## NOW IT'S FIXED

### The Special Meeting of the Council Compromises On Finance.

#### A Lengthy and An Earnest Meeting at Last Finally Approves the Salem Charter.

The city charter as now completed authorizes funding the \$78,000 of floating city debt by issuing warrants at not to exceed 6 1/2 per cent, or short time bonds at not to exceed 4 1/2 per cent.

Recorder N. J. Judah again yielded the gavel last evening at a special meeting of the council called to reconsider the twenty-third section of the draft of the new city charter which relates to the financial management of the city and which was stricken from the charter at the last meeting on account of the clause, which it contained, giving the council the power to refund the city indebtedness by calling in the outstanding 8 per cent warrants and issuing short-time bonds at a rate of interest not to exceed 4 1/2 per cent. The entire membership of the council was present at the meeting, Alderman Walker having arisen from a sick bed to attend, and came in a cab that he might participate in the consideration of the important issue with his colleagues.

The business of the meeting was opened by Alderman J. S. Graham moving the reconsideration of section 23. In explanation of his action the gentleman stated that some financial clause should be inserted in the charter, and if the council did not provide for the legislature would, so that if they wished to have a voice in the matter, action ought to be taken at once. The motion to reconsider being carried, Mr. Graham moved to strike out the words, "or bonds payable on or before ten years at a rate of interest not to exceed 4 1/2 per cent," from the section under reconsideration.

Where this clause to carry it would leave the charter without a bonding clause and the council would be empowered to refund the city debt only by low rate warrants. It was upon this bond question that the fight came. Gesner absolutely refused to consider any bond proposition while Riggs had figured the financial result of both warrants and bonds for the period of five and ten years and found bonds to be the cheaper to the city at the end of 10 years by something like \$6000. Buren thought that if you could issue bonds at 4 per cent and warrants at 8 per cent it would be saving the city 50 per cent interest each year, and so was in favor of bonds. Legg wished to hear from outside citizens who had made a study of the matter and called for Mr. Claud Gatch who was in the audience. That gentleman spoke enthusiastically and at length in favor of warrants, and alleged that every bond issue was made in some selfish interest. McGrew called for J. H. Albert, the banker, who had reached the scene of action just in time to get a good whiff of Mr. Gatch's brimstone and whosited into the question by the statement that, "since entering this room I have heard only the argument of a dishonest debtor trying to evade the payments of his debts." Mr. Gatch laughed out loud at this and Mr. Albert continued to elucidate the question. At the conclusion of his argument Mr. Gatch refused the idea that he was a dishonest debtor by stating that he paid his debts if he didn't own city warrants. And again the fire flew for a time until the chairman refused to allow any outside talk and the question went before the council for discussion. The council did not desire to argue the matter to any extent, Alderman McGrew remarking that everything had been said that was possible on the subject, and the vote was taken on the adoption of the amendment.

The eyes and noses were called for with the following result, eyes Graham, Gesner, Legg, ones Buren, Burrows, McGrew, Riggs, Walker, and so the amendment failed to pass and the bond clause was retained. The main question was put and the entire section 23 was adopted by the same vote as that by which the clause had been defeated.

Gesner wished to amend section 8 on ex officio justice powers of the recorder. He thought the collection of fees by the recorder from the county was a graft on the county and ought to be stopped, so he moved to amend by giving the recorder no justice powers outside of the city limits.

Some discussion was raised on the proposition, Legg agreeing with Gesner. Recorder Judah asked permission to speak to the subject, and stated that the fees are the private property of the marshal and recorder and it was only by the campaign agreement that they were turned into the treasury. If they went to the Salem justice court they were taken under fee system by the court and the city did not get them, hence it was to the interest of the city to retain the clause, and he was opposed to the amendment. Upon a vote the eyes were Gesner, Graham and Legg, 3, the noses Buren, Burrows, McGrew, Riggs and Walker, 5, so the amendment failed to pass.

Gesner thought a provision should be put in the charter taxing the property of the business men who reside outside the corporate limits of the city. W. F. Boothby's opinion on the subject was called for and he stated that he had investigated the subject

and it was amenable to a general state law but not to specific action of the council. Hence the charter could not contain such a provision. Besides a bill was now before the legislature relating to the subject. Gesner still thought the provision should be inserted, and Graham moved that the committee fathering the charter be given the power to insert such a clause if they saw fit. The motion was carried.

Gesner also wanted a special levy clause of 3 mills to be applied on the outstanding debt, but live of the council again said no, so the clause was not inserted. Adjourned.
