On Sunday pray for the Daily bill and our public schools.

“All weak is a monopoly of the doctoring at our own prices.”—The Regulars.

Gov. Geer says the Daily textbook bill will place a tremendous responsibility in his hands. But he will try and meet it fully, provided the bill should pass. Good for Geer.

The American Book Co. is generously making a voluntary reduction in the price of textbooks to the Portland public school patrons. That will not benefit the rest of the state. Pass the Daily bill.

Rep. Sherwin, the author of the sugar bounty bill and it is a subject he has given a great deal of study, compliments *THE JOURNAL* with defeating the sugar bounty bill. We take off our hat to Bro. Sherwin.

Senator Porter has introduced a bill relating to taxation that, if enacted into law will place a large part of the burden of state taxes on the great corporations doing business in the state, but which practically escape taxation under our present law.

The bill to saddle a \$100,000 annual burden on the state for sugar bounties was defeated in the lower house by a close vote. An analysis of this vote shows that 19 Republicans and 6 Union members voted for the bill; 19 Republicans and 10 Union against it. Eugene Guard. The Dailies Times-Mountaineer: Careful readers of the Oregonian have no doubt been surprised of late to note that that paper has been going after the trusts with a hot stick and advocating the abolishing of tariff duties on all articles controlled by trusts, after having for thirty years or more preached loud and long for the policy which has enabled trusts to be formed and exist. And now to see the Oregonian advocate an income tax will be even a greater surprise.

There is a vein of humor in a Republican paper defending Gov. Geer against the charge of Populism. The *Bohemian* Nugget says: Governor Geer has been insulted already. A populist paper has already referred to him as “bordering on the doctrine of populism.” Governor Geer is a man calculated to bear heavy burdens and his very makeup indicates that he can stand most any kind of disparaging remarks—but this is the unkindest cut of all.

The Oregon City Press, formerly “edited” by “Editor” Fitch who is now “editing” a paper of opposite politics, says: “The efforts of Editor Fitch to shield Senator Porter in his wrong doing at Salem are ludicrous. On the 17th inst., Senator Porter introduced senate resolution No. 10, authorizing the appointment of two stenographers for the senate. And in the face of these indisputable facts Editor Fitch endeavors to show up Boss Porter as a friend of the people.”

Considering the way the “interests of the people” are looked after by some “editors” the above is very funny.

FIRE AT ACME.

The Cushman Saw Mill Burned—All the Lumber Lost.

The Florence West, of January 27, says: News reached Florence this morning that the Sinslaw River Lumber Co.'s Mill at Acme burned last night. The fire started in the saw dust about midnight while the watchman was at supper and when discovered was beyond control.

The wind was from the east at the time and this prevented the east part of the wharf, where the rough lumber was piled from burning, but the dressed lumber was all lost.

Two boats belonging to Geo. Montgomery and S. J. Seymour were burned with the mill also some potatoes belonging to the latter.

The mill was built out over the river on piles and as the floors burned through the machinery fell into the river.

The mill and contents is a total loss.
