# JACKSON CO MURDER

Argument for a New Trial Before the Supreme Court.

In the Case of Frank Lawrence Smith, sentenced to Be Hanged June 11, 1928.

At noon today the supreme court heard arguments of counsel in the matter of appeal from Jackson county in the motion for a new trial in the case of State of Oregon vs. Frank L. Smith, under sentence of death for murder of Peter Nelson, April 5, 1898. C. B. Watson, prosecuting attorney, appeared for C. H. Dalrymple, attorney for appellant Smith, and Attorney General C. M. Idleman and John A. Jeffrey, of Bonham, Jeffrey and Martin appealed for the state. Smith was indicted, prosecuted and convicted by Mr. Jeffrey, who was then district attorney.

It seems several indictments were found as Smith had several aliases, and they were worded in a different manner for the same crime. All but the right one were dismissed. In the argument counsel for appellant raised the single point that the names of Emil Kirchessner and J. B. Wait appear as witnesses on the first indictment and not on the last one, and that the last one ought therefore to have been dismissed by the court below. The only hypothesis upon which this claim could have any foundation is that all of these indictments are one and the same, and such a contention was denied by Jeffrey as utterly untenable. An inspection of the record shows that the first indictment was for murder in the first degree simple. It shows that the second was for murder committed in the attempt to commit robbery; and it also shows that the indictment upon which the defendant was tried was for murder committed while engaged in the commission of a robbery.

His father was at the sheriff's office this morning seeking, with tears in his eyes, for his son. Any information leading to the finding of the lad would be gratefully received by the parents.

Ah Lee, the Chinese proprietor of the apple evaporating plant on Trade street near Cottage, who was arrested yesterday for maintaining a nuisance at his place of business was dismissed this morning pending his clearing up the premises.

He has kept a large pile of apple cores which are badly decayed and giving off an almost unbearable stench, piled in his house. When asked to remove them he simply carted them out into the back yard. This made matters worse and upon complaint of residents of that neighborhood he was arrested. Today he agreed to abate the nuisance as fast as two men could do it, and his trial was suspended awaiting the fulfillment of his promise.
