CLEVELAND

Inundated By the Breaking of a Big Dam.

The Wilson Avenue Bridge and Many Manufacturing Plants Are Destroyed.

By Associated Press to the Journal.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 18.—This morning the dam under the Wilson avenue bridge gave away. Back of the dam is a large body of water, a mile and a-half long, hundreds of feet wide and twenty-five to thirty feet deep. A break in the dam has allowed torrents of water to pour down on the flat below. The property loss is already large and if the entire dam gives away it will be enormous. Along the track of the flood are the plants of several big manufacturing concerns. There are but few people living in the track of the flood and they were all warned and have sought safety. The Wilson Avenue bridge is seven hundred feet long. The north end of the bridge has been moved from the foundation, five piers have crumbled away and sunk below the surface of the water.

Later: Today the water against the embankment is one-hundred and fifty feet high and fifty feet in area sweeping it down with raging flood.

Shortly after ten o'clock the big bridge swept was away.

At noon it was believed no further damage would result. The water has fallen twelve feet.
