A SUPREME COURT COMMISSION.

We cannot agree with the proposed supreme court commissioners to help out the supreme court. It is nothing but a proposition to create more offices for the benefit of the legal fraternity, and they are overworked with official honors now from the President down to the proteges of the Marion county court.

There is no reason why three of the circuit judges in Eastern Oregon and three in Western Oregon could not be made a court to sit "in banc" and hear inconsequential appeals when they had nothing else to do. That is the way the federal court business is handled and only about one-third of the appeals ever get to the supreme court of the United States.

The above plan for the relief of the supreme court is suggested by some of the ablest lawyers in the state—men not tainted with the disease of rampant officialism. It was the original plan this state started out on. If they wanted to give the court in banc a little variety and increase its usefulness they could send the judges from the west to the eastern part of the state, and if litigants hadn't got enough when they were through with the court in banc they could still under proper restrictions be permitted to appeal to the supreme court. By all the means give us no more irresponsible commissions, and especially one to swell the volume of decisions is unnecessary. It would be a good-idea now if the volumes of supreme court decisions could be cut down to one-half or altogether before the world has to build asylums to hold the people who will go insane trying to reconcile their contradictions.

THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

This institution is asking \$30,000 in addition to the state tax it receives. There was a vigorous discussion before the ways and means committee over its management and while the local senator didn't seem to know what the money was wanted for it could be seen that the members from

all parts of the state were giving the Eugene school the most Alaskan kind of a reception. The local pleader admitted that there was a local feeling of dissatisfaction with the management, and the only professor he could brag on was Prof. Young in the historical department. He didn't brag on Prof. McElroy and said the president was not what he ought to be. Regent Bush had not been there at a regent's meeting for three years, etc., etc.

The fact is the school does not command the fullest confidence of the people of the state, for several reasons. Some of the regents have about as much conception of what a university is as a Siwash Indian has of Del-sarte. No one will blame Mr. Bush for not attending regent meetings, when there are men on the board who insist on keeping professors for political service at \$3,000 a year, who as common school teachers could not earn \$75 a month. The school has been loaded down with orthodox nepotism to the extent that there is not even honest awarding of prizes in literary work.

Before any further appropriations are made the petty politicians should be weeded out of the concern and men of culture, dignity and ability put in who are above a personal or political graft. Then the people will respect and support the school, the students will respect and support the faculty. Until the foundation is sound how can you expect the spire and gables to stand plumb and square? Our state is cursed with low politics from top to bottom. It is giving way before a
