CHARLIE YATES

Killed By a Falling Tree, Near Fruitland.

Phoned to the Ground He Was Crushed to Death in Night of Friends Powerless to Aid.

News was received in this city today shortly after noon, that Charlie Yates, of Fruitland, had been crushed to death by the accidental falling of a large tree, which he was cutting down.

A large tree had been marked out by Yates this morning for falling preparatory to cutting the same into cordwood. It had been well chopped through when Yates started around to the other side to complete the task of falling it when suddenly and without warning the great trunk away and came crashing down, catching the unfortunate chopper in its descent and pinning him down beneath its enormous weight. The trunk of the tree rested squarely across Yates' stomach forcing his body into the yielding earth of the field and crushing it to such an extent that his waist could almost be spanned by the two hands.

Friends who were not far away were powerless to prevent the accident or save the unfortunate man but rushed quickly to the rescue and soon succeeded in removing the tree from his body. But help came too late all pulse having ceased and life being extinct. One of the party, W. B. Ramsom, brought the sad news to town and informed J. A. Yates, the brother of the unfortunate man, and who is employed as chief cook at J. E. Barnett's restaurant, of his accident.

Word was also sent to his relatives who live in other parts of the state.

Charles Yates was about 35 years of age and is well known in this city. He was married only last Christmas to an accomplished young lady of the country, to whom his death is a sudden and most shocking loss. The parents of the victim live in the vicinity of Fruitland and members of the family are scattered in other parts of the state.

As yet no funeral arrangements have been completed.

Why Stations Are Closed.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Inquires made at the offices of the Eastern Cable Company here with reference to the notices sent out by the Commercial Cable Company saying that it had been advised that telegraphic communications with the islands of Pannay, Negros and Cuba, Philippine islands, was temporarily interrupted, which aroused some speculation as to the cause, show that cable stations at Pannay, Negros and Cuba have been closed since December 27 for the safety of the employees, owing to the prevailing unsettled conditions. Officials of the Eastern Cable Company do not know at present whether the Americans or Filipinos are masters of the situation. They add that the stations will remain closed until a more peaceful situation intervenes.

Fire Spreading.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Jan. 21.—A Tribune special from Kenner, Wyo., says: The fire which on December 26 broke out in the Diamondville mine, at Diamondville, continues to spread, despite all effort to control it, and it is feared that the mine will have to be abandoned. A final effort was made to subdue it today, but there is little hope of its being successful.

He, with his usual vituperation, had forced a bond issue of \$60,000—upon the city. The bond firm delayed delivery thinking they had a sure thing when the council surprised them by a reconsideration.

Under the excuse of leaving for a law book, Alderman Albert left his seat and telegraphed to his bond firm. This was answered as above. The telegram together with other readable papers which were in the hands of the quickly departing Williams, are yet in Salem. Salem Justice Court.

F. Kalor was arrested in Portland yesterday on a warrant sworn out in Justice Johnson's court by F. H. RACKET PRICES.

Launch Paul Jones Wrecked.

MOBILE, Ala., Jan. 21.—The government steamer Pansy touched at Biloxi, Miss., and reports finding on Breton island a part of the stern of the naphtha launch Paul Jones, also a yawl boat with bow smashed and other small articles from the launch. The condition of the wreckage tends to show that the naphtha tank blew up and tore the boat to pieces. The Pansy met the Maud with Messrs. Jones and Taggart on board. The latter visited the wreckage and identified it as part of the Paul Jones. No bodies were found.

Skeletons Unearthed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21.—Contractors employed in government construction work on Goat island unearthed eight skeletons. It is a mystery how they came there, and there are several wild stories about. One is that Goat island, which is now a government reserve, was the haunt of pirates, and that much buried treasure is hidden on the island. Another is that the island was used by the Spaniards in the early days as a burial-ground. Several attempts have been made to locate the hidden treasure, but with out success. The unearthed are of enormous proportions, few being less than six feet six inches long.

Doubtful Story.

WICHITA, Kan., Jan. 21.—Admiral Cervera's watch, it is claimed, is owned by Lieutenant Betts, company E, Twenty-third Kansas, volunteers, a negro, who is home from Cuba. It is a fine gold watch, the case set with diamonds and rubies. Inside "Paschel Cervera" is engraved.

The watch was secured by Betts, according to his story, from a Spanish pilot—the man who guided Cervera's ship out of Santiago harbor July 3. As a reward Cervera gave him this watch. Being in straitened circumstances and wanting to go home, he sold the watch for \$52.

Outlaws Captured.

LIMA, Peru, via Galveston, Jan. 21.—As a result of the claim for damages made upon the Peruvian government by Mr. Gottfried, an American citizen, through the United States minister here, Mr. Irving Dunley, for outrages inflicted upon himself and members of his family by a band of Peruvian marauders, it is asserted on reliable authority today that some of the outlaws have been captured and are now in jail at Huamachuco. The government, it also appears, has issued the outlaws pursued with energy and captured.
