men, who all night long loitered along the road front as best they could. Wagon conveyed many, but others preferred walking, and throughout the night the road was filled with the wounded, who moved slowly along the path known to the seacoast.

Cervera Might Have Escaped.

OFF SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 6.—Per Associated Press Dispatch-Boat Cynthia II., via Kingston, July 5.—Admiral Cervera held a consultation with his officers before sailing out of the harbor of Santiago, and by a small majority the move was agreed upon. The minority said that destruction was sure, as many of the firemen had mutinied, and the best men in the fleet were worn out by serving the guns in the shore batteries. Early on the morning of the sortie careful observations were taken of the sea. Admiral Cervera decided upon taking the westward course; with Manzanillo, Cienfuegos, or if possible, Havana the port to be reached. He would have gone east but for the sighting of the large transport fleet off Siboney, and the assurance that the convoy of war vessels was still with the transports. As a matter of fact there is no war vessel larger than a converted yacht, except the New York, that could have obstructed Admiral Cervera's escape eastward. Naval men here say that the Spanish vessels could have disabled or sunk the New York, and escaped, had the eastward course been chosen.

What Cervera Said.

OFF SANTIAGO, July 4.—Cervera on being interviewed by an Associated Press correspondent said, "I would rather lose my ships at sea, like a sailor, than in a harbor. It was the only thing left for me to do."

On the Fourth Chas. Gray of Cove shot three times at Albert Ahmes, of Island City. One bullet took effect in Ahmes' thigh and one struck his saddle, while the third killed his horse. Both were riding. Officers are pursuing Gray.

SHAFER AWAITING H.P.P.

Pando Is On the Ground With 5,000 Men.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—The bombardment of Santiago has been put off for the present. News of Pando's arrival at the doomed city has been confirmed and General Shafter has concluded to wait for reinforcements. Pando and 6,000 troops are scattered throughout the city and fortifications. The heavy rain and heat of the past week have been very severe upon the soldiers and many are sick. Pando's reinforcements give the Spaniards new hope.

In the cabinet meeting, the president directed that telegrams be sent to Shafter and Sampson, suggesting that they confer as to the situation and particularly as to the advisability of the admiral's attempt to force a passage into Santiago bay so as to be in readiness to render effective aid in the assault upon the city.

Orders were given looking to the immediate dispatch of troops from Tampa with reinforcements for Shafter. It is probable at least 15,000 will be sent forward as quickly as transportation can be provided.

THREE MURDERS.

Results of a Bloody Fourth of July in St. Louis.

St. Louis, July 6.—Three murders, a properly fatal shooting, and a death by burning is the record of July 4th in St. Louis. Fred Losse, a huckster, was stabbed to death, and a companion, Jack Ormes, so seriously stabbed he cannot live. A party of men were shooting clay pigeons on Losse's farm. Losse returned home from celebrating, accompanied by Ormes, and remonstrated with the sportsmen. A fight ensued, resulting in Losse's death.

H. W. Manz, a street-car conductor, was shot and killed while on his car by an unknown negro, who escaped.

Frank T. Sasse, a bicycle rider, was shot through the heart and instantly killed while wheeling on Locust street. The man who fired the shot escaped.

Fannie Hittler, a little girl, set fire to her dress while exploding firecrackers, and was burned to death.

Ed Middleton, a negro, was shot in the neck and will die. The shooting was the result of an old grudge.

Spanish Cabinet Divided.

LONDON, July 6.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says:

The enthusiasm of the Spanish soldiers continues, but there is bitter resentment for the bad military and naval organization, and resignation of the responsible ministers is demanded. The war fever is running high. The cabinet is divided into peace and war parties. An uneasy feeling has been caused by the general precautions being taken.

Admiral Camara will pass through the Suez canal today (July 6). The destroyers are returning to destroy Commodore Watson's squadron. The coast towns are being rapidly fortified, particularly Caba and Chorrucules, commanding Gibraltar bay, with the object of preventing the Americans from coaling.

There are renewed rumors regarding the exchange of bank notes at Algeiras and Badajoz. General Gamanzo, minister of public instruction and public works, talks of precaution and in favor of the attitude of the workmen of Castilla.

Dunsmuir Swept By Fire.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 6.—A special to the Bee says the town of Dunsmuir, in Siskiyou county, on the line of the California-Oregon railroad, was almost swept out of existence by a fire.

The fire started at 2 a. m. and, owing to a high north wind which prevailed, was soon beyond control. The town's water was entirely inadequate to supply the demand. Twenty-five buildings were destroyed in the business section, and it was only by the heroic efforts of the townspeople that the residence section escaped the flames. The loss will exceed \$50,000 with but little insurance.

The population of Union is now 1500. Over 5,000 people celebrated at Dallas.

The bicycle path has been completed from Oregon city to Gladstone park.

Saturday was the first regular payday of the Union, Oregon woolen mills.

A 3-year-old son of Thomas Rhoades of Albany, was badly hooked by the family cow Friday afternoon.

Leonard Cole, of Baker City, has sued John Ralston, claiming \$100 apocryphal and \$10,000 general damages for malicious prosecution.

A small green bug is doing much damage to outfields near Tualatin. The bug sucks the juice and the oats die. The affected fields are only in small sections.

THE OREGON DELEGATION.

Pendleton (Ore) Tribune: Mr. McKinley announced that he would carry out the recommendations of the various congressional delegations in making these appointments, and he has consistently adhered to that policy. The Oregon delegation is responsible, and 10,000 majority of this state's people have already condemned the contemptible deceit and traitorous conduct of these men.

Springfield, (Mass.) Republican:

According to the Portland Oregonian, the Republican party of that state got no help from the administration in its recent victorious fight on a gold platform. Ex-Senator Mitchell was striving secretly for the defeat of the party on such a platform. Senator McBride is spoken of as Mitchell's man, and together they worked the administration successfully for a patronage which was lukewarm or hostile to the party all through the state campaign. No help came from the federal officeholding ring engineered by Mitchell and McBride, who expected and hoped to see the party beaten, and who then thought to be able to clinch their control of the state. But the result is that Mitchell has been thoroughly discredited and will be cast out. He has earned such a fate, for he appears to be an unprincipled self-seeker.
