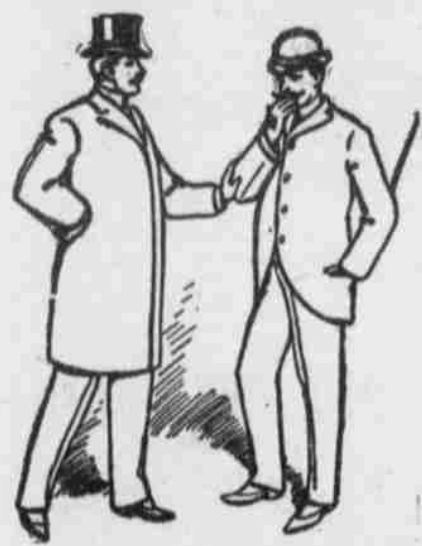

GREAT STRIKE

In Virden Practically
Ended.

Negro Miners Detended Them-
selves Well.

Mine Manager Lukens Blames
Governor Tanner.

(By Associated Press to The Journal.)
PARIS, Oct. 13.—Many men are returning to work this morning. The great strike is practically ended.

VIRIDEN, Ill., Oct. 13.—The town is quiet today. Two galling guns are on the public square and infantrymen at each corner in the business district as the only evidence of yesterday's riot. Col. McKnight of the governor's staff visited the stockade, and served notice on Manager Lukens that the soldiers would today disarm all inmates.

The negro miners were armed to the teeth, Wednesday. Men are warning into Virden on every train and highway today. Most of them are miners, but unarmed. Scenes at the improvised morgue are pitiable. Citizens of Virden are bitter in condemnation of the governor for not preventing the terrible doings of yesterday and rage over the action of the mine operators grows more fierce. Their sympathies are wholly with the miners.

Manager Lukens remained at his desk in the office all night issuing orders to his men. He said:

"The blood of every man shed here is on the governor's head. He is absolutely outside of the law, and has no justification whatever in refusing to send troops. His public statement that the miner had the same right to fight for his property, which was his labor, as the mineowner did to protect his property, inspired the men to the action which they took today in firing upon the train as soon as it came into our town."

Mine owners deny Lukens' responsibility for yesterday's battle, claiming over a thousand miners began firing on the train carrying the ne-

groes. After the train pulled out the miners turned their attention to the stockade.

The coroner's jury began inquest this afternoon. Six union miners testified the first shots were fired from the train. Said the miners shot into the air until the train came to a stop.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Following dated at Walker, Minn., has been received at the interior department: "I have just returned from the hostile camp. About ninety Indians were present. I am of the opinion the trouble can be settled peaceably by a little time and patience."

CAST IN A DUNGEON.

Terrible Experience of Samuel Ensign, An American.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Oct. 13.—Samuel Ensign, an engineer of the old-time Racine & Mississippi railroad and a resident of this city for many years, has returned, old and broken in health with a sad story of imprisonment and suffering in Cuba.

When Ensign left Rockford he went to Cuba, where he obtained a situation as an engineer in a sugar refinery. One night Ensign, with two fellow workmen, resisted an assault made upon a native woman by Spanish soldiers. The next morning Ensign says, all three were taken prisoners to Havana, where they were placed in Morro Castle. One of the men died in seven months, and the other lived 24 years. For 13 years and 5 months Ensign alleges he was confined in the castle, allowed to speak to no one, and only to walk through a corridor 204 feet long for recreation. At the expiration of that time he was taken out to work with a ball and chain on his ankle, constructing a plaza. At that he worked five years. He became friendly with the priests and attendants in a neighboring monastery, and one night was spirited away and placed on a man-of-war that finally landed him in Mexico. When placed in prison Ensign claims he had certificates of deposit to the amount of \$8000 in money, none of which was ever returned to him.

mittee Jobs.

Senate Does Nothing of Note
To-day.

House Passes the Sherwin Sugar
Bounty Bill.

Brownell offered senate resolution No. 11, to have a committee of two senators appointed to correct senate journal, to have ten days for said work, without pay. Adopted.

The committee on compensation, etc., reported in favor of allowing following rates per day for clerks:
Expert clerks \$6.50
Chief clerks of committees 5.00
Stenographers 5.00
Assistant chief clerks 4.00
All other clerks 3.00

Senator Kuykendall had his mileage corrected from 107 miles to 150 miles.

H. B. 50, to provide for board to control certain matters in Multnomah county, passed.

MULKEY, S. B. 67.—To provide for a state board of equalization, to be composed of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. After considerable discussion, the bill was referred to the committee on assessment and taxation, to report at the regular session.

H. B. 55, to regulate terms of court in the Eighth judicial district.

DRIVER, S. B. No. 76.—To protect citizens from scurrilous attacks from the public press.

