Wheelmen Will Protect Themselves.
The reported intention of the city council to rule bicycles off all the sidewalks has aroused the wheelmen of the city and they are making every effort to bring about such a condition of affairs that they will be allowed to retain their use. A few boys and irresponsible persons are causing the trouble by their thoughtlessness, and the great majority of wheelmen, who use their wheels as a matter of convenience in going to and from their work, are trying to take such steps as will insure them the privilege of the walks, and at the same time cause the ordinance now in force to be obeyed.

A petition is being prepared pledging the signers to obey the rules of the city ordinance and praying the council to cause all other riders to do the same. An organized wheelman's union is rumored, whose object would be to pledge its members to obey the law and use their influence to have others do so. No effort will be spared by those who have undertaken to remedy the evil to so change the existing conditions as to satisfy the council that the wheeling fraternity, of Salem, will use all due caution and thoughtfulness in order to retain the use of the sidewalk.

Eastern Porto Rico.

American Troops Have Full Possession.

American Marines Have Lighted the Cape San Juan Light House.

ON BOARD THE ASSOCIATED PRESS DISPATCH BOAT, Off San Juan de Porto Rico, Aug. 6, via St. Thomas, D. W. I., Aug. 6.—The Americans have taken possession of the eastern portion of the island.

Small parties of marines have been landed, who have lighted the lamps in the lighthouses at Cape San Juan and other lighthouses along the coast. They met with no resistance. Indeed, at Cape San Juan deputations of citizens came out to meet them.

The warships now in this vicinity are the Montgomery, Annapolis, New Orleans, Puritan and Amphitrite. The two former are looking for the troop transports which left the United States and have scattered all about the island. The Annapolis rounded up the Whitney, Florida and Raleigh and they are at Cape San Juan.

There seems to have been a serious mistake as to the rendezvous, for no towships got to the same place, and it will take several days to locate them and get them to Ponce, where General Miles is awaiting them.

Off San Juan the cruiser New Orleans alone maintains the blockade. The city is grim and silent, but back of her pillow walls there will be plenty of determination and light when the Americans open fire.

Captain-General Macias has issued a proclamation, in the course of which he says:

"Spain has not sued for peace, and I can drive off the American boats now, as I did Sampson's attempt before."

A daughter of the captain-general is helping to drill the gunners in the forts. Altogether there are 9500 Spanish regulars in the city.

The troops of the enemy who are retreating from Ponce and the other towns on the south coast occupied by the Americans have not arrived.

An official dispatch from Porto Rico says: "American cavalry, assisted by the insurgents, have charge of Puenta and Cabejas, the light house station at San Juan."

A SALEM BOY, PROMOTED.
Ed Colgan of Co. K, Second Oregon Volunteer Infantry with Dewey's Fleet.

The following was received by Mr Colgan's parents at Salem, dated, Cavite, Philippine Island, July 1, 1898.

We arrived here last night and was very glad to get in port, although we had a very nice trip and I enjoyed myself fine. I saw our gunboat bombard Fort Santa Cruz on the Ladrone Islands, and was present at the capture of the fort and saw the stars and stripes raised over the islands. We captured the governor and his officials and took them, with 50 soldiers as prisoners. We are anchored in the harbor where Dewey sank the Spanish fleet and we can see the masts of them sticking out of the water all around us. There are United States gun boats here for further orders.

We do not know when we are to go ashore, but expect to go before long. Everybody is writing as the mail goes this afternoon to Hong Kong and it does not give us much time to write.

We do not know when we will have a chance again, but I will try and write whenever I get a chance. Sam Hutchinson, of Hubbard, died on the way over here and was buried at sea, on the day that the stars and stripes were raised over Fort Santa Cruz. He was not on the same boat I was and I could not see him, but I got acquainted with him before we left Portland. I found him to be a very good kind of a boy, only a little rough, as is the fault with lots of boys now days. I have been a pretty good boy since I left home and have been promoted. I am now corporal. It is not very much, but is the first step to the higher place and I am going on higher if there is any show for it.
