stand, then the public must remain in darkness. But there is quite a large minority who know the truth, and this minority will ever condemn the press. I believe all who know me give me credit for the truth. The principle of honesty is the one I have cherished above all others, and if there be one person in all this Union who can successfully contradict this statement, now is his or her time to speak.

Now as to facts: My daughter never left Atlanta with a man by the name of Ryan. Mr. Ryan is a gentleman who has resided in New York for a number of years, and a member of a family of prominence and wealth, who are pioneers of Atlanta. He is known by little girl from childhood. The billiard story is a mere canard. Mr. Ryan was an acquaintance of Mr. Moore before my daughter had met him, and was a witness to the marriage in St. Matthew's church. My daughter went to New York with an elderly lady friend, who promised to be a mother to her. I was on the train with them till it pulled out of the depot. Three weeks later I went to New York and was with Fayne till the moment of sailing to Europe. This same chaplain accompanied her through the whole tour—from deck to deck—and I state unqualifiedly, there was no man with her. I went to N. Y. for the purpose of going with Fayne abroad, but was overcome by the intense heat and found myself unable to endure further fatigue. The report says an entry in Mrs. Moore's diary gave evidence of her intimacy with Ellis, the Cuban. As I remarked in the beginning, I hold you blameless because the report was directed by McIntyre in this assertion. But I say unto you that there is not one sentence in her diary to connect her with any improper intimacy with any one. Fayne's purpose in keeping a diary was simply to recall dates and names of persons whom she'd meet abroad and in New York, wishing to bring me exact news of her journeyings. Her memory for dates and names was defective. There never was a more dastardly act—one far beneath the cloth of an honest prosecutor—than that of McIntyre taking the child's inoffensively kept diary into court and make a fiendish effort to establish her guilt before a jury that was sitting in a robbery case. And were it not a lamentable fact that Recorder Goff seems ruled by the District Attorney's office, it would not have been allowed. The prosecutor, McIntyre, had his purpose in placing an evil construction on every act of Mrs. Moore's life. Just remember he is paid to convict. And also, that "evil is to whom evil thinks." Doubtless he has had a career. Mrs. Moore's diary is an innocent memorandum which anyone may examine. The report further stated that "Goff took into consideration Moore's character and criminal record, the fact that his profession was that of a gambler, a card sharp, bunco steerer, bigamist and general all-round scoundrel; and doubtless to the manner in which he used his young wife, the weak and fascinating Fayne Strahan, in the accomplishment of his base and criminal designs." Now, I would ask, who knows Moore's criminal record? There was no evidence introduced to show it. The woman Gaw, who swore falsely out of revenge and whose testimony was stricken out, certainly could not be considered. Moore was never married to that woman's daughter which can be easily proven when Moore is given the shadow of a chance. It is the N. Y. press, which has biased the minds of the populace till 'tis next to impossible to get an unprejudiced jury. All these stories of "Count De Sovaek," "Brooklyn black mail," "The Johnson woman's false testimony, etc., are absolutely false without a shadow of foundation in fact, and investigation is invited.

Fayne Strahan has inherited the gift of honesty and it cannot be tampered with. She is broken hearted at the way the press has tried to make her a base criminal, when her mistake was simply that of being misled by Martin Mahon, who was old enough for her father and should have nobly protected the fatherless stranger in New York instead of taking the advantage of her childish confidence. Call her "weak" or what you like there is a touch in nature which makes us all akin, and when men grow sufficiently strong to control that weakness, we shall invite one of their number to cast the first stone. But don't go dodging around Eve with fine airs of purity till you come to make women, even children, your victims. Were it not for the demon sleuth which come between Mr. and Mrs. Moore, and the advantage Mahon took of the situation, there would have been no heating and signed confession that night at Hotel Grenoble. Mahon should have been with his wife and children, whom he always denied living with when representing himself to Mrs. Moore. The slinky creature has tortured facts into a mishapen mass. The ghoul (detectives) work well for gold! The yellow track is too good for one who would arrest his own innocent victim. These are facts. Mr. Moore had a confession from Mahon and Mrs. Moore. He had placed the confession in the hands of his lawyer. Of course that meant civil action for divorce and redress. Mahon, knowing this, went detective to get the confession. They did not go to arrest, but Mr. Moore not knowing that they were detectives (no badge in sight) regarded their approach as an

intrusion on his home and struck the intruder. Of course, they arrested him at once. Mrs. Moore had just reached the hotel for the first time since the 4th, in order to pack her trunk and come home. They had designed a scheme to make them (Moore's) blackmailers if the confession cannot be secured. Of course, Mrs. Moore must be made a party to the scheme to make it look all tangible. I am not acquainted with Mr. Moore but I know Fayne Strahan quite well, and can say of a truth, she would rather give than take—she is strictly honest. This is clearly the opinion of any who know her, either white or colored. It is a source of much comfort to me to behold my native covered with testimonials to her honesty; 'tis only strangers who would doubt for a moment.

