LEGISLATIVE PROCEEDINGS.

HOUSE—MONDAY AFTERNOON.
The speaker was authorized to appoint a mailing clerk and three pages and said he would announce these appointments at the opening Tuesday morning.
Moody, Williamson and Beach were appointed to invite the secretary of state to administer the oath to the newly elected officers, which that gentleman did in a few moments.
Curtis seconded by Myers, offered resolution that each member be provided house and senate journal and laws of 1896 and a copy of Hill's code. Resolution adopted.
McCulloch moved that three notify the governor of the organization of the house. Carried. McCulloch, McAllister and Ross were appointed as such committee.
Myers offered resolution for providing each member with five daily or weekly newspapers. McCulloch moved to indefinitely postpone and pending a vote Mr. Myers withdrew the resolution.
Moody moved to notify the senate of the organization of the house.
Mr. Curtis offered a resolution, which asked that the reporters of the various newspapers be invited to seats within the bar and that the sergeant-at-arms be instructed to provide conveniences for them.
Mr. Williamson introduced a resolution inviting the ministers of the various religious denominations of the state to open the daily session of the house with prayer.
A resolution was offered that a committee of five be appointed to determine and recommend the compensation of the officers of the house.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Shows a Businesslike Inclination to Economize.

House and Senate Vote Down Grab Games—Governor's Message in This Issue.

In the senate the scheme for the usual whitewash of the state treasury was voted down, as was the code steal, which ought to cut off the house from similar grabs as neither house alone ought to appropriate money in any manner. In both cases Hon Ben. Selling did the hard fighting.

In the house the resolution to buy five papers for each member was cut down to three, the Union members voting against buying any. Mr. McCulloch tabled the resolution to investigate the state treasury, on the theory that it belonged to the work of the regular session.

Speaker Carter is catching onto his work nicely, considering that he never saw a legislature in session before he took the gavel to preside over one himself. He will not announce his committees Wednesday, as stated.

He feels that much depends upon their work, and as their organization of the General Assembly may be continued at the regular session, if it gives satisfaction, he will strive hard to get his committees as nearly right as possible. Economy and the dispatch of business will be his sole guides.

In the senatorial field the faction seem to have concentrated upon M. C. George, one of Gov. Lord's appointees for circuit judge, who is trying to play both sides for support. It looks as though the first round would be a count of noses between George and Corbett, or a scattering of votes between a multiplicity of candidates to prevent an election. No senatorial caucus has been announced, but it is certain that the Mitchell-McBride contingent will make a determined stand one way or another, to defeat the election of Mr. Corbett at all hazards.

The Union members held a conference this morning at which only members were allowed to be present, but no conclusion was reached as to senatorial candidates. Several names were canvassed but a decision was deferred to another conference. The names considered are men of the highest character.

Ben Selling is the business senator so far, and he has the senate back of him.

U. S. Senator McBride, accompanied by his nephew and private secretary E. C. Giltner, was in the lobbies of Hotel Willamette this afternoon.
