NEXT CONGRESS. Republican Majority in Congress Will Be Small.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The Washington Post presents today a view of the political situation with special reference to the complexion of the next house of representatives. In summarizing its dispatches, the Post says:

"While Democratic gains are outlined in many states, the figures given by the correspondents of the Post do not yet make it positive that the Republicans will lose control of the house. There is at present in the house of representative a Republican majority of 56 over all parties combined, and this majority will be difficult to completely overcome. There is no doubt that it will be reduced to a very small number, but the present indications do not point to its entire disappearance.

"The estimates made by the Post's correspondents show that 166 districts in the United States will certainly be Republican in the approaching election unless the unexpected happens, and 13 additional districts will give the Republicans a majority of the house.

"According to the Post's advice, there are no less than 42 doubtful districts, the large number in a great measure due to the caution of the Post's correspondents in declining to place in the certain column any district which contains an element of doubt. Out of this 42, however, there are at least 20 districts in which the chances are said to favor the republicans. For instance, there are districts in Massachusetts, Maryland, Delaware, New York, West Virginia, Ohio, Michigan and Wyoming which are classed as doubtful, but which the Republicans will probably carry. With 168 districts assigned with certainty to the Republicans, as against 123 assigned to the Democrats, according to the Post's figures, the party in power has an easier path to travel to the desired goal. The Populists are given 13 seats and the silver Republicans, 4.

WAYS MEANS

Committee Swinging a Sharp Ax.

No Interest on Bills of Last Legislature.

Status of Legislation at the Present Date.

The ways and means committee have been at work since early this morning completing the appropriation bill, which may be submitted to both houses for debate Tuesday morning.

The bill will be large on account of the large number of deficiencies

THE APPROPRIATIONS. The Ways and Means committee reached some important conclusions at its sessions today. Senator Selling and Representative Flagg are doing heroic work for retrenchment all along the line and are upheld by Chairman Taylor and Beach and the entire committee.

It was decided today that all the appropriations for orphan's homes go over to the regular session. The committee is overwhelmed with bills for legal services of outside lawyers, growing out of litigation in the attorney general's office. It was decided to pay no interest on warrants for members of last legislature. Senators and their employes will be paid in full. The Benson and Davis "house" will fare alike—five days pay to each, but full pay to their employes. At the regular session a bill will be proposed to unite the Mute school and Blind Institute, and use the present Mute school for an institution for idiotic and feeble minded children. Indian Excitement Still on in Northern Minnesota.
