THE CUCKOO PRESS.

It is true, as the dispatches indicated, that President McKinley is severe to launching the United States upon the proposed new course of territorial aggression, he should, in justice to the Cuckoos, have given a hint of his intentions some time ago. It will be extremely embarrassing to the journals which have been shouting so lustily for the annexation of the Philippines, the Ladrones, the Carolines, the Canaries, Cuba, Porto Rico, and the point of land in Africa opposite Gibraltar. Of course, some of the exclusively gold standard organs would not hesitate to turn and rend the president, should their masters direct them to do so, but it seems that the New York banking interests are beginning to use their influence in opposition to the imperialistic policy.

It must be remembered that millions of Spanish bonds are held by the allied banking interests, and that, if Spain is stripped of all her sources of revenue, there will be a heavy loss on those bonds. This makes it reasonable to suppose that the great financiering combine will soon come prominently to the front, in an effort to save to Spain some of the possessions from which she can squeeze a revenue. In that case, we may expect to see a most radical change in the tone of the "great" newspapers that have been whooping up the policy of untrammeled piracy. Those who owe allegiance to the gold combine alone will be called down, and those who think only through the administration quill will also display their wonderful agility as truncheons.

It is to be hoped that Mr. McKinley has been correctly reported, and he should be given all the credit which is due. If he brings this country back into the waking realm of common sense and common honesty, out of the nightmare of territorial conquest and aggression, he will be taking a long step toward proving his title to a niche in the temple of fame. It has been, more than anything else, a sudden aberration, a debacle. We entered upon this war in the name of humanity, and with a secondary determination to "remember the Maine." Not until after the first day of May did we awake to the possibility of territorial conquest. Then suddenly the air was full of it. The microbes attacked the "great" dailies

first, and the disease broke out in the country newspaper offices as fast as the mail could carry to them the infection. Our whole policy, foreign and domestic, our whole future as a nation, was to be radically changed, and it changed instantly without reflection, without any calm discussion and weighing of pros and cons. The chance to grab suddenly itself, made many of our intensely "honorable" fellow citizens as suddenly fall down and worship the fetish of the highways. Many forgot completely the cause for which we went to war. A "great daily," published in Portland, Oregon, said editorially a few days ago: "Not can we restore them (the Philippines) to Spain, for that would be a confession that we had gone to war without cause." Equally complete atrophy of the organs of memory is shown in the same "great" paper when it says: "Self-preservation forbids that this vantage point in the commerce of the Pacific should be thrown away after the expenditure of life and great treasure in its acquisition." (One man killed and no ships damaged.) This shows the distressing sort of logic which characterizes the imperialistic press; so does the following, from the same source: "No indemnity from Spain, if Spain were in a position to pay indemnities, will compensate for the damage our trade would sustain in the abandonment." How can our trade be so irreparably damaged by the relinquishment of a position that we never had, and never had the slightest expectation of having, until a couple of months ago?

It is not probable that the people have been so suddenly swept off their feet by this jack-in-the-box apparition of imperialistic jingoism, and their sound common sense, without regard to party, will commend Mr. McKinley's moderation, if he takes the genuine American course in this matter.

THE JOURNAL is receiving some decidedly ludicrous abuse from the cuckoo press of the state, on account of its anti-piratical position. The most amusing variety, however, comes from those editors who agree perfectly with THE JOURNAL's conclusions but go out of their way to condemn its motives, an exact knowledge of these alleged motives being involved from the critic's inner consciousness.

OUR SOLDIER REPORTER.

What a Salem Boy Finds to Write About Since Enlisting.

[Following letter is from John W. Cochran, for several years city editor of the JOURNAL. He has enlisted as a member of battery B, Light Artillery. Says they will get their equipment about Aug. 15.]

PORTLAND, July 29, Couch street armory, Battery B, U. S. Vols.—The grand send-off—tendered—Salem's quota of Battery B, Light Artillery, Oregon Volunteers, as it left for Portland Tuesday morning elicited many a complimentary remark from the young volunteers.

Reaching Portland we left the train on the East Side and marched thence to the O. N. G. Armory on Tenth and Couch streets, where we were enthusiastically received by the Baker City contingent. A more jolly and undisciplined company of young men than those sent from Baker City is hard to find. The majority of them resigned clerical positions commanding remuneration while many forsook the profession they had entered upon, in order that they might enter the service of Uncle Sam.

Our mess hall having not yet been arranged, the battery took dinner and supper Tuesday at the Merchant hotel. Wednesday morning we began eating government rations. We have an experienced cook from Baker City, a member of the battery. Our victuals are of the most substantial kind. Beans, fresh meat, bacon, potatoes, coffee and tea without milk, and bread without butter. Frequently some kind-hearted person sends us a basket of delicious fruit which the boys greatly appreciate. It is astonishing to note the amount of beans and pork that is required daily to feed the battery of 100 men. For instance Wednesday 125 pounds fresh meat, and 90 pounds of bread were used in addition to bacon, beans and potatoes.

Tuesday evening we were mustered into the service of Uncle Sam, by Capt. H. F. Kendall. The exercise was conducted in the armory drill hall and was witnessed by a small crowd. Captain W. J. Riley, and Lieutenants J. C. Rutledge and Allen Case, are splendid military men, courteous and pleasant, though stern in the enforcement of regulations governing a military organization. Our first sergeant, Frank A. Jewett, of Baker City is one of the most popular non-commissioned officers of the battery.

All of our non-commissioned officers have not yet been named but will be announced in a few days. On partial appointment of officers already made, Salem fared quite well, receiving two out of six appointments. Jay Bowman will abandon the personal to Blackstone and acquainted himself with the duties of a sergeant while Hurlie Moore, the genial prescription clerk for Lunn & Brooks, did duty for the first time Thursday as corporal.

Thursday evening secured leave of absence from 6 until 10 p. m. during which time saw Phil Metcahan Jr. who holds a responsible position in Wells, Fargo & Co's Bank, and Chas. Townsend, who does clerical work in the business office of the same company. Chas. B. Hodgkin, son of Deputy State Treasurer F. E. Hodgkin, is shipping clerk in the large wholesale hardware establishment of Corbett, Felling & Co.

Members of battery are to be up and ready for roll call at 6 a. m. Breakfast is served at 6:30, dinner at the noon hour and supper at 6 p. We are to be in bed at 11 p. m. when the lights are extinguished.

We drill in squads in the armory drill hall every morning from 8 to 9:30 or 10 o'clock and in the afternoon from 4 to 5:30 o'clock. The battery is becoming quite proficient in the preliminary tactics and as they are successively mastered, more difficult maneuvers will be given for drill.

One of the Baker City boys voiced the sentiment of not only his Baker City colleagues but also of the Salem volunteers, who are not one whit less patriotic, when upon being asked by a friend, who predicted for him a "grass-mowing campaign" at Vancouver Barracks, he replied, "yes, and we will eat the hay too, by gosh."

Contrary to expectations, Battery B has been quartered in the O. N. G. armory in this city since reaching here Tuesday morning.

The writer has been officially informed, however, that the battery will be removed to Vancouver in the near future.

The universal talk of peace that is now receiving so much attention is causing many of the boys, who are very anxious to see service, to look blue and feel discouraged. But the majority are still hopeful of being ordered out yet.

THE MAJOR'S EXPERIENCE.
