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EDITORIAL.

The Washington congressmen have won a very pretty fight. They have virtually turned down Chairman Cannon, of the appropriations committee, who poses as a watchdog against western appropriations, and has succeeded in defeating some of the Oregon improvements. While Tom Tongue has made some good speeches about the beautiful climate of Oregon, the Populist congressmen of Washington have been able to get appropriations to improve their harbors, and establish hatcheries, and what not. It seems that a Populist, if he has brains, can be useful to his state even in a Republican congress.

Oregon is a good standard Republican state. It has signified its loyalty to the administration by giving its electors in 1890 and its vote in 1893 to the Republican party. It is a pity, after our people have bound themselves hand and foot upon the altar of the goldocracy, that they have got to take a back seat on appropriations.

It is especially humiliating to be thus triumphed over by a state represented by "fusionists," "silverites," "popocrats," "republicans," if not anarchists. But it seems that Congressmen Jones and Lewis have brains, wit and influence, and their politics is not only endorsed at home but entitles them to respect abroad.

German-Americans are proud of their new Fatherland, and know how to appreciate its advantages and great qualities. Now that war is going on they stand with their new country. Its friends are their friends, and its enemies are their enemies."

The following complimentary article that appeared in the Hawaiian Star the first day after the first Manila expedition reached Honolulu, is especially pleasing to Oregonians, since nearly half of that expedition was composed of Oregon soldiers.

"Could anything be finer than the conduct of 'Uncle Sam's' boys yesterday? Cooped as they had been in the transports, given free shore leave. In a town they were strange to, among people they did not know, there was every temptation to cut loose and show the worst side of their nature. But this town saw what probably no town has ever seen, and that is a couple of thousand men at liberty and not a case which called for police interference."

In the election contest of M. E. The much heralded reform administration, of Portland, seems to be making a record. It is said that the town is literally full of fakirs with all sorts of gambling devices; the nickel-in-the-slot machines, which all disappeared two days before the new administration came into office, are all back again; not a single dance house has been closed, and the ordinance to close ginmills at 10 o'clock is deadlier than ever. There is nothing quite like Republican "reform."

There is but one course for the Union members of the legislature to pursue—take no part in the factional fights of the majority party. It is the duty of the Republicans to elect an United States senator who stands on their own platform, squarely for the gold standard. They have plenty of good candidates and votes enough to elect them. It is not the duty of a single member of the opposition to interfere in this matter.

The city officials of Spokane are wrestling with the tramp problem. The present method of dealing with tramps is to escort them to the city limits and bid them begone. This method is not entirely satisfactory. Several years ago the plan of working the hobos on the rock pile was tried with considerable success. The tramps were given their choice of working or living in solitary confinement without eating, and chose the former. On being released they were warned not to return on penalty of having just twice as much rock to crack, and they never came back.

There are still people who look upon Christian Scientists as a curious or granization of cranks who are destined to disappear like many other short-lived fads. They cannot conceive that a woman should discover a great truth that enables people to live without expensive salaried ministers or church machinery, without patent medicines, cupping or bleeding, and without advertising their religion altogether by word of mouth.

The Boston Transcript describes the communion service at the Mother church of the Christian Scientists and quotes a letter from the founder, Mrs. Eddy, of Concord, N. H., which clearly sets forth that "the followers of Christian Science are believers in but one God, recognizing spirit or immortality as supreme, as against the belief that minds sleep in the netherland, dreams in the animal and wakes in man." The message closed with a reference to the present state of war in which the country is involved, in which Mrs. Eddy counseled her followers to pray for the prosperity of the country, that justice, mercy and peace should continue to characterize the government, and expressed the hope that the Divine Presence might still guide and bless the president and congress and give them wisdom and uphold them with the right arm of his righteousness. There can be no doubt but that the Christian Scientists are well-behaved, patriotic people.

FROM CAMP MERRITT.

A Salem Boy Writes From the "Frisco" Training Barracks.
Herman Amster, Salem volunteer, Co. K, Second regiment, sends his brother a letter with some account of life at the camp of instruction, preparatory to going to Manila. It is dated Camp Merritt July 1.

We arrived safe and sound and were stationed in a barn near Camp Merritt. There should be too much to say and it would take too much paper to go into the details.

We are drilling twice a day under Minnesota officers in the Golden Gate park. It is a lovely place to drill; one of the finest parks I ever saw in my life. You can see more in it every day than at the Oregon state fair. We have not yet received our uniforms and will probably not get them for a week. Many of the boys are kicking because they have to sleep on plank floor and are getting only three different kinds of things to eat at a meal. We have plenty to eat and kind of good stuff, too, and are treated very well. But some of the boys joined the army to have a good time, and now they must eat the soup. The officers are rather strict with them, and some have been in the guard house (but not from Salem.) Half a block from our camp is the free reading and writing room and we are furnished with paper, envelopes and ink. At the same place there is a meeting every night by the Christian Endeavorers of this city. They furnish a good program and after the program refreshments are served. Yesterday we were all vaccinated. Every body must go through the mill before they can go to Manila. One of our boys I think is rather sick of the business. He thought, as did many others, that we would be shipped off to Manila on the first expedition. But I guess we will stay here quite a while yet probably never leave for Manila. In fact, it looks a good deal like that now. Every Sunday, Adolph comes over to the camp and we go out together to the Golden Gate Park. The best band I ever heard plays there every Sunday afternoon for nearly three hours. You ought to see the mass of people in that park every Sunday. To many of the places of interest, the boys in blue are admitted free of charge. Last night I got a pass to be absent from camp until nearly 12, for Adolph wanted me to go with him to the city. He took me through the different parts of the town; Chinatown was the greatest curiosity.

