OPINIONS OF SALEMITES

As to Advantages of Acquiring the Philippine Islands. The news of the surrender of Manila and the question of terms of peace with Spain has precipitated interest on the question of acquiring the Philippine Islands as American territory. The following expressions were heard from citizens of the Capital City.

Claud Hatch: "We've got 'em. What are we going to do with 'em? Other nations will hold us responsible for being in possession. I don't think we want them but how can we get rid of them?"

A. N. Bush: "We want Cuba and Porto Rico. But I can't conceive of anything more undesirable than the Philippines. Too far away. I hope the president will express himself. If he does I'll endorse him."

John Q. Wilson: "Hawaii has a government and the Cubans will soon be capable of governing themselves. But the Philippines we have no use for."

J. H. Albert: "Dewey should have sunk those ships and come right home. We have no business over there."

Dr. John Shaw: "Beyond a coaling station we want no territory so far away."

Senator N. H. Loney had not made up his mind that we wanted more than a coaling station and land enough to protect it.

Frank Lovell: "We can't trust the Spaniards to rule the natives and we can't trust the natives to rule the island. It is hard to say what to do."

Hon. Jeff Myers: "We should protect our commercial interests first. I am opposed to returning the islands to Spain, or allowing any European power to control them."

Dr. Bradshaw: "If it's going to involve us in any international complications we do not want them."

W. H. Odell: "We ought not to let go of all that we have gained there. Especially ought we to hold Luzon, the principal island that has been surrendered to Dewey. We owe it to the native races that they be not turned over to the barbarism of Spanish rule, but be advanced toward some of the benefits of civilization."

H. R. Kincaid, Secretary of State: "We shall have a port and one of the best islands, at least. I don't see why a free republic like ours shouldn't have anything that any first-class nation in the world considers desirable, and if we don't have it some old-world monarchy will."

C. H. Markham, general freight and passenger agent S. P. Co. would only say that he thought it a question of expediency from a commercial standpoint, to be determined after an investigation just as any other business matter would be looked into. If desirable to have the islands let us keep them.

Gov. Lord: Favours strongly compelling Spain to get off the new world entirely and to relinquish Cuba and Porto Rico. Believes in annexation of Cuba. The remoteness of the Philippines, the ignorance and superstition of their people makes their annexation undesirable. Temporary possession is necessary, but they are not fitted, as a mixed Asiatic race, to become part of our population.