H. B. 34, to fix times of holding court in the Sixth judicial district, passed.

H. B. 77, to authorize Multnomah county to lease a certain bridge, read first time.

H. B. 36, to more definitely establish boundaries of Washington county, passed.

Senator Haines introduced a concurrent resolution asking time for the special committee on the investigation of the Loewenberg contracts to report at regular session, with authority to employ clerks, subpoena witnesses, etc. Selling moved to table same. Lost. Also portions authorizing subpoenas of witnesses. Lost resolution adopted.

HOUSE—THURSDAY A. M.
House bill No. 61, introduced by Sherwin for the promotion of the beet sugar industry, took up the entire session, finally passing by a vote of 33 to 34, Brattain, Kruse and Platts being absent.

Unsuccessful efforts were made to defer action until the regular session, and there was much discussion.

Stillman opposed the passage of H. B. No. 61, for the promotion of the beet sugar industry. His business associates were nearly all interested

in the industry, but he came here under obligations to work for the best interests of all of the people of Oregon. Thought that there were serious objections to this bill. It ought to be postponed until the regular session to give members an opportunity to look thoroughly into the matter. Bill provides that the beets must be harvested for the manufacture of sugar in this state, but there is no provision that the beets shall ever be manufactured; bounty is payable as soon as the beets are delivered to the factory.

Had been informed that sugar can be brought from our new possessions in the Pacific and laid down at San Francisco at a price of one cent per pound. There was no evidence that under those conditions, the beet sugar industry would be self-sustaining, after it had been fostered for four years at an expense of \$50,000 per year. It was his opinion that the professors of the agricultural college and others who had been talking about the beet sugar industry, didn't know what they were talking about. Cummings claimed that a careful reading of the bill would show that it required the manufacture of beets into sugar.

Curtis said that we had seen the sister state of Washington go ahead of us in industries, its population and in enterprise; that Oregon had been called a state of mossbacks, and he thought it time that a change should be made. He believed in appropriating money to encourage any industry which does not already exist in the state, and to support it until it should become self-sustaining.

Replying to an insinuation of Cummings, Stillman said that his interest in the sugar industry was all on the side of the actual grower of beets and not the manufacturer.

Williams on thought that a measure of so much importance should have longer consideration and moved indefinite postponement, which was lost.

Roberts favored the bill on the ground that the general appropriation bill appropriates thirteen hundred thousand dollars and none of it for the laboring man, and he wanted to see this bill go through because it would establish a new industry.

CRUELITIES IN SALVADOR.

How Political Prisoners Were Tortured and Executed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—The steamer City of Panama arrived from Central American ports. The vessel brings news of executions and horrible cruelties perpetrated upon political prisoners in Salvador.

Referring to the execution of prisoners, El Clarion says that at Armenia, a small city of the republic, an American citizen was shot, while Angel Vasquez and Don Delino Barrios died in prison, as the result of cruelties on the part of General Arvalo. In the police station Don Venanzia Salazar and Don Jesus Valdez were tied up by the thumbs, and Colonels Don Zelaya Peraza and Don Virgilio Valencio were shot. These officers had distinguished themselves in army under the regime of the former president.

Continuing, the article asserts that 20 ladies have been expelled from Salvador, among whom is the wife of Don Macarico Martinez, one of the most prominent citizens of Salvador City. Furthermore, under the direction of General Villagras, five persons shot in San Pedro, while at San Miguel many were executed by General Villagras. It appears also that the editor of El Latijo, a journal of Salvador, incurred the displeasure of the government, owing to the publication of several articles in his journal in defense of court students. For his offense he was publicly whipped, as was also the judge who rendered a decision in favor of the students.

PORTO RICO

Will Be Ours Tues-
day, Oct. 18.

Flag Will Go Up Over Amer-
ican Soil.

Chief Surgeon Hoff Before War In-
vestigation.

(By Associated Press to The Journal.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Following has been received by the war department from San Juan de Porto Rico:—The United States commission have informed the Spanish commission that the United States expect to have complete possession of Porto Rico by Oct. 18. The Spanish commission assent and say the expected evacuation will be complete on or before that date. If not they will concede possession. The United States commission has practically completed details for evacuation and the joint commission has held to last session. The United States troops will be placed in San Juan and the flag hoisted at noon October 18."

PARIS, Oct. 13.—The American peace commissioners held the usual session today.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Lieutenant Colonel L. J. Hoff, was before the war investigating commission at the afternoon session. He was the chief surgeon of the Third army corps at Chickamauga. Hoff did not consider the camp in the best of sanitary condition, but expressed the opinion that it could not have been better, under the circumstances.

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 13.—General Ewert today mustered into the Illinois National Guard three companies of the Sons of Veterans regiment. They will be used in the coal strike troubles.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—Secretary of war Alger wired Governor Tanner of Illinois, placing the Fifth Illinois volunteer infantry at Tanner's orders, in case state the militia is insufficient to end the coal troubles.



WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—San Francisco was this morning decided upon as the next meeting place of the episcopal triennial convocation.

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 13.—Miners here held a mass meeting today at which it was declared by union men that the imported negroes must be taken out of Springfield.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—A cablegram to the state department says General Julio A. Roca was today inaugurated president of the Argentine Republic.
