Drowned.
ROSSLAND, B. C. Aug. 12.—Harold E. Robertson, banker and real estate and insurance broker, of Trail, was drowned in the swift current of the Columbia, in the presence of nearly 100 people, who were powerless to aid him. Captain W. J. Devitt, provincial officer, who was also in the capsized boat, saved himself, after swimming nearly two miles.
The two men were in a canoe, and were caught in an eddy. Robertson could not swim. Devitt brought him up twice, but Robertson lost his presence of mind and tried to right the canoe, which overturned and sent him to eternity. Devitt was carried two miles down stream until just above the rapids, when he got into an eddy and was saved, although completely exhausted.
He was brought home on a horse, but immediately took charge of two parties, who blasted the river all afternoon in an attempt to raise Robertson's body. The heat, excitement, and exhaustion were too much, and toward evening Devitt was carried home unconscious.
Robertson was the successor to the R. J. Bealy Company, at Trail. His mother and brother live at North Sidney, Cape Breton. He leaves a wife and infant daughter. He was about 32 years old.
