Senator McBride, speaking of the possibility of German interferences in Manila, said:

I doubt very much whether Germany would do anything more than to land marines possibly, to protect the interests of German residents and not to do that without the permission of Admiral Dewey. If, however, there should be any attempt at forcible intervention, there is just one course for the United States to pursue, and that is to resist it."

The Hop Crop.
The outlook for the hop crop is much better than it was a few weeks ago, but another menace in the shape of lice is making its appearance. If the hops are not seriously damaged by lice and rain, the yield in this locality will be much better than predicted.

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Rev. W. C. Kantner, of the First Congregational church went to Portland today to attend the tenth annual council of Congregational churches of the United States.
Rev. P. S. Knight, superintendent of the State Deaf Mute school, went to Portland today where he will attend the session of the national council of the congregational churches.
Supt. J. L. Carter of the state blind school, left today for a short visit at his home at La Grande and Union, where he resided before taking charge of the blind school. Mr. Carter has not visited his Eastern Oregon acquaintances since coming to this city three years ago.
Rev. P. S. Knight went this afternoon to attend the triennial council of Congregational churches, which meets at Portland today, composed of delegates from all parts of the world. This will be Mr. Knight's first absence of over 48 hours in the past two years.
The refreshment stand at 211 Commercial street conducted for the past week by S. C. Wade, was this morning attached by Constable L. P. Adams, a suit having been begun against Wade by James McCourt for \$25, alleged to be due on a note issued in 1893, with interest at 10 per cent and \$10, attorneys fees. The stock of goods was attached and is now in the hands of the constable. This is Mr. Adams' initial official act since assuming the duties of constable for this district on the 5th inst.

Albert Oleson, aged 22 years, and a native of Michigan, was today regularly committed to the insane asylum after an examination conducted before Judge G. P. Terrell by Dr. J. N. Smith and District Attorney S. L. Hayden. The young man has for some time been a patient at the Salem hospital. His insanity was caused by self-abuse.

Miss Onie McKinney, for the past four years the efficient, obliging and accommodating deputy under County Clerk L. V. Ehlen, has been appointed a deputy by Clerk W. W. Hall to assist in that department of the county's capital until the volume of business incident to sessions of the county court and both departments of the circuit court, have been disposed of.

MUTINY

Prisoners of the Maria Therera Shot.

Alfonso XII Sunk While Running Blockade.

General Bando Killed While in An Engagement.

Prisoners Mutinied.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A special dispatch to the Star, dated off Santiago, July 6, says:

"After the destruction of the Spanish fleet 400 men from the Maria Theresa were placed as prisoners on the Harvard. For some reason these men mutinied. The officers and crew of the Harvard were prepared, and the mutineers were fired upon. Six Spaniards were killed outright and 12 wounded.

News Confirmed.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—Secretary Long has received word through General Greely, signal officer, which is accepted as confirming the report that the Spanish cruiser, Alfonso XII, was destroyed while trying to run the Havana blockade. General Greely's information came in a cipher message, and he considers it reliable. The ship is said to be a total loss. The engagement occurred near Mariel.

Secretary Long regarded the report as the best news of the day. Both the secretary and General Greely regarded the report as authentic, but there was a desire to get more details, as this has some bearing of a spectral ship.

The Alfonso XII is an iron gunboat, with one screw, one funnel and one military mast, barque-rigged, 280 feet long, 44 feet beam and 18 feet draught. She has a displacement of 3000 tons. She has a speed of 17 knots for short distances and an average speed of 14 knots; carried eight guns, five machine guns and five torpedo tubes. Her officers and crew numbered 370.

Pando Dead.

NEW YORK, July 7.—A dispatch to the Herald from Kingston says:

Another of the Spanish leaders, General Pando, has fallen in battle, but his troops, numbering 7000, having succeeded in getting into the city of Santiago. This interesting news is obtained from refugees who arrived here from Santiago on the British warship Pallas, and the American warship Maria Teresa.

According to these refugees, Pando was seriously wounded in the arm while commanding his troops, in a battle at Palma Soriano, at which point General Garcia, with several thousand Cubans, attempted to prevent his further advance toward Santiago.

After the battle, General Pando's men proceeded toward the city, finally entering with difficulty. Gen. Pando was carried along with the troops and now is being cared for on the dismantled cruiser Reina Mercedes, which is lying in Santiago harbor, and is used as a hospital ship.

It is said the Cubans under Garcia, in their efforts to intercept Pando's army, made a stubborn fight. There were no match for the 700 trained soldiers under the Spanish general, although they checked the enemy's progress for a time.

Coal for Camara.
New York, July 7.—A dispatch from Port Said says:
The St. Augustin, with government permission, will transship to the Spanish fleet which entered the canal 1200 tons of coal when four miles from Suez. Before the squadron left here 1000 troops with supplies and ammunition were transferred from the Buenos Ayres to the Isla de Luzon, thereby making the Buenos Ayres available as a cruiser.

Expedition Landed.

NEW YORK, July 7.—A special to the World, from Washington, says:
The Cuban legation has been advised of the safe arrival in Cuba of the second expedition of Cuban volunteers from the United States under command of General Emilio Nunez. The expedition left the coast of Florida on the steamer, June 25, and landed at Punta Cana on the 30th. On board the transport, besides the 350 Cuban volunteers, chiefly from Florida and New York, were two dynamite guns, 4000 Springfield rifles and a large quantity of ammunition.

Raising the Wrecks.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—The navy department has closed a contract with the Merritt & Chapman Wrecking Company to save all the property possible from the destroyed Spanish fleet.