The report said: "If she gains not immunity from the punishment as predicted she probably will owe much to the influence of the N. Y. press, which is understood will get in and help her case." Truly my friend, the glove is on the other hand. The N. Y. press owes that defenseless child more than it can ever repay for its libelous attitude towards her.

Knowing the facts as I do, I presume the mistake Mr. Moore made was in not shooting Mahon (though I am glad he did not) dead as Hector, when he found him in his apartments. Our people cry, Mercy! Humanity! but when the entreaties are heard, the merciful are in danger of wearing a convict's garb. They may send Mrs. Moore to Sing Sing; McIntyre and the press have done their best, but if they do remember it will be because she, like a N. Y. Mayor, who was promoted to the presidency—"Told the Truth." Twice her liberty was offered her but she would rather take her chances on the convict's garb than go free under the horrid shadow of a lie. Her ally's say they have rarely seen such bravery exhibited.

If Recorder Goff took Moore's character into consideration without it being attacked, in court, why did he especially charge to jury in Mrs. Moore's case that they were not to take Mahon's character or his intimacy with Fayne Strahan Moore into consideration. Mr. Hill said it was the most infamous charge that he had heard delivered. S. H. S.

Aguinaldo Still Boasting.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—The Hong Kong correspondent of the Times says:

"The Filipino refugees insist that Aguinaldo will regard a landing of the Americans at Ilo Ilo as a declaration of war, and will immediately attack Manila. He has already warned the foreigners, including the Spaniards, of his intention, offering them safe conduct into the provinces. The American authorities will exercise a strict censorship at Manila over all press messages."

Conference Doing Good.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—The Manila correspondent of the Morning Post, telegraphing Thursday, says:

"The situation is much quieter today. The conference between the representatives of General Ollis and Aguinaldo has helped to allay excitement, and the Filipino newspapers are milder in tone. There is hope of a peaceful settlement. The insurgent government is now engaged in considering the preparation of a definite proposition as to what they desire from the United States."

Americans Return to Manila.

5000 additional Americans who had embarked for Ilo Ilo have returned to Manila.

OREGON DEAD.

Johnston Freeman, a native of Hillsboro, died at his home on January 11, after a long illness with consumption. The deceased was born on the North Plains, February 14, 1855. His father was Robert Freeman, who crossed the plains in 1845.

The funeral of Franklin Fouts, a pioneer of Yamhill county, took place on Tuesday at Carlton. Mr. Fouts was born in Indiana, January 27, 1832. In 1851 he crossed the plains with his parents and settled near North Yamhill.

Vincent Pepe, of Lundy, died of pneumonia on January 12, after an illness of several weeks. Mr. Pepe's father and mother only recently succumbed to the same ailment that carried him off.

Turkish Troops Advancing.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Special dispatches from Constantinople say that after the battle of Shamet a further Turkish advance was ordered. Abdullah Pasha, commanding the Turkish troops, was directed to capture Sateh, the headquarters of an important insurgent leader, 150 miles northwest of Sana. All the commanding positions in that vicinity are occupied by rebels, and, as the Turkish troops are deserting, the operations are likely to be prolonged and difficult.

The trouble in Yemen is one of the oldest, and rebellion against Turkish rule has spread throughout Hadschin and other districts.

China's Queen Preparing.

VANCOUVER, B. C. Jan. 13.—Hong Kong mail advices say the raising of large bodies of troops in China is taken to indicate that the empress dowager, and her advisers are preparing for some important movement next spring, at the latest. So far, according to reliable statistics, there are some 130,000 men, all armed with Mauser and Martini-Henry rifles, including the Peking field force in and around about Peking and Tien-Tsin.

Renominated.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 13.—The Democratic legislative caucus today nominated Edward Murphy for United States senator to succeed himself. The Democrats are in the minority in the legislature.

Russia's Railway Expenditures.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says: "The Russian budget for 1898, like its predecessor, is remarkable for enormous expenditures on railways."

This amounts to 99,000,000 roubles, and is a glaring proof of Russia's unparalleled efforts to extend her railway system, a system almost entirely due to a practical railway experience of her two remarkable ministers, M. de Witteben, minister of finance, who rose to power through railway management at home, and Prince Michael Khilkoff, minister of ways of communication, who, as he once jokingly remarked, began life as a blacksmith and fitter in an American railway depot.

"Prince Khilkoff's share in the expenditure is far greater than that of any other imperial minister, exceeding the war minister's credit by 37,000,000 roubles. In this respect the budget, which amounts to 397,000,000 roubles, and is put forward on the eve of the disarmament conference, is a peaceful budget."
