MONDAY AFTERNOON

The House Adopts a Surprising Clerkship Reform.

The Measure Sent to Committee On Education in the Senate.

The press is well represented in the House, the oblique being all there and the Portland Times and Baker City Democrat being also represented.

The interest of the afternoon session was centered in the clerkship question.

The committee, of which Williamson, of Crook, is chairman, appointed at the special session to investigate this subject, made its report and introduced a resolution of which the following are the main features: No clerks to be employed by the senate except a chief enrolling and engrossing clerk with one assistant; one each for the committees on Ways and Means and on Judiciary; ten clerks at large, and six stenographers.

The list for the House is the same except that fifteen general clerks are allowed instead of ten. These clerks are to report to the chief clerk each morning at nine o'clock for assignment, where needed. Wages of chief enrolling and engrossing clerk to be six dollars per day his assistants, the clerks of the two named committees and the stenographers five dollars and all others three dollars.

A strong effort was made to postpone consideration, under the leadership of Flag and Whalley.

On final vote the resolution was adopted, the following voting no: Beach, Briggs, Curtis, Flag, Freeland, Marsh, Massengill, Maxwell, Meyers, Roberts, Sherwin, Stanley, Thompson of Washington, Lopping, Whalley, Young, Mr. Speaker—17.

RESOLUTIONS.

By Wagoner, of Douglas—That no bill shall pass to its third reading until it has been printed and laid before the members at least one day. To committee on resolutions.

By Meyers—That members be furnished with three copies of newspapers each. Adopted.

By Meyer—That each member be furnished with \$5 worth of stamps and \$1 worth of newspaper wrappers. Adopted.

By Kruse—For an amendment to the constitution, embodying the principle of the initiative and referendum. To committee on resolutions.

By Curtis—Allowing clerks to various committees, at a salary of \$3 per day. To committee on resolutions.

By Moody—Instructing the committee of ways and means to prepare two appropriation bills; one to cover the salaries of the state officers and other the fixed expenses of the state, to be known as the regular appropriation bill; and another to cover all other appropriations and to be known as the special appropriation bill; the former to be reported to the House by the twentieth day of the session, and the latter by the thirtieth.

By Topping—For a committee to examine the books of the secretary of state. To committee on resolutions.

Committee on elections reported on the matter of the contest from Clackamas county, that Knight was elected and report was adopted.

Same committee reported on the matter of the contest from Polk county, that J. B. Stamp was elected and report was adopted.

A lively scene ensued when the order of business, introduction of bills, was reached. Every member had a bill, and some had a handful. Moody of Multnomah kept one page on the move for several minutes.

After the ceremonies, dancing and a social time was enjoyed.

SENATE MONDAY AFTERNOON.

President Taylor called the senate to order promptly at 2 o'clock.

Senator Mackay presented the credentials of Senator-elect Joseph, which were approved, when the new senator from Multnomah was sworn in by Chief Justice Wolverton of the supreme court.

Senator Fulton offered a resolution continuing the officers elected at the extra session. Adopted.

Senator Looney introduced joint resolution No. 1, providing for a committee of two senators and three representatives to investigate the office of the state treasurer. Adopted.

The joint committee appointed by the extra session on committee clerkship abuses reported a resolution providing for committee clerks as provided in their published report, a chief clerk in each house who shall have charge of 40 clerks and stenographers to render such service as any of the various committees may require. Fulton moved reference to the committee on education. Mitchell opposed the motion, closing his firm speech with the words: "This clerkship abuse must cease." Driver, Dufur, Brownell, Adams and others opposed the resolution and spoke in favor of the old methods of employing clerks. Reported by vote of 19 to 10 votes.

House concurrent resolution No. 2 was concurred in.

Kelly offered a resolution placing the services of the fifteen senate clerks provided for in the Selling resolution be at the disposal of the sergeant at arms.

H. R. 3, that each senator be supplied with \$4 in postage stamps and 100 newspaper wrappers, adopted. Senator Mulkey.

S. J. R. 1, Mulkey, asking congress to ratify the Paris peace treaty without amendment. Adopted.

Upon motion the rules of the special session were adopted as rules of this session. Adjourned.

CLERKSHIP REFORM.

The House joint resolution to limit the employment of clerks was referred to the committee on Education on the following roll call:
