Eugene—The tannery is now turning out from 800 to 1000 shoes of leather per month, for which ready sale is found in San Francisco. As the value of their output is about \$4 a side, it will be seen that they are doing a business of from \$3000 to \$4000 per month. Four months time is required to put a hide through the tanning process. Some trouble is now experienced in obtaining hickock bark, and the indications are that in a few years it will be necessary to move to where bark can be obtained more easily.

Corvallis—There is much activity in the local paper market. It will be ten days or two weeks yet before drying begins, but early bids for the new crop are pouring in on local growers. As already announced the Corvallis Prune company has contracted its entire output at 34. Besides this sale, which will probably run up into the tens of thousands of dollars, Thomas Bell has sold his entire crop at 34 and 4 cents, and yesterday F. P. Shegans closed a contract for the disposal of one car load of his new crop at 43 cents for smaller and 41 cents for forties and fifties, and the prices quoted are for the dried product delivered sacked aboard the cars at Corvallis, at which time the purchase money is due the seller.

La Grande—An iron foundry is to be put in here by W. J. Dowelling of Dayton Washington.

Oregon City—David C. McAfee, a pioneer and veteran of the late civil war died here yesterday aged 71.

Astoria—The grand regatta at this place cost more money than was anticipated. The committee is \$800 short.

Astoria—Clatsop's first flour mill will be in operation in a few days. It is located on Big Fishhawk river. Its capacity is 24 barrels per day.

Enterprise—A three day's race meeting will be held here beginning September 16, and ending September 17. Purses to the amount of \$150 will be contested for.

Baker City—The assessment roll in this county shows that there are 978 miles of railroad valued at \$302,700 in the county. The county has a net taxable property of \$2,662,478.

There are now four regular four-horse freight teams and two regular pack trains plying between Cottage Grove and Bohemia, so great is the rush of business in the mines.

A Brick With a History.  
Florence West—A few days ago E. C. Knowles of Mapleton received by express a brick which is a reminder of his youthful days. Mr. Knowles was born in New Hampshire in 1820. The next year his father built a new house and as was the custom of the time it contained a large fire-place made of brick. These bricks he manufactured himself near the site of the house. One day while he was engaged in this work with his little son playing near, the boy stepped on one of the soft bricks leaving thereon a perfect print of the little foot. Mr. Knowles scratched the date (1821) on the brick, burned and used it in constructing the fire place. Years passed away and the father having died the son E. C. Knowles now grown to manhood came into possession of the homestead which he afterwards sold and the place passed to other hands. Mr. Knowles moved to Minnesota many years ago and later came to Oregon. The brick with the foot print on it remained in its place in the chimney till some three or four years ago when a nephew of Mr. Knowles obtained and gave it to his mother. She sent it to her brother in Oregon, who received it a few days ago, and now he can see the size of track he made nearly 80 years ago.
