SALEM MOTHERS' CLUB,

Discusses Child Nature...Read Col. Parker's Lecture On Rewards.

The Salem Child Study Club met at the Presbyterian church parlor, Wednesday afternoon. It now numbers 33 members.

Quotations were read by members in response to roll call by the secretary, Mrs. R. J. Hendricks, and some beautiful sentiments were expressed. The first Mother-play, from Froebel's immortal text book, was studied the week before, and it was continued at this session.

The subject next week is "The Little Gardener" from the Motherplay book.

Mrs. Ogle, the reader, read an extract from the Kindergarten Magazine on development of character through overcoming obstacles. Following are sentiments brought out: Life's struggle is toward a complete self-consciousness. Man became strong by conquering weakness. We grow religious by living religion. "The destiny of man as a rational being is to become conscious of the divine and to reveal it with self-determination and freedom." This is Froebel's definition of the purpose of education, the bringing of the individual into harmony with the divine.

This led to a discussion that nearly carried some of the ladies off their feet.

P. T. Barnum was quoted as saying "The busy child will be the happy child, and the happy child will grow up to be an honest man or woman."

Mrs. A. N. Moores said there was often great injustice done to children who got into what we call mischief and were punished for it, simply because there was nothing provided for them to do.

Mrs. Hendricks was not agreed with some one who said the first two years were the most trying for the mother and child.

Mrs. Ogle brought out the thought that owing to the fact that little girls were employed with the domestic occupations with the mother in the home, while there were no corresponding duties for boys with their fathers, it was easier to bring up girls.

SECRET OF REWARDS. A paper by Col. Parker was read on presents, prizes and promotion, as a substitute for corporal punishments. He called the stimulating of nature by rewards criminal.