The weather is terrible cold here, and I can hardly write, but I do the best I can under the circumstances. A person can wear an overcoat here all day. As far as I am concerned I would rather have Oregon weather. Please tell father or the folks to send me my glasses and the last Review of Reviews. There is so much said here that a person can hardly go out without glasses. All over the camp the loose sand is about a foot deep.

Reul, a sheep herder working to Kiletka county about fifty miles from here, was accidentally shot on the fourth of July by a forty-four caliber revolver falling from his pocket and striking on a rock. The wound, though painful, will be all right in a short time providing blood poisoning does not set in.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Discussed By Leading Editorial Writers in Our Exchanges.

One William Skeels recently returned from Europe to Sacramento, Cal., and, being interviewed by the Record Union, took occasion to make some comparisons between the workings of European government and of our own, to the great disparagement of the latter.

The Sacramento Bee makes some comments on Mr. Skeels which may probably be noticed by those of us who are sometimes too severely critical of our own country. Says the Bee:

"The first sentence of this remarkable statement by Mr. Skeels is: 'The cost of armies and royalty in foreign countries is great, but the money seems to be honestly expended.'"

"If English means anything, Mr. Skeels desires the people to understand that the money spent on our army has not been honestly expended."

"At the present time, we need contrast only two governments—although it were easy to show other instances of notorious thievery and jobbery by the conductors of other European governments."

Spain and the United States are now at war. The government has not been on a war footing since the rebellion. If there had been stealing in the war department, it must of necessity now have been revealed. Has there been a hint of it? Has there been a whisper anywhere that a cent appropriated for arms, for armament, for clothing, for provision, has not been spent for the purpose for which it was appropriated? Has the government found anything missing which should have been in its place? Nothing.

Turn we now to Spain: Its appropriations for its Army and Navy have been stolen right and left. The very sums shipped over to Cuba to pay its soldiers were appropriated by its officials. This has not only been asserted by Consul Fitzhugh Lee, but it has been admitted by members of the Spanish cabinet.

Spain's navy appropriations have been diverted into the pockets of her politicians; the army appropriations have gone into; the same channels; while money shipped abroad to pay her soldiers has been stolen by her military governors.

This is not the first time that war has revealed such a state of affairs in a European nation. When France went to a battle with United Germany in 1870, it was developed that the French officials had been systematically stealing the army appropriations for years.

No such thing has ever been charged against the officials of this government. Every fact brought to light shows the declaration of war against Spain gives it the lie. We have never known it yet to have been asserted even by any foreigner, save a Spaniard.

It was done, too, by officials of that nation which Mr. Skeels holds up to us as one "where national and municipal affairs are conducted as honestly as private businesses."

Viewed at in one light, however, Mr. Skeels may be taken to be partially correct. The United States Government is being robbed right and left just at the present time. The robbery is not being done by her officials, however, but by contractors. A very strong instance in point comes from San Francisco, where millionaire merchants have foisted upon the soldiers clothing which can be nothing else but the outcome of a premeditated swindle. To the credit of the government officials, whom Mr. Skeels reproaches however, let it be said that these suits were condemned, and that Brigadier-General Charles King will have them made over again.

The men guilty of that infamy are great merchants; among the first citizens, probably, of the California metropolises. And yet we have no hesitation in saying that, were this in days of peace, they should be jailed. Being a time of war, hanging would be a compliment.

Were these same merchants to take a trip after the war to Europe, we have no doubt that they would depreciate the official and private corruption so prevalent in the United States and laud to the skies the governmental and personal honesty they thought they saw in Europe.

The fight which The Dallas Times Mountaineer is putting up for better roads to the producing districts suggests an idea. We are prosperous. Good times mean prompt tax collections and prompt payment of taxes means that every county in Oregon will have plenty of money. Let us not build expensive courthouses and other things far ahead of our growth, and thus burden ourselves with a high annual interest charge. Let us indulge in no form of extravagance. Let each county put as much money as it can spare into roads, not trails, but highways of commerce. Roads develop trade. Strange as it may appear, roads in many parts of Oregon are in such poor condition that people use them only in the summer months, and then they lay in supplies to last the whole year. And while the subject of roads is being referred to, it is worth remembering that the roads which Portland built in the surrounding country in the early days brought immense trade to its merchants and laid the foundation for making the city the commercial metropolis of the Northwest—Oregonian.
