The Council Holds a Short Session and Postpones the Bicycle Ordinance. The council was called to order at 7 o'clock by Mayor Richardson and proceeded immediately to business. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and then the alderman took up routine work. A favorable report on the following bills was given by the committee on account and current expenses and adopted by the council:

Liquor licenses were issued to Bach & Nadstank. A Schreiber and Wm. Haack, and the applications of Geo. L. Neal and F. P. Talkington for the same thing were referred to the appropriate committee.

The committee appointed to draft an ordinance taxing telephone and telegraph companies reported progress and was granted an extension of time.

It was suggested by Recorder Edes and moved by Alderman Waters that when the council adjourn it adjourn to meet on the evening of December 31, at 7 p. m. in order that the affairs of the present council might be straightened up and its books and accounts audited. Carried.

A. T. Wain and L. Card presented a statement asking for the rent of the upper floor of the city hall, agreeing to pay \$50 monthly for the same if two steam radiators were placed in the hall. The matter was referred to Mayor Richardson and Recorder Edes with power to close a contract.

An ordinance was introduced by Parkhurst prohibiting the boarding or climbing on of trains or cars by the small boys or anyone except when the cars were at the depot platform and standing still.

By Parkhurst's request the bill was read the first and second times and placed on its final passage. It was passed.

An ordinance prohibiting the wearing of any bonnet, hat or other head gear by a lady, excepting skull caps and other hats that fit close to the head, at any theater or other place of amusement, where an admission fee is charged, was read the third time and passed. The penalty for disobeying this ordinance is a fine of not less than \$2 nor more than \$5, or imprisonment in the city jail for not less than one or more than five days.

The third reading of the bicycle ordinance was postponed until the first meeting of the council in January.