Secretary Long is quite hopeful that several of the Spanish ships of Cervera's squadron can be saved, in part at least. The contract with the Merritt & Chapman Company is by the day, and may be cancelled at any time if the government finds the salvage is not progressing satisfactorily. Two large wrecking vessels left Norfolk today to begin work upon the Colon Vizcaya and Oquendo.

Fight With Terror.

CAPE HAYTIN, July 7.—The announcement is made here that a dispatch from San Juan de Porto Rico, carried to St. Thomas by a carrier pigeon, asserted that United States auxiliary cruiser St. Louis had an engagement with the Spanish torpedo destroyer Terror, and killed the engineer and five men.

Troops for Manila.

Two cars of troops bound for Manila will pass through Salem this evening. The ladies of Sedgewick Emergency corps and other ladies are requested to bring lunches to the S. P. depot.

The delegation going that will pass through Salem tonight consists of the Portland Engineer company and numbers 91 men in all. The company goes to San Francisco in charge of Capt. Geo. W. Freeman. Two tourist cars are provided for the company. A dozen recruits from La Grande passed through on the overland Wednesday evening. There will also be a number of volunteers from Pendleton on tonight's train. Let everybody prepare a lunch or a bouquet of flowers for the recruits and be at the depot when the train arrives.

MARRIED.

The Oregon Green & Dried Fruit Company is at present shipping a great many cherries to Eastern points. The variety being shipped is the Black Republican—it is being a better shipper than the Royal Anne or any of the other varieties. During the strawberry season the Company shipped a great quantity of that delicious fruit into California, the crop in that state having been light by reason of the long continued dry weather.

The cherry crop in the Willamette valley this year is enormous. J. F. Staiger, proprietor of the "Cottage" here, having partially picked a tree of the Royal Anne variety, in all 245 pounds and he estimates fully as many more on the tree. The tree is about fifteen years old but the yield is remarkable.

A HOROLOGICAL WONDER.

The Complicated Time Keeping Oddity Invented by a Russian Pole.

The prize wonder in the shape of a clock is the invention of a Russian Pole named Goldfaden. The inventor is a clockmaker of Warsaw and boasts that he worked over 2,000 days in this time keeping oddity. The clock represents a railway station, with waiting rooms for travelers, telegraph and ticket offices and a very pretty and natural platform, well lighted and having in its center a flower garden and a sparkling fountain. There are also signal boxes, lights, switches, water tanks—in fact, everything used in conjunction with a well regulated railway station. There is a dial in the center tower, which shows time at New York, Peking, Warsaw and London. Every quarter of an hour the station begins to show signs of life. First all of the little figures of telegraph operators begin to work their machines, the head automaton going through the form of sending a dispatch to the effect that "the line is clear." Then the door opens, and upon the platform appear the station master and his assistants. Next a long line of little figures file up to the miniature ticket office.

After this the porters appear, carrying luggage, the bell rings, and instantly a miniature train dashes out of a tunnel and halts before the platform of the station. While the train is waiting a miniature figure tests the wheels and axles with a tiny hammer, another pumps water into the tank of the engine, while a third busies himself stowing away small lumps of coal in the silver plated tender. There is one signal box, the bell, whereupon the door of the single coach opens, and the little figure slides in on an almost invisible wire, the opening closing after them. A second tap of the bell is the signal for the wheel tester, waterman and fuel carrier to retire into the station house.

After the third signal the whistle gives two toots and the train quickly disappears in a tunnel opposite to the one from which it emerged five minutes before. When the train is out of sight, the station master and his assistants leave the platform, the doors close behind them, and they all retire to the other side of the station house, where, at the expiration of 15 minutes, the train again appears, and the passengers file out and seat themselves in the building preparatory to taking another trip around the station house.—St. Louis Republic.

MILK IN HOT WEATHER.

Best Way For Farmer and Shipper to Take Care of It.

Giving milk in hot weather is the best way of leading milk in hot weather. To keep it sweet for shipping to town. To get the best results for butter making. Describe the plan to be followed where one has ice and modern conveniences, and where there are no such advantages.

When milk is to be shipped for city consumption, it should be most carefully and thoroughly strained immediately after milking. It should next be aerated thoroughly by any process at command, but some method is essential if we are to have it in the best possible condition. As soon as it is aerated it should be cooled. Most milk shippers have a supply of ice and a large tank into which the cans of milk are set. Ice is put in the tank, and the milk is rapidly cooled, being stirred at frequent intervals to prevent the cream from rising. Where ice is not at hand, a spring of cold water, standing at 45 or 50 degrees, will answer, though it is not so reliable.

Many Orange county (N. Y.) milkmen rely on springs, especially where they can have a stream of the spring water running steadily into the tank, but even then in very hot weather the milk will, on occasion, spoil en route to the city. Through aeration will do much toward keeping milk sweet. When milk is to be made into butter, aeration is not desirable, unless in cases where vegetation imparting disagreeable odors to the milk has crept into the pastures. In such a case, a slight aeration would improve the flavor of the butter with only a very small loss of cream. Where a creamery is at hand, the milk is at once put into it and thoroughly cooled. This brings the cream rapidly up. Ordinarily it will be ready for skimming, if desirable, in eight hours. No butter maker today is in a situation to compete with the best trade if he is obliged to do without ice, though there are many dairies where no ice is used that turn out excellent butter.

Spices can be used with deep cans as in the case of milk or it may be set in shallow pans on racks in the coolest cellar at command. In neither case will success be as complete as if ice had been used. The milk will coagulate before the cream is separated, and there is consequent loss. It is important when pans that the cellar be as well ventilated as is compatible with coolness. It should be used only for a milk cellar—nothing else.—Rural New Yorker.
