### MR. CHAMBERLIN SPEAKS.

Hon. M. L. Chamberlin addresses not very much more than Christmas greetings to the chairman of the Marion county Republican committee, and the chairman of the first district Congressional Republican committee, Appraiser of Customs of the Port of Portland, and Chief Bugler of the McBride-Mitchell faction of the Republican party.

The compliments of the season as presented in this paper are very important because they bear unalloyed testimony to a stalwart fellow-partisan of many years standing, to the character and methods of the McBride-Mitchell push and its richly rewarded local mouth-piece that has for twenty years dominated the Republican party in Marion county but is now passing, for the public, into a happy decrepitude.

Thrice in one year has that aggregation of appetite, gall, incompetency, extravagance and corruption been waved aside by a cyclone of public wrath, and told to stand back with all persuasive power of the political plecter. First at the school election when Bligh and Davis were snowed under, next at the Republican primaries, and last time at the recent city election. It looks as though the people had learned how to deal with the combination pretty effectively.

If the combination struck at so successfully three times, under the leadership of men like Mr. Chamberlin, have political stock in trade, from United States senatorships at Washington to jailorships at the state institutions, it does not grow out of any expressions of public confidence in the community where they are best known. It would seem as though their days for fattening at the public crib were numbered.

While this impression of complete lack of public confidence has not yet reached the ears of the administration at Washington, it may do so in time to save Oregon for McKinley in 1900. But the president will have to get his ear to the ground and play the part of willing listener before it is too late, for even Charley Fulton said after the recent city election at Salem, that the people could be trusted after all, and were more than apt to be right.

Those who cannot see that a complete eclipse of decency has come over the Republican situation in Oregon, so vigorously hinted at by Mr. Chamberlin, will have to get their eyes open by a few thousand more votes of force in the way of satisfaction from the people. There is a new

program on foot, or there ought to be, if the voice of the people means anything.

It remains to be seen whether the new state administration can grasp the situation, or whether they will grope blindly under the hypnotic influence of statesmanship that must henceforth be confined to the highly problematic occupation of conducting a political peanut shop from the back door of the Oregon police morgue.

### FOR BETTER ROADS.

Plans inaugurated by Judge Barton in Linn County.

There is no doubt but the people of Oregon suffer more injury and actual loss from the isolation produced by bad roads than from any other one cause.

Any one interested in the subject of good roads will find some excellent ideas in the plan recently inaugurated by County Judge Geo. D. Barton, of Linn County.

The road laws of Oregon may be fairly good in theory, but in practice they leave much to be desired. To say that every thing depends on the efficiency of the road supervisor hardly defines the situation, for it takes an extraordinary efficient supervisor to produce fairly satisfactory results; while the efforts of the average official are crowned with the boy-holes and lines of mire with which the whole state is interlarded for over half of every year.

In working for better conditions, however, we are obliged to take things as we find them, and the first thing to be done is to arouse a good-road sentiment among the people, and especially among the country people. The next is to see that the best available men are appointed as road supervisors. Even under the disad-

advantages imposed by the present poor law, much may be accomplished in this way.

These two points are covered in the plan referred to in the above. The JOURNAL is in receipt of a copy of a circular issued and signed by the county court of Linn county and directed to the taxpayers of the several road districts of Linn county.

The central idea is expressed as follows: "To the end that the people may have better service in road building in Linn county, we request each road supervisor to call a meeting of the voters of their respective districts to convene during the month of December, 1898, at some central point in said district for the purpose of discussing and laying plans for next season's road work. One of the necessary adjuncts to economical and systematic road building as operated under the present inadequate road laws of Oregon, is the selection of a qualified supervisor. At this meeting we suggest that the voters present select some good, energetic, substantial resident of your district as supervisor for 1899. The residents of a road district are more familiar with their wants, and know much better than any county court, who is the best man among them for supervisor. Select some pushing and enthusiastic road man in your district, with no regard to his religion, politics, or color of his hair. Send his name to the county court, and at the January term we will gladly appoint him supervisor of your district for 1899."

This plan should result in awakening an active interest among the people and getting them to work together on an intelligent plan and it is pretty likely to secure the appointment of a good supervisor, as well as to give him a feeling of more direct responsibility to the residents of his district. It is an excellent plan so far as it goes, probably the best that could be devised without a radical change in our road laws, and other county courts would do well to follow the example of Judge Barton and his associates.
