Usual Variety of Bills and Resolutions in the Senate.

Supply of Daily Revision of School Laws Bills Examined—More Printed.

HOUSE—TUESDAY P. M.

The session was taken up by the first reading of House bills, bringing the number up to 237.

It appearing that nearly all the copies of Senator Daly's school bill had been appropriated by members of the Senate, the state printer was ordered to print four hundred extra copies for the use of the House.

If there are any members over the disposition of the distinguished Afro-American who formerly occupied the chair of the Sergeant at arms of the House, they are not found in the south end of the capitol. The present official is not only courteous and obliging, but he attends to his business, and, as a partial explanation of this enthusiasm, the desks of the newspaper men are kept free from dust.

The Senate resolution, that ten volumes of the history of the early Indian wars be presented to Frances Fuller Victor for distribution, was adopted.

TEN MILL TAX

Levied By the City Council On All Taxable Property.

The Bicycle Ordinance Squelched and Fire Department Salaries Fixed At Last Night's Meeting.

The city council met last evening with all present except Mayor Bishop, who left the east. In the absence of the mayor, the chair was filled by City Recorder N. J. Judah, who very creditably performed the dual duties of mayor and clerk of the meeting.

A resolution was carried to adopt standing rules of the previous council and Roberts' rules of order for the government of the council.

An exciting time was had over a resolution introduced by Legz of the ways and means committee to fix the city tax levy at eight mills on the dollar. Legz and Gesner urged its adoption on the ground of the promised retrenchment in the city expenses, and the latter grew eloquent over the fact that the county and state tax was too high and the city should economize to equalize things. Buren was in favor of putting the city on a cash basis before lowering the levy too much, and Graham and Riggs thought the city expenses demanded a higher tax. The vote resulted in a tie, Gesner, Legz, McGrew and Walker voting aye, as the mayor was not present to cast the deciding vote, the motion to adopt was lost.

The two majority and the two minority reports were submitted by the committee on ordinances in relation to the passage of the bill referred to it regarding the salaries of the officers of the city and the fire department. The majority wished to place the salaries of the marshal and recorder at \$600 and of the chief engineer at \$800 a year. The minority favored raising the first two salaries to \$1000 and reducing the last to \$500 a month. The minority reports prevailed and the amendments were ordered engrossed before the final reading of the ordinances.

The ordinance fixing the salaries of the marshal and recorder at \$1000 a year and the policemen at \$50 a month was passed. Alderman Buren, Burrows, Graham, Riggs and Walker voted aye, Alderman Gesner no, Legz and McGrew, absent having been excused earlier in the evening.

The ordinance fixing the salaries of the fire department was passed with the unanimous vote of those present. Fixing the chief's salary at \$50, the chief engineer at \$80, his assistant at \$60, the stoker, \$10, hoseman \$10, the driver of the hose wagon \$40. The assistant fire chief will receive no pay unless working in the absence of the chief, when he will receive the same compensation as chief, the amount of his compensation to be deducted from that of the chief.

Some discussion was raised upon the adoption of the resolution introduced by Graham, requiring the recorder to submit at each meeting an itemized account of the fees received by him. Gesner thought that the officers were entitled to the fees and denounced the resolution as a graft from the county by the city. He thought the people of the county would think the city was trying to pay its bills with the money the county gave the city officers, as their due for services rendered. He wanted the city to pay its own debts, with its own money and give the marshal and recorder their lawful rights. An aye and no vote was called. Buren, Burrows, Graham, Riggs and Walker voted aye and Gesner, no.

The street commissioner was authorized to place a crosswalk across church street on the north side of State.

A memorial to the state of Oregon was introduced and adopted, expressing a desire that the state take charge of Wilson avenue and improve and beautify the same. This action will be explanatory to the legislature of the sense of the council and leaves it free to act.

Adjourning to Wednesday evening, January 15, at 7 o'clock for the purpose of taking final action on the city charter.

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the present driver of the hose wagon be placed on the engine and a new man be appointed to drive the hose wagon. The council approved of the change and ordered the committee to appoint the extra man.

Street Commissioner J. P. Frizzell submitted a report of his transactions which was referred to the committee on streets.

It was suggested that the council advertise the upper hall of the city building, for rent. After some discussion Gesner moved that the matter be referred to the committee on printing with power to act. Adopted.

An old warrant of 1891 for 35 cents drawn in favor of Townsend and Basy was referred to the committee ways and means.

The council fixed the bond of the street commissioner at \$2000.

The recorder asked the council to cancel the warrant issued to Ed Townsend for three days wages as driver of the hose wagon, for the reason that an error was made in drawing it. Townsend having resigned unknown to the Recorder, on the first of the month. Granted.

The application of A. E. Dageny and Neckerman & Rodgers for liquor licenses were referred to the license committee.

The statement of the county clerk, giving the official assessable property of the city as \$1,910,801 was read and ordered entered on the Journal.

Buren introduced a resolution fixing the city tax levy at 10 mills. Buren, Burrows, Graham, Riggs and Walker voted in the affirmative and Gesner, Legz and McGrew voting in the negative. A 6 per cent improvement tax was ordered levied on the abutting property on State street, from the west line of High street east to the city limits, to cover the expense of improvement on said street.

The council deemed it best that the annual levy of sewer bonds for block 58 be postponed until the next meeting, in order that they could ascertain a just levy.

Parson and Leitch of San Francisco were desirous of buying new city bonds or refunding old ones at a lower rate of interest, and their communications was filed.

A numerous signed petition asking that the unloading of wood from flat cars on the corner of High and Trade streets be stopped, as it obstructed the use of the street at that point. Referred.

An ordinance intended to prevent any person leaving swill or garbage wagons standing at any place in the city for a longer length of time than ten consecutive minutes was read the first and second times and referred to committee on ordinances.

Legz introduced an ordinance to prohibit the expectation or casting away of any secretion from the head or throat upon any side or crosswalk in the city, and providing a fine of \$1 to \$5 or commitment in the city jail for 1 to 10 days as the penalty. Referred.

The fire chief recommended the appointment of the following hosemen and stoker, and the council granted his recommendation:

Hosemen—L. B. Murphy, Elmer White, Wm. Landon, Peter Graber, J. W. Lehman, Roland Southwick, Frank Moore, and L. J. Parson; stoker, Harry Hutton.

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
