Proposals for Wood

The Salem Light and Traction Company will receive sealed bids until 10 o'clock a. m., Wednesday, the 17th day of August, A. D. 1898, for the furnishing and delivery at its power house of 1000 cords or less of four foot wood.

Bids must state: Number of cords. Kind and quality. Date of delivery. Payment to be made in cash upon completion of contract and acceptance by the company. The company reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

Hohenlohe, although a personal friend of the deceased, and whose coming had been heralded in time, was not allowed to see the body. The coffin was lowered down 15 minutes before his arrival, to the intense sorrow of the aged chancellor. Persons who were present in the house at the time affirm that Prince Herbert issued orders to sorder the coffin down as soon as the telegram from the emperor arrived, announcing his majesty's coming to Friedrichsruhe.

A number of German papers affirm that the causes of all this strange behavior are partly because Prince Herbert is seriously unwell, and partly because there were about the house a large number of highly important and sensational papers, mostly letters to Prince Bismarck, and that there was fear that these would be stolen in the haste and turmoil occasioned by the crowds of visitors.

The order countermanning the public obsequies was received here with consternation. The Bismarck family, on their part, gave out that the peculiar method of conducting the arrangements for Prince Bismarck's temporary interment were wholly in conformity with his wishes, adding that the deceased had remarked that he "wanted a rest, at least after death."

The Berlin correspondent here of the Associated Press had an interview with foreign officials regarding all these matters and the following statement was made to him: "As to the emperor countermanning his first order regarding the public obsequies, there was no specific reason for it. As to the epitaph, it is known that it was Prince Bismarck's wish to have it so worded, and we cannot hinder it. As to the memoirs, there is no anticipation on the part of the government that any unpleasantness will result from their publication, and there is no intention to stop them."

Among the public testimonials will be a great demonstration at Niederwald, arranged by a number of Rhenish cities, and a large memorial meeting takes place at Stuttgart and another at Hamburg, where a public subscription has been opened for the erection of a giant monument to Prince Bismarck at Sachsenwald. There will be similar ceremonies at Breslau, Dresden, Leipzig, Liegnitz, Augsburg, Munich, Karlsruhe, Koenigsberg, and other cities. From the Germans in Austria, many signs of sympathy have come. In upper Austria at a large representative meeting in Wols, resolution was passed to wear black cornflowers until Sunday.

Memorial to Wm. Ledgerwood.

Our friend and brother William Ledgerwood has left us! He died July 25, 1898. He was born in Campbell county, Tennessee, April 4, 1811. His father emigrated to Missouri in 1822; he was married to Miss Delia Parson, November 13, 1837. He and his wife came to Sonoma county, California in 1849, moved to Oregon in 1869, where they have since resided. Eight years ago Mrs. Ledgerwood was called from life's labors to her reward in a better land. Of nine children, four sons and five daughters, two sons and two daughters survive them.

Brother Ledgerwood died in his 87th year. He was a man of strong convictions, and never failed to declare them, if he in his opinion, duty or occasion called for their expression. Being spared to enjoy so long a life, with his strong convictions, it could not be expected that he would not antagonize the opinion of others, but

little did he care when convinced of the correctness of his position. He made it the rule of his life to do unto all men as he would have them do unto him.

When such a man dies, we should pause and consider whether we are following in his footsteps and profiting by his good example. In the family circle he was firm but kind and affectionate, as a citizen of the commonwealth he was peaceable and law abiding.

In view of Brother Ledgerwood's death we are admonished to behold how swiftly the sands run and how rapidly our lives are drawing to a close.

"Thus wastes man; today he puts forth the tender leaves of hope, tomorrow blossoms and bears his blushing honors thick upon him. The next day comes a frost which nips the shoot, and when he thinks his greatness is still aspiring he feels like autumn leaves."

Eight years ago, Brother Ledgerwood gave God his heart, and his last words were: "Lord Receive My Spirit."

The funeral services were conducted by the writer at Rocky Point school house, where a large assemblage of citizens paid the last respects to the dead.

The grief stricken children have the sincere sympathy of the entire community.

How glad we are to find recorded in the grand old book: "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live."

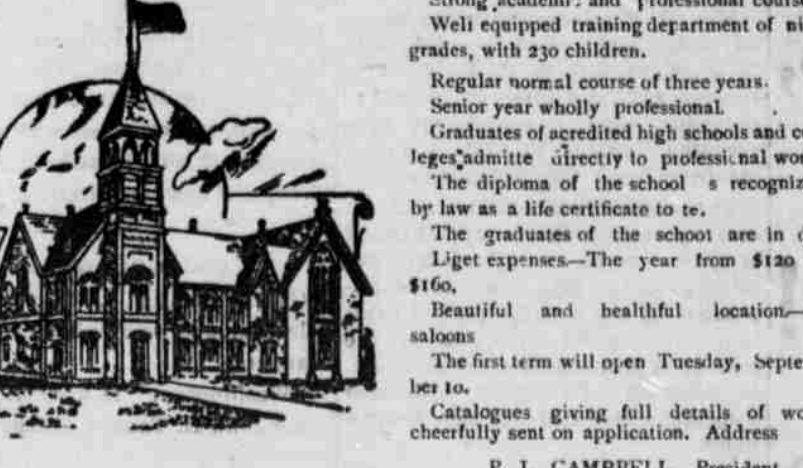
