COL. N. B. KNIGHT.

Makes a Motion to Dissolve the Injunction.

N. B. Knight, attorney for Secretary of State H. R. Kincaid, in the injunction suit of P. H. D'Arcy vs. H. R. Kincaid, filed a motion for an order vacating and dissolving the injunction heretofore issued, based upon the following grounds:

First—There is no sufficient reason given in the complaint, or from any other evidence submitted to the court, for issuing the said injunction.

Second—The said court is without jurisdiction to issue or maintain the same.

Mr. Knight also filed a demurrer to the complaint, alleging that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of suit against the defendant, and that the court has no jurisdiction on the subject of the said suit.

Both the demurrer to the complaint and the motion to dissolve the case will have to be argued before Judge Geo. H. Burnett of Department No. 1, as Judge Boise of Department No. 2, is an interested party to the suit. This case will be disposed of next week when Judge Burnett convenes his department and hears the testimony and argument in the D'Arcy-Boise election judgeship contest.

ENLARGED NEWS REPORT.

From Polk County. Sheriff J. G. Van Orsdel, of Polk county, was at Salem today to look after some public business connected with his office.

He has orders to buy a new set of shackles, as the old ones were destroyed in the fire.

The tax lists will not be completed before the first of August.

The old vault is being moved off the court house square to the new office fitted up for the clerk and sheriff.

The county court has asked for plans and specifications for a new court house to be built of brick and stone, to cost not over \$40,000. Wm. Brown, the pioneer merchant, has donated the stone, and the city of Dallas the brick.

It will take 150,000 brick, and if everything is done this fall it will be only to put up the foundation walls and let them stand over winter.

The present jail is not safe nor healthy, but there are no prisoners at present. There was one Indian in the jail and he was released on the fourth of July.

The taxpayers are asking the court to build a new court house. It is expected that independence will offer some resistance by suing out injunctions, but the court is conservative and will not act without good counsel.

WAITING ON GENERAL TORAL. American Generals Are Waiting His Surrender.

BEFORE SANTIAGO, via Playa del Este, July 8, 7 p. m.—General Toral, the Spanish commander at Santiago, has been officially informed by General Shafter of the complete destruction of the Spanish fleet, and that the American warships are now free to cooperate with the army in the reduction of Santiago. He has been given such time as he may deem proper to consider the advisability of capitulating with the garrison.

Although General Toral is apparently anxious to resist to the bitter end, the utter hopelessness of holding out against a siege by land and sea must be forcing itself upon him. His losses have been heavy. The reinforcements upon which he was counting have not arrived. General Pando has left him in the lurch and is now making his way across the country to Havana.

The food supply in Santiago is low, and it is understood that the ammunition is running short. Our position is being hourly strengthened.

The cable operator, who left Santiago yesterday, have been sent back in order that General Toral may be able to communicate freely with General Blanco and the Madrid government.

The prospects for the capitulation of Santiago without further fighting grow with each hour's delay.

The archbishop of Santiago has appealed to General Blanco to surrender the city.

Advocates an Alliance. LONDON, July 8.—The Earl of Rosebery, presiding at a lecture given at Colonial Institute tonight, on "The English Speaking Brotherhood," warmly advocated an Anglo-American understanding, which would be fraught, he said with the best destinies for mankind.

Chartered Transports. WASHINGTON, July 8.—The war department announced the charter of five vessels on the Pacific coast for the next Philippine expedition. They are the Pennsylvania, Pueblo, Titania, Peru and City of Rio de Janeiro. About 4000 men and their equipments can be carried by these vessels.

Departed For New York. HALIFAX, N. S., July 8.—All the survivors of La Bourgoyne disaster have departed for New York. The following is the list of the lost: First-cabin, 81; second-cabin, 113; steerage, 245; officers and crew, 115; total, 555.

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SECOND EXPEDITION

Transports Arrived at Honolulu June 23.

HONOLULU, June 23, via San Francisco, July 8.—The steamship Chiba, of the Manila transport fleet, reached here from San Francisco on the morning of the 23rd, 12 hours ahead of the other vessels of the fleet. The steamship received a warm welcome. A large crowd of people were on the wharf. Brigadier-General Greene immediately sent an adjutant at the wharf with compliments to United States Consul-General Heywood and President Dole, who were on the wharf, and conveyed them on board.

At 9 o'clock all the soldiers were allowed to go ashore. They marched to Waikiki, where the men took a sea bath and then marched to town, and at 2 o'clock were provided with a feast on the executive grounds. This function was carried out precisely on the lines of the first expedition. Ladies waited on the tables. The officers were entertained at army headquarters.

There was an abundance of refreshments for everybody.

At 6:30 the same day the Zealandia, Colon and Senator were sighted. It was quite late when the vessels reached the harbor. At midnight all anchored for the night. The men landed next day and were entertained by the citizens of Honolulu.

The expedition started for Manila on the 24th.

The Monterey and collier Brutus arrived from San Diego on the 24th, having left the latter port on the 11th.

The Monterey experienced a heavy northwest swell nearly all the way. She ran under her own steam until the 19th, and then the Brutus took her in tow for several days. The Monterey recoiled and was ready for sea yesterday morning, but was delayed by the Brutus, whose engines required overhauling. Both vessels left for Manila today.

Ensign T. R. Wall, of Portland, Or., now on the Brutus, found on his arrival here that orders had been forwarded which raised him in rank to lieutenant.

Ex-Queen Liliuokalani is expected to return to Honolulu July 20. Her return has no political significance.

Steamer Wrecked. SEATTLE, July 8.—George Langdon who arrived here from Alaska, reports the wreck of the river steamer Iowa 60 miles below White Horse rapids June 15. She had aboard a party of 38 men from Iowa, known as the "Starbuck" party. All the passengers reached shore in small boats, but their outfits were lost.

Up to June 27, it is estimated that 7000 boats, with an average of four persons each, had passed through the rapids.

Stories of drowning in the White Horse rapids have been greatly exaggerated, but Langdon says four men had been drowned when he left. Two were from San Francisco. One of them was named Matheson.

Financial Panic in Chili. NEW YORK, July 8.—A dispatch from Valparaiso says: A financial panic has been occasioned by the withdrawal from exportation of gold, which caused the Chilean government to the banks of Chili until the 26th. During the suspension the government will consider the advisability of issuing paper money.

LIMA, Peru, July 8.—Owing to the financial conditions in Chili, a run for gold commenced on the banks, and thereupon the government closed the banks for five days.

Must Be Towed. SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—The local inspectors of hulls and boilers have issued a notice that henceforth none of the Yukon river steamers shall carry passengers between this port and St. Michaels. They will be classed as barges and must be towed. This decision will materially affect the interests of those who have river steamers and expect to carry passengers on them to St. Michaels.
