BURGLARS.

GOVERNOR LORD RETURNS.
Reports Our Soldier Boys in Improved Condition.

Gov. Wm. P. Lord returned from San Francisco, where he has spent several days in the city in the interest of Oregon's troops stationed at that place.

The governor spent nearly three days among the officers and men, and is pleased to report that they are now in good health and spirits. It is his opinion that the men enjoying good health and in much better spirits than before their removal.

The governor says that Prof. Jones, the Hayden boys and many others of his acquaintances among the troops are developing into good soldiers, and that as a whole our men make a better appearance than most troops. He now thinks that they will be sent either to Honolulu or Manila, but as there is no transport at hand, it is difficult to tell when they will sail.

The country between Oregon and San Francisco, the governor says, looks very dry and desolate.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 13.—Joe Choynski had all the best of the bout with Joe Goddard last night at the Arena. Goddard was considerably heavier than the Californian, but he lacked in science. Choynski made a chopping block of the Austrian, and several times it looked as though Goddard would not be able to stay the full round. There was but little fighting in the opening round. In the second round Choynski landed several hard lefts on Goddard's face, but the latter could not get in a good blow.

The third, fourth and fifth rounds were repetitions of the second, Choynski doing nearly all the leading, and landing almost at will. In the closing round Goddard fought wildly, while Choynski was calm and banded Joe on the jaw, sending him to his knees. Choynski landed hard and often, but he could not stop the Australian.

Knocked Out.
New York, Sept. 13.—Jack Bonner, the middle-weight pugilist from Summit, Pa., gained an easy victory over Dan Creedon, the Australian boxer, in the second round at the Greater New York Athletic last night.

Creedon was knocked down by a heavy right-hand punch on the jaw, and in falling he twisted his right ankle. He was knocked out by any means. He groped around and tried to regain his feet, but his ankle was too badly injured for him to stand up straight, and he fell again and was counted out.
