AT THE STATE HOUSE

Daily Personalities and Proceedings in the Different Departments.

Sharp Trick of Committee Clerks in Raising Their Certificates for Pay.

At the state house Monday morning there was a great calm. Nearly all the members and the lobby have gone to their homes. Many went with heavy hearts, as no pay for services could be drawn until the appropriation bill is signed, which was not done at noon. Secretary Kincaid refused to issue any warrants until the bill becomes a law by the governor's signature or otherwise. The chief executive has five days in which to sign or file bills. Bills filed and not vetoed become a law ten days after filing.

All claims of members, officers, clerks and employes have been deliberately examined and classified and the vouchers and warrants for the same are ready to issue the moment the bill is signed.

House bills 13, 15 and 38 were this morning signed while H. B. 57 was filed without signature.

One of the most important results of this session is the heavy reductions made in the income of the state printer for the coming four years. The expenditures for this department had already been decreased \$35,000, as compared with the last term of Mr. Leed's predecessor, which with the "knifing" of the extra session, will leave that office no longer the most lucrative in the state.

A rather clever case of forgery was attempted at the state capital last Saturday. Many of the certificates made out and signed by the chairmen of the different committees in the house allowed from seventeen to nineteen days for labor performed by their clerks, but by resolutions passed, an order was issued to have all certificates changed to twenty days. Now several of these certificates were for three dollars per day, and somehow, quite a number of this class were made to read five dollars, at the same time the number of days was changed as per resolution.

None of these items got through the auditing department, and the virtuous clerks had their trouble for their pains.

Many of the legislators and state officials attended the funeral on Sunday.

Speaker Carter, who was probably the hardest worked member, is today rusticated by hunting the Mongolian pheasant, for which the Willamette valley is growing famous. This magnificent game bird has not yet reached Mr. Carter's region in Southern Oregon.

Secretary of State Kincaid has not only had his own troubles, but those of everybody else to bear during this session. Today that official thought he could once more "see daylight" from beneath his flood of work, but this afternoon he was unexpectedly faced up with an injunction, brought by District Attorney Hayden, restraining him from issuing the Eastern Oregon asylum warrant to Mr. Wright.

House bill 69, introduced by Gray, of Lane, is a short and unimportant measure, but of great importance. It is ungrammatical, but its intent is clear from its one brief section, which follows:

"Sec. 1. No act or law incorporating any city or town shall be passed by the legislature of this state, unless the same has been submitted for ratification to the legal voters of the town or city to be incorporated or chapter amended, and the result of said election, certified to by the proper officers and attached to said charter or amendment before being introduced in either house of the legislature."

This bill involves the principle of Direct Legislation and was voted for in the house by 25 Republicans and 17 Union members. It passed the senate without objection.

Secretary of State-elect Dunbar and Treasurer-elect Moore are in the capital, Mr. Dunbar has selected for living apartments rooms at J. M. Martin's residence, near the state-house. Mr. Moore will secure quarters while here. Mr. Dunbar has decided upon F. K. Lovell as one of his principal clerks. Under the present administration, Mr. Lovell is auditing clerk. Samuel Koser, of Astoria, will be appointed to succeed Mr. Lovell in the auditing department. Nick Haas, assistant auditing clerk, will also be retained by Mr. Dunbar.

During the last hours of the session the Salem charter bill passed the senate, under suspension of rules, but owing to the fact that it was not enrolled in time for the signature of the president and speaker the bill is void. As soon as the bill was passed, Mayor Richardson was notified that owing to its length the regular enrolling clerks could not complete it, and his honor took it down town, employed a large number of clerks to enroll the same, but alas, it arrived at the capitol about 15 minutes after adjournment.

KINCAID ENJOINED

Appropriation to Pay Banker Wright of Union.

To Be Stopped By an Injunction Proceeding From the District Attorney.

District Attorney Hayden has begun a suit to enjoin payment of the claim of W. T. Wright for reimbursement to him of the \$25,000 warrant for the Eastern Oregon asylum site at Union, Ore.

FILES A NOTICE.

SALEM, Oct. 17, 1908. Hon. H. B. Kincaid Sec. of State: I hereby notify you that it is my intention as soon as papers can be prepared to enjoin you from issuing a warrant in favor of W. T. Wright for the payment of that pretended claim against the State of Oregon, as I consider it a mere evasion of the supreme court.

Saturday Banker W. T. Wright called on Secretary of State Kincaid and asked him to accept the old warrant for \$25,000, originally issued to Phil Metchsch as a member of the eastern Oregon asylum board and declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. But Mr. Kincaid declined to have anything to do with it. Mr. Wright simply wanted to leave it with him and have it cancelled as an obligation against the state and issue the new warrant for \$32,688.88 just put in the appropriation bill by the legislature in special session. As the bill was not yet finally passed Mr. Kincaid could not act.

MR. WRIGHT'S POSITION

is that he as an innocent third party lashed the state warrant that has been declared unconstitutional for the persons who sold the section of land to the state. The warrant was transferred by treasurer Metchsch to them for the deeds to the land and cashed by Mr. Wright, and he was able to make this clear to the Ways and Means committee and they put it in the appropriation bill. The legislature has passed the bill but the governor has not signed it, though he will probably let it become a law.

Wm. H. Holmes, counsel for Mr. Wright, was seen and declared that he did not believe an injunction could be made to stick against an act of the legislature when all the facts of the claim and the past history of the case had been laid before it.

AT MARION COURT HOUSE.

Hamlin F. Smith, executor of the estate of Fabritus R. Smith, deceased, filed a petition today asking to be allowed to sell personal property of the estate. Judge Terrell ordered the petition granted; and that the petitioner be allowed to sell the property at private sale.

James Scott, N. Hansen and R. T. Judson, appraisers of the estate of Fabritus R. Smith, deceased, filed their inventory and appraisal, placing the valuation at \$9,862.50.

A suit was filed in Department No. 2, by Mary A. Flamondson, Ad die S. Flamondson, and J. D. Flamondson vs. Francis B. Pendland and James H. Pendland, her husband. It is an action brought for a partition of real property in Salem, Oregon, or sale and division.

Sherman, Condit and Park are the plaintiffs' attorneys.

Marriage licenses were issued to A. A. Disque and Ida C. Basey, the father of the young lady, A. J. Basey, signed the affidavit, and Mrs. N. A. Wyatt and A. J. Basey, J. S. Pennybaker acting as witness.

BIG BREWERY DEAL.

English Syndicate Buying Cincinnati Plants.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 17.—The prospects are that the big deal whereby an English syndicate is to secure, through purchase, possession of the Cincinnati breweries, will be completed some time during the present week. All of the preliminaries have been arranged, but there is yet some difference between the syndicate and the Lion and Heron breweries. It is understood that the difference is in regard to the price, but it will be adjusted satisfactorily before many days have elapsed.
