Proceeding At the Various Departments of the Capital County Seat.

SALEM GIRLS IN PORTLAND.

Rescued From Sin and Debauchery and Caret for.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 8.—Officer Stuart took three young girls from a dissolute career, and is on the track of several more.

Grace Moser, alias Williams, aged 17 years, and Pauline Tracy, 16 years old, are the two others destined for the same reformatory. These girls have homes at Salem, and life at the reformatory was too painful for them, and they came here entering upon a pace that physically and morally kills.

The Mosier girl first came here several months ago, and about the middle of last month she sent for her friend, Pauline, who, as yet, has not altogether lost her outward modesty. Grace, however, has grown tough in a short time. When officer Stuart yesterday told her that she must go to the Magdalen Home, she replied: "I'll blow up the place and sell the remnants for cordwood."

These girls have been drinking quite freely of late, and yesterday afternoon Detective Ford arrested David Thornton and Thomas Duval, colored saloon-keepers, on Fourth street, on charges of having furnished them with liquor.

Pauline Tracy and Grace Williams were to have been disposed of by Municipal Judge Hennessy at a late hour this afternoon. The Williams girl, or rather Mosier, claims to be 19 years old, and expresses willingness to go home, if so allowed to do. The Tracy girl now is similarly disposed.

Cannot Be Accepted.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—The following telegram was received by Governor Tanner:

"Washington, D. C. T. — Governor John R. Tanner, Chicago: It is regretted by the secretary of war that there is no law under which Colonel Baynes' Canadian-American regiment can be accepted at this time.

"H. C. Connor, Adjutant-General."

The Canadian-American regiment, which was organized in Chicago by Colonel Baynes, formerly of the British army, consists largely of yellow fever immunes, who have seen service in the British army. The immunes were offered to Governor Tanner to be tendered for service, to take the places of the dead and wounded in the volunteer regiments now at the front.

A Backdown.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—The correspondent of the Daily News at Odessa gives under reserve a report that the Russian charge d'affaires at Peking, M. Pavloff, will soon be removed, and he regards it as indicating a Russian backdown.

Corvallis—Chas Ryder was accidentally killed here Thursday afternoon while running an edge. He was struck with a piece of slab over the heart and died in a few moments.

Newberg—The Newberg Fair Association did not intend to hold a fair this year, but they have submitted a proposition to Newberg citizens. A guarantee of \$150, \$100 expenses and \$50 for premiums is asked.

Forest Grove—Harris N. Brooten, of North Dakota, was here last week in the interest of a colony of 30 families, looking for a location. He liked the locality, and expects to return with the colony about October 1.

Boscage—A young man named Harry West was drowned on Friday, while attempting to swim across the Umpqua river. West was unmarried, was 24 years of age, and his parents live in Oakland, California.

Pendleton—William Raymond, a farmer living near here, has been arrested on a charge of having put poison in a watering trough. Four horses belonging to the Brown family died after drinking the water.

Roseburg—There is talk of the railroad division terminal being moved from here to Kiddle. The R. R. company made a proposition some time ago to make extensive improvements here if a certain piece of land were donated, but the citizens have made no move, as yet.

Albany—One land sale here Saturday contributed \$15 toward carrying the war into Spain. It was the deed conveying 600 acres of land belonging to the estate of the late D. B. Monteith to Milton Hale, the consideration being \$15,000. It is the largest amount of stamp affixed to any one instrument in this county.

Talent—The four-year-old child of J. A. Harrey, got hold of a bottle of carbolic acid and drank a part of the contents last week. Everything possible was done to relieve it, but the little sufferer died. This is the second child of the family poisoned with carbolic acid.

The Dalles—There is some uneasiness here regarding the whereabouts of Charles Carter, of Caleb. He came here on July 24th put his wagon and team up at the Columbia feed yard, and since then has not been seen. L. S. Davis, manager of the feed yard, learned that Carter went to Portland, but since then no word has been received from him.
