to the face, which is never pleasant, but ever so well meant. There is a prevalent notion that the legislative branch of the state government is co-ordinate with, not subordinate to, the executive branch, so the members of the former do not relish the idea of being lined up and lectured by two governors in succession.

It is to be hoped no serious results will follow as both Lord and Geer were moved only by the best intentions, but it is true that a feeling of resentment has been aroused which will stand in the way of that cordiality and good understanding which might so pleasantly smooth the relations between the executive and the legislature. It is an American principle that only the utmost kindness and courtesy should be shown by those in office to all citizens, whether in public or private life.

DISTURBING CONFIDENCE.

The leading editorial from the Republican party exponent of Oregon, addressed to the assembled legislature, opens in this remarkable strain: "Nothing is so lamented as the tendency of the times to create a small class of very rich and a large class of very poor—gradually eliminating the middle class, or persons of moderate means. It is undeniable that this tendency exists. But the fact is, also, that they who complain most about it are the persons who chiefly cause it."

Just when we are beginning to feel the uplift of the golden floodtide of prosperity it is distressing to have the unthinking, calamity-howling press spring that old chestnut of decadent Populism, about the rich growing richer, and the poor growing poorer. Those who complain about this alarming tendency had just about begun to think perhaps, after all, they had been mistaken. But now they are confirmed from a Republican source. The Oregonian continues its populist wall in the same editorial:

A further effect is that it gives great capital its opportunity to make investments, without enterprise or risk. So long as the people go on in this course of creating public debts and issuing bonds, the money syndicates, withholding their money from productive enterprises, will wait for these "sure thing" opportunities. Augmentation of great fortunes, without risk, is thus made easy, and little or nothing is done by capital for promotion of productive industry.

The Republican party at Salem and Portland and in the nation at large has created the above alarming condition of things, "sure thing" opportunities for capitalism, that have driven Brother Scott to embrace that motley political bag of Populism, as he has always called her. It is sad to see a man of his fine moral fibre thus seduced in his old age. Here is his conclusion:

They who complain most of the grasping bondholder are, for the most part, the very men who create his opportunities and put the power over the whole property of the state, city, county or district into his hands. It is the general voter who does this business. But who are "they," referred to as the general voter? Those who have been putting the Republican party in power? That is the only inference, if there is such a thing as holding those who cast a majority of votes responsible. But alas, as Lord Bacon says, you cannot indict a commonwealth, and the people of Oregon have never had the referendum.

ROUTINE BUSINESS

Bills Introduced and Read in Both Houses.

Columbia Pilotage and Registration Bills Are Ordered Printed.

Upon calling the senate to order President Taylor stated that he had taken the pains to look up authorities bearing upon the tabling of Governor's request for the return of appointments, and upon the adoption of a motion by Selling to take said message from the table, the chair instructed the clerk to return those appointments to his excellency.

BILLS INTRODUCED.

H. B. 4, House, to create the office of court clerk in cities of over 30,000 inhabitants.

H. B. 5, Looney, to prevent sale of unwholesome and adulterated foods and medicines.

H. B. 6, Smith, to cure defects in deeds.

H. B. 7, Clem, to provide for deduction of indebtedness from assessment.

H. B. 8, Kelly, to amend code pertaining to appeals from the circuit to the supreme court.

H. B. 9, Bates, to prevent adulteration of food.

H. B. 10, Looney, to prohibit selling or giving of cigarettes to boys under 18 years of age.

H. B. 11, Harmon, to amend the state board of horticulture law.

Senator Mulkey introduced S. J. R. No. 3, requiring all persons having claims against the state to file same with the ways and means committee within 30 days from the beginning of the session adopted.

HOUSE PROCEEDINGS.

The afternoon session of the House was taken up by the first reading thirty-eight bills, nothing of special interest occurring.

H. R. No. 2, instructing the committee of ways and means to bring in two appropriation bills was reported from committee. Moody and Curtis made a strong plea for the adoption of the resolution. Adopted unanimously on roll-call.

H. B. 18, Beeder, to amend the act incorporating the city of Multnomah.

H. B. 19, Curtis, to amend the law relative to the sale of real estate for taxes.

H. B. 20, Gray, regulating sleeping car rates.

H. B. 21, Curtis, to amend charter creating the office of attorney general.

H. B. 22, Gray, requiring the doors of public buildings to open outward.

H. B. 23, Gray, relating to county officers.

H. B. 24, Curtis, abolishing the board of agriculture.

H. B. 25, Curtis, relating to the sale of property sold for taxes.

H. B. 26, Gray, relating to expositions and administrative.

H. B. 27, Young, to create the office of game and forestry warden in counties.

H. B. 28, Place, for the protection of wild ducks making it unlawful for any person to kill more than twenty in one day.

H. B. 29, Morton, relating to landowners.

H. B. 30, Cummings, relating to fees of county officers.

H. B. 31, Young, to protect citizens.

H. B. 32, HILL, regulating elections and providing for the registration of voters.

H. B. 33, Forsythe, changing the boundary line between Clatsop and Willamette counties.

H. B. 34, HILL, regulating elections on the Columbia River.

H. B. 35, HILL, creating the office of tax collector in counties over \$50,000.

H. B. 36, Meyers, creating the office of state liquor agent without salary.

H. B. 37, Topping, amending an act for the protection of public bridges. Prohibiting driving over them faster than a walk.

H. B. 38, Henson, relating to justice in justice courts.

H. B. 39, Whalley, relating to establishment of money due in public offices.

H. B. 40, Whalley, relating to county roads and providing for a state road engineer.

H. B. 41, Maxwell, providing for the creation of a road fund in counties.

H. B. 42, McCurt, relating to the office of district attorney in the third judicial district.

H. B. 43, Ross, to abolish the use of private seals.

H. B. 44, Nichols, changing the boundary between Lane, Multnomah and Clatsop counties from their common line to the line between them.

H. B. 45, Fennell, relating to recording of conveyances of real property.

H. B. 46, McMillen, to exempt prisoners in county, town and city jails to perform labor on public works.

H. B. 47, Curtis, to provide for an additional election judge in the fifth judicial district.
