THE LEGISLATURE MEN.

Reassemble After a Few Days Recuperation From Labor.

The legislature convened this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, after two days' recuperation, while some members may have been idle during that time, it must be acknowledged that not a few, who have important committee work, have worked as they are seldom compelled to at their private affairs. Their labor of searching the statutes, the constitution and the wishes of their constituents, and in some instances looking after the welfare of the state and tax-payers, is no boys' play. Even some committee clerks have had to work during the interim.

A special order in the senate this afternoon is the consideration of the judiciary committee report against the bill for two additional justices of the supreme court. This report is extensive, and deals with the constitutional points. Many of the best lawyers in both houses, as well as members of the judiciary of the state itself, are of the opinion that the bill is unconstitutional, and as other steps have already been taken to relieve the supreme court of the crush of work it is generally conceded that the report of the committee will be respected and the bill fail to pass.

Probably the most important measure before either house is the Daly educational bill, which revises and codifies our school laws and is intended to knock out the school book trust which is now forcing upon Oregon's school children many inferior text books at prices and above the company's regularly advertised prices and above prices paid by other states.

This bill has been referred to the educational committee, and is being thoroughly overhauled, but it is not known just what that committee may recommend. State Superintendent Ackermann is taking an active hand in the revision of this bill, and some important changes will be no doubt introduced reflecting his views.

The House left off work Friday on second reading of bills, and will probably resume that order of business as there are many bills yet to be read.

THE BILL INDUSTRY.

How the Members of the House Head Governor Geer's Suggestion.

Of the 271 bills which have been introduced in the House, 147 have been printed this morning. Several incorporation bills, of purely local interest were not sent to the printer.

The state printing office is working night and day on the gist of the bills which has been run through the first hopper of the legislature mill; and all the type stickers in town are in demand. Probably the end of this week will see the work pretty well caught up with.

If all members of the House were to make the same showing in the way of introducing bills as have the two gentlemen from Clatsop, Mr. Leeds would have worked for his full force for the rest of the winter. Curtis heads the list with 27 and Young comes second with 17. Whalley has 14; Flax 12; Maxwell 11; Hill 9; Morton and Whitney, 8 each; Davis, McCulloch and Sullivan, 7 each; Beach, Grace, Meyers and Ross, 6 each; Blackaby, Gray, Marsh, McQueen, Palmer, Roberts and Wilson, 5 each; Fordney, Freeland and Hawson, 4 each; Reeder, Stewart, Hubbick and Wencott, 3; Bayer, Brattain, Butt, Carter, Cummings, Farrell, Knight, Kruse, Massingill, McAllister, McCourt and Topping, 2; Briggs, Donnelly, Gregg, Hall, Lewis, Platts, Sherwin, Smith, Stanley Stump, Thompson and Virtue, 1 each. Jones and Lanson have so far refrained from introducing any bills.
