KILLED AGAIN.

No Three Months of Grace for the R. R. Commission.

Omaha Exposition Job Fails To Go Through By a Very Small Margin.

There was some discussion of Whitney's bill abolishing the railroad commission. It covers the same ground as senate bill No. 21, except that the latter has no emergency clause and would go into effect in 90 days while the house bill takes effect on its approval by the governor. Mr. Whalley thought that as a matter of courtesy the house should rest content with the senate bill, and allow the commission the 90 days longer in office.

Stillman could see no reason why the railroad commission should be paid \$2500 for sitting in their offices for 90 days longer, when both house and senate are nearly unanimous for the abolition of the commission. Hawson considered that his duty to his constituents required him to vote for the quickest action in the matter.

Mr. Whalley's was the only vote against the bill.

Flag opposed the appropriation for the reimbursement of persons who have advanced money for the Oregon exhibit at the Omaha exposition, on the ground of economy.

Beach urged the appropriation on the ground that the money has been well expended and to the great benefit to the state, and that many members of the legislature had long been pledged to its passage.

Following was transacted in the house Wednesday afternoon:

RESOLUTIONS.

By Williams. To a committee to examine into the clerkship matter adopted.

S. J. R. No. 5. Authorizing the secretary of state to turn over to the Indian war veterans not to exceed 1000 copies of the history of the early Indian wars. Adopted.

H. B. No. 70. Ross. To amend section 3002 of the laws of Oregon, read second time, and referred to judiciary committee.

BILLS PASSED.

H. B. No. 19. Whitney—To abolish the board of railroad commissioners.

H. B. No. 32. Stanley—Providing for reimbursement of persons who had advanced money for the Oregon exhibit at the Omaha exposition; appropriating \$18,000. This bill was defeated in the senate.

H. B. No. 51. Moody—Requiring that taxes be paid in lawful money.

H. B. No. 55. Fordney—Changing time of holding circuit court in Eighth judicial district.

H. B. No. 44. Curtis—Making the governor's term of office commence on the second Monday in January.

S. B. No. 21—Relating to mining claims.

H. B. No. 15—Topping. Fixing times for holding teachers' quarterly examinations in Coos county. Reconsidered on motion of Maxwell and passed.

HOUSE WEDNESDAY EVENING.

H. B. No. 37. Butt—Providing for three commissioners to assist the supreme court at a salary of \$3,500 per year, was reported back by the judiciary committee, with the recommendation that a new bill be substituted, allowing the court to call to its assistance not to exceed three of the circuit judges at a salary of \$500 per year. Mr. Butt offered another substitute, similar to the original bill but omitting the secretary to the proposed commission. After much discussion the matter was indefinitely postponed on motion of Young.

H. B. No. 5. Curtis. To regulate and protect sturgeon fishing. Passed.

H. B. No. 26. Marsh. To more definitely establish the boundary lines of Washington county. Passed.

S. B. No. 68. Defining the qualification of voters at school elections. Requiring the payment of tax on at least \$100 of property. Failed to pass.

S. B. No. 57. Establishing a rule of pleading. Read twice and referred to committee on judiciary.

The governor informed the house that he had signed bills number 309, 43, 46 and 71.

SENATE WED. P. M.

Bill, by Reed to amend statute creating state normal schools. Read first time.

S. B. No. 67—To provide a state board of equalization and kindred matters Senator Mulkey; read second time.

President Simon appointed Senators Kaykendall and Mitchell on joint commission providing for celebration of Oregon's Admission Day in February next.

H. B. No. 70—Relating to building, savings and loan associations. Passed.

H. B. No. 72—In relation to establishment of a state normal school at Ashland, and naming it "Southern Oregon State Normal," ordered printed.

H. C. R. 18, as to cost of school books; senate concurred. Chair appointed Senators Porter and Patterson.

H. C. R. 17—For committee of ways and means to visit and investigate all normal schools and colleges and report back.

H. C. R. 20, as to the clerical appointments in standing committees of legislature and calling for joint committee to investigate and report at once. Senate concurred, and Senator Selling appointed.

H. J. R. No. 10—Authorizing repairs and changes in house wing of capitol tabled.

H. B. No. 77—Authorizing Multnomah county to lease the upper deck of the steel bridge at Portland.

Message from the governor, announcing his various appointments in state service at the several state institutions since last biennial session. Referred to committee on revision of laws.

Ways and means committee reported back S. B. No. 8, providing for payment of expenses of Oregon commission at Omaha and carrying appropriation of \$18,000. Read a third time; tabled.

H. C. R. No. 17, called from table by Senator Mulkey, who offered an amendment, providing for a sub committee of five from the committee on ways and means, to visit and investigate the state normals and colleges and report, said report having the force of a report from the full committee (without compensation from state and to segregate the labor.) Amendment adopted and resolution as amended passed.

H. B. No. 57, to regulate the carrying of sheep by express. Called up by Senator Mitchell; read first time, second time by title; read third, and upon final vote passed.

S. J. M. No. 1, by Fulton—To congress appealing for national legislation in behalf of the veterans of the Cayuse and other early wars of Oregon. Read and adopted unanimously.

H. B. No. 10—To establish fiscal agency of state of Oregon in the city of New York, called for by Senator Mackay; read first and second times by title; read third time and referred to committee on counties.

H. B. No. 51, relating to payment of taxes in lawful money, and referred to the committee on insurance and banking.

Senator Kelly called up H. B. No. 10, repealing the act creating the state board of railroad commissioners, (with emergency clause.) Passed unanimously.

H. B. No. 60, to amend the code as to terms of the circuit court of the Fourth judicial district, passed.

The committee on banking and insurance reported back S. B. 67, with minor amendment; made the special order.

DIED.

LA W—At the family home at McCoy, Polk county, Oregon, Thursday Oct. 13 at 2 a. m., James Law aged 77 years, from complications resulting from old age.

Mr. Law was the father-in-law of John McCrow of Salem and well known here.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow (Friday) at 2 p. m. from the Presbyterian church at McCoy. Rev. McKinley, the pastor, conducting them. The remains will be interred in the cemetery near McCoy.
